Navy Supersonic Fighter Sets 5 Climbing Marks

CORPUS CHRISTI, Tex. (AP)—A Navy Douglas F4D-1 Skyray supersonic fighter has set five official world records for climbing speed, the Navy announced this week.

All the records were set at the Naval Air Missile Test Center at Point Mugu, Calif., May 22 and 23 by Marine Corps Maj. Edward N. LeFavre of Baltimore, Md.

The most spectacular climb, from the ground to 15,000 meters—49,213 feet—in two minutes, 36.05 seconds.

In this and the other flights, LeFavre was climbing almost vertically at 9,100 ft. the speed of sound, the fastest up record that an airplane has taken off and climbed to such altitudes.

The achievement was significant because the Skyray is an operational airplane, and has been with the Navy and Marine Corps squadrons on carriers and land bases in all major world theaters for more than two years.

The four other marks established by LeFavre broke records formerly held by a French plane, the Nord-1405 Gerfaut-88, on Feb. 16, 1957.

The Navy demonstrated publicly for the first time a newly developed push button helicopter, the Sikorsky HSS-19.

Automatic equipment permits it to hover at 50 feet altitude over a pre-selected spot.

SALEM (AP)—The state Board of Control decided Tuesday to call for bids for construction of a \$450,000 building to house Fairview Home inmates who can't walk.

At the same time, the board rejected all bids for construction of two pre-placement cottages at the home. The board said the bids, the lowest of which was \$129,989, were too high. It instructed the architects to draft new plans.

Atom Submarine Sails For 30 Days Below Surface

GROTON, Conn. (AP)—Two of the nation's atom submarines—the Skate and the Seawolf—have sailed for 30 days and more under the sea to set new endurance records.

Adm. Arleigh Burke, chief of naval operations, hailed the records as "major breakthroughs of the first magnitude with implications far beyond undersea warfare."

During a training exercise, the Skate operated continuously under water for 31 days and 5 1/2 hours. The Seawolf surfaced after 30 days. She held the previous endurance record of 16 days.

Burke made the dramatic announcement moments before the nation's sixth and fastest nuclear sub, the Skipjack, slid down the ways into the choppy gray waters of the Thames River.

LSWU Gets Strike Authorization In Demand For Wages

PORTLAND (AP)—The 60,000-member Lumber and Sawmill Workers Union announced Tuesday it will go into negotiations Wednesday armed with 3 to 1 approval of its members for a strike to back up contract demands.

At the same time the International Woodworkers of America, speaking for 45,000, announced its locals had ratified by nearly 5 to 1 a one-year contract extension with a wage reopening Sept. 16.

The unions in these negotiations represent woods and mill workers in Montana, Idaho, Washington, Oregon, Northern California and Nevada.

IWA representatives, whose decision several weeks ago to recommend putting off any pressure for wage increases came as a shock, meet late Tuesday with employer representatives to ready agreements for local signing.

Meet To Bargain

And Wednesday the LSWU will meet with employers in a bargaining session.

What course the bargaining will take is uncertain.

"We suggested arbitration," said Earl Hartley, executive secretary of the LSWU's Western Council.

The union has proposed a 31-cent package increase in wages and benefits, but Hartley said this has not been made a firm demand. It was presented to union locals however as the 1958 program as they took their strike authorization votes.

"We are entitled to a 31-cent package to keep abreast of the national economy," Hartley said. "We haven't had a wage increase in three years. We are 17 cents behind on the cost of living."

Walter Durham, spokesman for the Lumbermen's Industrial Relations Committee, said until Wednesday's meeting no forecast of future plans can be made.

Seattle Food, Produce Strike Ends Tuesday

SEATTLE (AP)—Acceptance of a 33-cent hourly wage boost by members of Teamsters Union Local 174 Tuesday night ended Seattle's 3 1/2-week food and produce warehouse strike.

The teamsters, who voted unanimously to accept the management offer, will immediately receive an 18-cent increase, retroactive to April 1. They will get another 15 cents an hour next year.

An improved vacation plan and other fringe benefits also are included in the new contract.

Presbyterian Churches Vote To Merge Into One

PITTSBURGH (AP)—Those historically scrappy Presbyterians patch up an old fuss today—and mold two churches into one.

They're forming "the United Presbyterian Church of the U.S.A.," which becomes the fourth largest body in American Protestantism.

Twin processions of robed delegates marching to a common rendezvous point will symbolize the emerging of the two strands of their tradition.

The ceremonies will be climaxed by sharing of the Lord's Supper. Joining forces are the United Presbyterian Church and the Presbyterian Church in the U.S.A., with a combined membership of more than three million.

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Fr. P. J. O'Reilly Dies At Sheridan

SHERIDAN, Ore. (AP)—Father Patrick J. O'Reilly, 86, a missionary and pastor in Montana, Washington and Alaska during the more than 50 years of his priesthood, died Monday.

Death came to him at the St. Francis Xavier novitiate here for which he helped raise construction funds in 1950.

He was ordained in the Roman Catholic priesthood at Gonzaga University, Spokane, in 1906, served as pastor at churches in Fairbanks, Sitka and Wrangell, Alaska, and in several Washington state cities during the 1920s and 1930s. He was Catholic chaplain to the armed forces in Alaska in World War II and remained there until 1949. Then he was

chaplain at St. Mary's novitiate, Bellingham, for two years. He had been at the novitiate here since 1954.

Father O'Reilly was a native of Kilkee, County Clare, Ireland.

Requiem mass will be said Wednesday. Burial will be at Spokane.

NEED \$58 MILLION

SALEM (AP)—The state Board of Control estimated Tuesday it will need \$58 million dollars for construction of new buildings at state institutions in the next 19 years.

The estimate includes 19 1/2 millions for the 1959-61 biennium, and 19 millions for 1961-63.



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
