

Graduation Exercises Put In Spotlight All This Week In Douglas County Schools

This is the big week for graduation exercises in Douglas County.

The action starts tonight with three schools slated to stage commencement exercises.

At Roseburg High, Dr. Vergil Dykstra, head of the University of Oregon philosophy department, will be the commencement speaker for 221 graduating seniors. (See Page 7.)

The Roseburg High School orchestra will play the processional and recessional. Other musical parts of the program will be given by soprano Gayle Geddes and the Roseburg High A Cappella Choir.

Ministers taking part in the program are the Rev. Lester Olson of the Faith Lutheran Church and the Rev. Guy Zehring, pastor of Conservative Baptist Church. Exercises will start at 8 in the school gymnasium.

Exercises Due At Douglas

Also on the commencement agenda tonight is Douglas High School at Brockway, Dr. W. A. Dahlberg, professor of speech at the University of Oregon, will be the speaker for the 67 seniors. The event is scheduled to start at 8 p.m. in the gymnasium.

Music will be furnished by Choir A under the direction of Irene McLaughlin and the band directed by Richard Kryal. The Rev. W. O. Walker of the Winston-Dillard Methodist Church will give the invocation and benediction.

Baccalaureate was held Sunday night.

Also at 8, the 64 graduating members of the Myrtle Creek High School will start exercises. Featured speaker will be Cliff Robinson, director of education and student training at the University of Oregon.

Other Schedules Listed

Six schools have scheduled exercises Tuesday night. They are: Canyonville, which will start the ceremony at 7 p.m. in the Canyonville Methodist Church. Featured speaker will be Winston Purvine, president of Oregon Technical Institute at Ashland.

Elkhart, which will feature Dr. K. T. Ellickson, dean of the University of Oregon graduate school, at 8 p.m.

Glendale, which will also have as its speaker Dr. Dahlberg at 8 p.m.

Glide, which has no speaker, will start exercises at 8.

Days Creek, which will feature Dr. Alvin Sellers, director of student affairs at Southern Oregon College, at 8 p.m.

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Reappointment Not For Lewis Strauss, Says Rep. Porter

WASHINGTON (AP)—Rep. Charles O. Porter (D-Ore), a critic of Atomic Energy Commission policies, said in a talk Friday night he has it on good authority that AEC Chairman Lewis L. Strauss will not accept reappointment.

Strauss' five-year term ends June 30 and President Eisenhower has asked him to stay on. The AEC head said May 9 he had not made up his mind.

Commenting on the Porter remark Saturday, White House press secretary James G. Haggerty said it is up to Strauss whether he continues in the chairmanship after June 30. He said Eisenhower has a very high regard for Strauss.

There have been reports that Strauss is waging a last-ditch fight in the administration against suspension of nuclear tests and that other high officials are moving toward suspension.

Porter told a meeting of the Federation of Civic Associations Friday night he understands that "Strauss does not want to face a hostile Senate committee that would have to rule on his reappointment."

"In addition," Porter said, "my sources say that the President's committee advisers, James Killian and Hans Bethe, and even Secretary of State Dulles, have worked to persuade Adm. Strauss to retire completely, and not take a job as an administration adviser."

Woodrich To Speak

Drain Union High, with Douglas County Circuit Judge Charles S. Woodrich as speaker at 8 p.m.

Thursday exercises are scheduled at Riddle and Yoncalla. At Riddle, the speaker will be Dr. Ellickson at 8 p.m. for the class of 22. Dr. Dan Poling, dean of men at Oregon State College, will speak during the program which starts at 8 at Yoncalla.

Apparently the last exercises in the county are scheduled June 3. Oakland will then graduate 34 students. Baccalaureate will be June 1. Featured speaker at baccalaureate will be Dr. Homer Noble, pastor of the Oakland Presbyterian Community Church. The commencement speaker will be Dr. Elmo Stevenson, president of Southern Oregon College.

The only Wednesday night commencement is scheduled at Camas Valley High School, where Dr. Alva Graham, professor of education at Southern Oregon College, will be speaker. The exercises start at 8 p.m.

