PULLMAN, Wash. — Gene Bates of Oregon State College held on to his Northern Division batting lead with a .425 average after 10 games, official statistics showed Thursday.

The Beaver first baseman has 17 hits in 40 trips to the plate and has batted in 9 runs.

Len Read of Oregon is second at .405 and the Ducks lead in team hitting with a lofty .321, six regulars batting better than .300.

Private Utilities Spokesman Attacks Plan For Columbia

WASHINGTON — A private utilities spokesman Thursday attacked the proposed Columbia River Development Corp. as a potential "dictator over the electric power business" in the Northwest.

Kinsey M. Robinson, president of the Washington Water Power Co. of Spokane, made the statement in testimony before a Senate Public Works subcommittee hearing on a measure to establish a federal corporation to replace the Bonneville Power Administration.

BPA now handles distribution of all power generated at government dams in the Pacific Northwest.

The proposal, Robinson contended, presumes to take over "complete authority of all projects having any power development, including that of the Corps of Engineers, the Bureau of Reclamation and the Fish and Wildlife Service."

"It is proposed that the federal government, acting through this corporation, should undertake the primary if not the sole responsibility of providing the electric energy requirements of the people, industry and commerce of the Northwest."

Robinson told the committee this responsibility now is shared by private enterprise, local and federal government agencies. This may not be "wholly satisfactory," he said, but there is "no need to expand government participation beyond that of existing agencies to meet such requirements."

WOULD STOP TROOPS — Nationalist China threatened Friday to prevent any movement of Chinese Communist forces across the South China Sea to Indonesia.

The communique noted the statement of a high Indonesian official that Communist China had offered troops to help fight the Indonesian rebels.

Sec. Seaton Predicts Statehood Bill Passage

SEATTLE — The Alaska statehood bill will pass the House on the first vote, Secretary of the Interior Seaton predicted Thursday.

Seaton stopped here on his way to speak at commencement exercises at the University of Alaska.

The secretary will return to Seattle Thursday and travel to Yakima the following day. He will meet with the Columbia Basin Commission at Grand Coulee next Friday evening and dedicate the Grand Coulee lighting system. Seaton will leave Washington for Boise, Idaho, on Saturday.

Becoming A Woman Said Not Grounds For Divorce

LONDON — A British judge ruled Thursday that a wife is not entitled to a divorce on grounds of cruelty just because her husband wants to become a woman.

The decision was handed down by Justice Sir William Davies in the case by Mrs. Constance Dolling. She sought a divorce on cruelty grounds from her husband, Victor — or, as he now prefers, Victoria.

The wife testified that nothing seemed amiss at the time of their marriage in April, 1950. A child was born in May, 1951.

But things changed after that. Davies said the evidence showed the husband began to develop female characteristics but no physical abnormalities.
