FARM-FOREST-FACTS

Will sure had some creepy stories about strange creatures believed to inhabit the area, which in turn stimulated other stories from the audience.

Soon singing broke out, accompanied by gypsy Bob on the accordion, to be later joined in duet by gypsy Harry on the trumpet. Dying embers were a long time coming, but finally everyone paired off for bed. So everyone thought, SUDDENLY, supper campfires began to brighten, against Frank's instructions. Being alert to the situation, however, Frank soon squelched them with just plain old buckets of water. His experience had taught him to anticipate such happenings and how to control them quickly. After that all was quiet till dawn.

About 4 a.m., farmers' roosters down the valley were awakened by crowing 4-H kids. As I raised myself from an air mattress which had deflated quietly during the night, I knew that sleep was to be a thing of the past and that a new day had begun.

Striking Pilots Study Proposal

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Striking pilots of Western Air Lines are studying a proposal that may end their 91-day strike.

The airline accepted Friday when a mediator proposed that issues be submitted to binding arbitration if they aren't resolved after five more days of negotiation. The AFL Air Line Pilots Assn. took it under consideration.

The ALPA's 263 pilots walked out in a dispute over many points in contract negotiations. The line furnished the other workers and grounded all planes.

Wage issues remain the big problem. Pilots are seeking a 15 per cent pay raise. Western said it has offered 8 per cent, and the ALPA said a new Western offer boosted this 1 more per cent.

Western said the average wage for pilots and copilots last year was \$12,529.

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Thornton Asks Smith To Debate

SALEM (AP) — Atty. Gen. Robert V. Thornton Friday challenged former Gov. Elmo Smith, Albany publisher, to a public debate.

The challenge followed a published report that Smith had termed Thornton's 1955 effort to investigate the liquor commission as "a witch-hunting expedition for political purposes."

An investigation of the commission was directed by the late Gov. Paul Patterson. Thornton, who wanted to make his own probe, was unable to obtain liquor commission records.

"During this period," Thornton wrote to Smith, "the liquor commission was surrounded by a fog of public suspicion. Officials and employees had been accepting presents and hospitality from liquor interests."

"My efforts to secure a public disclosure were aborted by the state administration, some law enforcement officials who have since resigned or who have been removed from office, as well as certain others. These conditions have since been corrected by Gov. Holmes and the new liquor commission."

Thornton's challenge was published in the Oregonian. Smith, who is now publisher of the Albany Evening Journal, did not immediately answer the challenge.

Thornton said he would like to see Smith and himself debate the issue of the liquor commission.

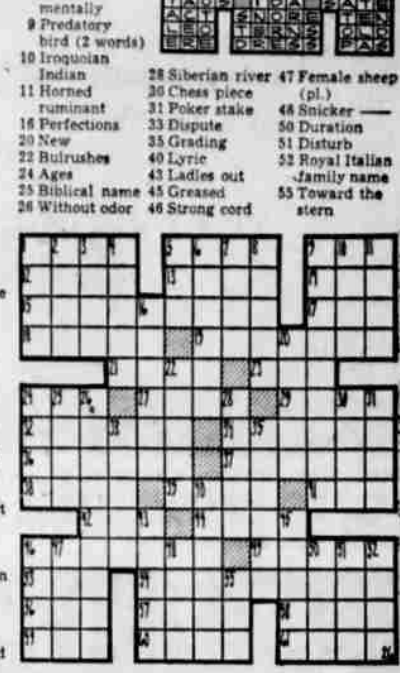

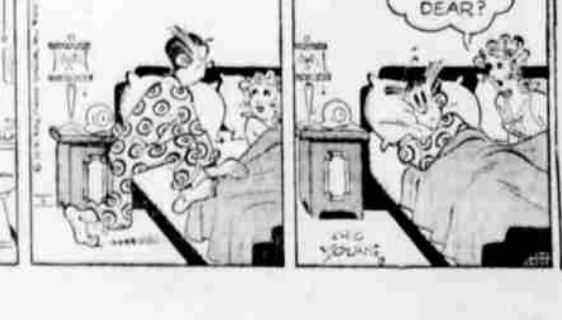