Nixon Telegram Backs Knowland's Bid For Governor

RIVERSIDE, Calif. (AP)—Vice President Nixon sent a telegram Sunday endorsing Sen. William F. Knowland (R-Calif.), who seeks the California Republican nomination for governor.

"As a Californian," Nixon said, "I am proud to be able to work and vote for a man who in every respect will be worthy to lead our state into the exciting era in which it will become the first state in the nation." Californians predict their state's population will exceed New York's in a few years.

Nixon predicted Knowland would win the gubernatorial race and said, "It is more than just a contest between Democrats and Republicans."

"Bill Knowland will receive the support of thousands of Democrats who admire and respect a man who refused to buckle down to any pressure group regardless of the political consequences."

Knowland told a Republican rally he favored "voluntary rather than compulsory membership in labor unions."

Among the 600 seniors to be graduated tomorrow is Ernest Green, a 16-year-old Negro. He is the first of his race to get a diploma from Central High, the scene of rioting last September when Green and eight other Negroes entered the school.

No one molested Green. He waited outside the stadium while after the ceremony, apparently for relatives. Then three detectives escorted him to a gate.

A photographer for the Arkansas Democrat took pictures of the incident and the only major candidate for the 1960 Republican presidential nomination.

Brown said Nixon first endorsed Knowland months ago and that the senator's "campaign manager is unofficially playing the record over again."

Panty Raid Blame Put On Broadcast

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP)—A panty raid which Florida State University officials claimed a disc jockey helped incite was broken up with tear gas.

Damage was light around Jennie Murphy's Dormitory for Women. Lost included an assortment of wigs, garters, flung from upper windows by cooperative coeds.

The raid, involving 1,000 men students and some local residents, lasted about four hours.

No arrests were made and no injuries were reported.

Robert M. Strasser, president of the university, said a broadcast by Red Evans, disc jockey for Tallahassee station WTAL, contributed to the uproar.

Paul Meyers, Evans' supervisor, said Evans "innocently broadcast" a student request that said "big things tonight at Jennie Murphy."

A highway patrolman fired one tear gas shell when raiders broke a dormitory basement window. It helped disperse the group.

Both Crewmen Killed In Jet Bomber's Crash

CHAMPAIGN, Ill. (AP)—An Air Force B-27 jet bomber crashed in a field shortly after taking off from Champaign Air Force Base yesterday, killing the two crewmen aboard.

The victims were identified as 1st Lt. J. T. Flynn, pilot, of Indianapolis, and Capt. B. H. Griggs, navigator, of Philadelphia, both stationed at Langley Air Force Base, Va.

Philippines Top Bandit Captured In Gun Battle

MANILA (AP)—The Philippines' most notorious bandit leader, Leonardo Maneco, has been captured by police in a gun battle near Manila. The young handsome bandit, a wartime guerrilla who had a Robin Hood reputation of helping the poor, was wanted for more than a dozen killings.

Rain and fish welcomed fishermen on the opening day of the fishing season Saturday at Diamond Lake.

Estimates as to how many people there was at the lake ran as high as 4,000. The opening day of last year, there were not many complaints of "no fish."

Word is expected to get around that the fish were biting Saturday and a larger crowd is expected next weekend. For a while it looked discouraging, for the picnic area, where most of the boats are launched was snowed out. The area opened up for vehicles about 3 p.m. Friday, Dick Hook, forest official, said.

Such was not the case Saturday. During the morning hours, only about 45 boats were on the lake. With few fish being caught and a lot of people there last year, many visitors were discouraged and did not return for the opening day Saturday.

Fish being caught were two-year-old bucks, according to Fred Locke of Portland. Game Commission chief of lake and stream management, Locke said the Kamloops trout started spawning Friday. Average length of trout being brought in was 12 to 16 inches, Locke added.

State police said they had "checked" boat after boat with 10, 15 or 20 fish, depending upon the number of persons in the boat.

Glenn Phennig of Springfield found a boat adrift on the lake Saturday morning. The craft, which had a motor attached and carried fishing poles and tackle, was towed to a boat landing and state police started noisily. The police said a Klamath Falls dentist claimed the boat.

enough to save our threatened freedoms. The nation as a whole must do its duty.

