Navy recruiter, Chief Charles J. Warren, announced here today three young men from Roseburg have enlisted in the service under the technical training program now being offered recruits. They are Francis G. Batsch, 1535 Beacon Way, Stanley E. Bork, 4837 Golden St., and Alton D. Lounsbury of 1826 SE Main St.

Chief Warren reported the Navy is offering June's high school graduates the opportunity to attend one of over 60 specialty schools, including those in electricity, electronics and mechanics.

"All schools of this type are closely related to requirements for civilian industry," the recruiter said.

The Navy now is accepting young men between the ages of 17 and 30, of good moral character and normal good health. To qualify for specialty schools tests are given to all recruits early in their basic training period, Chief Warren added.

Questions concerning the program will be answered at the Navy recruiting station in the county courthouse basement.