Drastic Measures Taken

Striving to stem the tide of revolt, the government:

1. Cut off communications and supplies to the insurgents who consolidated their control of Corsica with Algeria-type public safety committees. Rebel leaders in Algiers said they would funnel supplies to the Mediterranean island's 140,000 people.

2. Extended censorship to all news distributed in France—whether from French territories or from abroad. The French police seized today's issue of the New York Herald Tribune for publishing a declaration of support for the rebel generals in Algeria by Adm. Philippe Auboyneau, the navy commander in the Mediterranean.

3. Announced government officials and military personnel who took part in the Corsica uprising would be fined and jailed.

Snag Fires Put Out In Douglas Forests

Fire suppression agencies had snag fires under control today after lightning strikes over the weekend.

Herb Rudolph, fire control officer for the Umpqua National Forest, flew over the forest today to spot possible fires resulting from lightning activity Sunday and Friday evening.

Wayne Miller, dispatcher for the Douglas Forest Protective Assn., said fires from four lightning strikes were put out on land protected by DFFA. One, between the Little River and North Umpqua watersheds, set five snags afire.

Three other strikes were in the Calapooia Creek watershed. Two strikes in the Cow Creek District of the Umpqua Forest were extinguished Saturday. A large fire in the Bohemia District is under control.

Logging Congress Takes Change In Its Name

The Willamette Valley Logging Conference, which meets annually in February in Eugene, has changed its name to the Oregon Logging Conference.

Carl Raynor, Eugene, president of the conference, said the change was made for accuracy. He explained that there were misconceptions about the area served by the organization.

The Oregon Logging Conference is the only organization of its kind directing its conference toward the needs and problems of the timber industry of the entire state. It will continue its affiliation with the Pacific Logging Congress, Raynor said.

The 21st annual conference will be Feb. 26-28, 1959, with taxation and the state's timber industry as the theme.

Auto Union-Big 3 Talks Arrive At Showdown

DETROIT (AP)—This is showdown week as negotiations between the United Auto Workers and the auto industry's Big Three enter the final stage.

Contracts at Ford, Chrysler and General Motors covering hundreds of thousands of workers expire within seven days or less.

The Big Three legally could shut their plants to force a contract settlement. But there was no hint of what they would do if contract deadlines pass without agreements.

The UAW previously ordered its members to work without contracts if agreements were not attained.

The UAW is standing firm on its demands for an annual wage boost of at least 10 cents an hour, increased supplemental unemployment benefits, and cost of living allowances for retired workers.

Swap In Tourists Offered Russians By United States

WASHINGTON (AP)—If the Russians will let Americans visit Omsk, Russians can sample the sights of Seattle . . . or Louisville, Ky., if Americans can go to Tomsk.

Seattle and Louisville, both off limits to Russians, are among the places the United States is offering anew to open to Soviet visits if the Kremlin will abolish its barriers restricting foreign travel in the Soviet Union.

Altogether, 25 U. S. cities and 13 different groupings of U. S. territory have been closed to the Russians in retaliation for Soviet closure of cities and areas of comparable size to foreign visitors.

In a new appeal to Moscow, the State Department offered to open any or all the U. S. closed zones if the Soviets will reciprocate.

In a note to the Soviets, the latest appeal over a period of several years, the United States called once again for elimination of all travel restrictions. But the note said that since the Soviet Union had not even replied to a similar proposal last November, this country is offering a new and more limited deal in hopes some parts, at least, would be accepted.

Under the U. S. proposal, this country would match opening for opening-like Louisville for Tomsk or the state of Maryland for the Soviet provinces of Moscow, Kaluga and Vladimir.

In addition, the United States offered to open three different groupings of highways in return for removal of Soviet travel curbs on certain of its highways.

Three other members of the family were injured. The accident occurred Sunday at McBean, 15 miles south of Augusta.

Dead are Budd Anders, 67; his wife Norma, 53; and their son, Coy, 18. A daughter, Lois, 15, and another son, Harold, 11, underwent brain surgery after the accident.

BOY DIES IN SILO

VANCOUVER, Wash. (AP)—An eight-year-old boy died in a silo Sunday after being overcome by gases from freshly stored green alfalfa.

He was Delbert Allen Walker. A brother discovered the body when he went to look for the boy, who had failed to return on time from feeding the family's livestock.

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
