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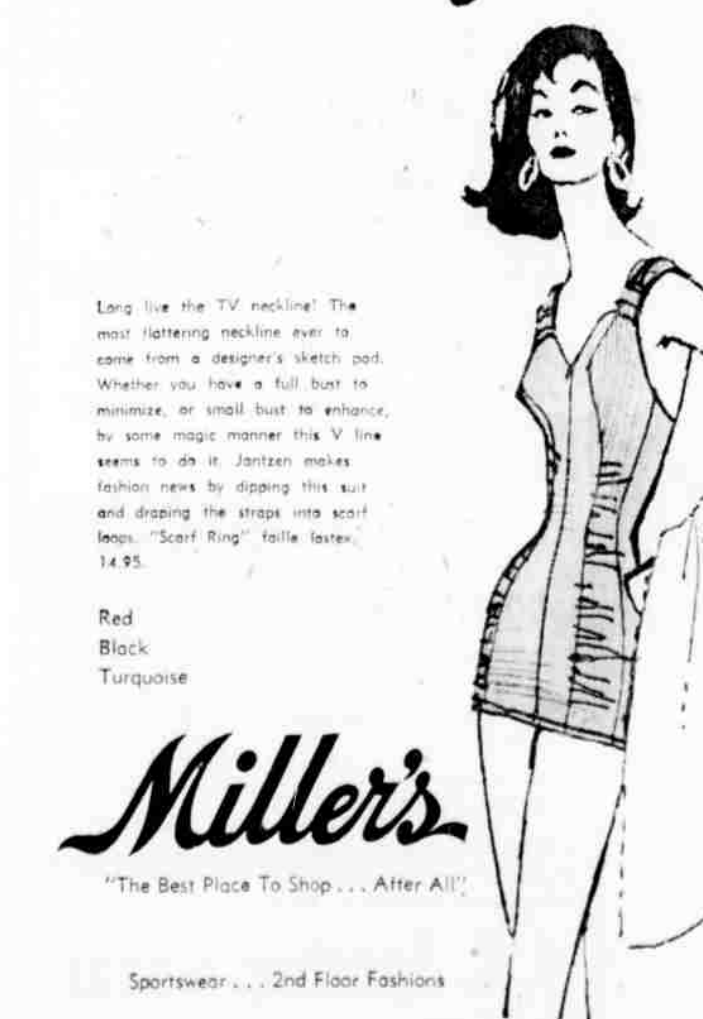
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Social Security Special Disability Deadline June 30

A special temporary clause in the Social Security law which allows the Social Security Administration to extend disability consideration to workers who were disabled several years ago runs out June 30.

Persons who were forced out of work before 1936 by a serious disability which will continue indefinitely, and have not checked with the Social Security office, have been urged to do so, Fenton Ford, field representative for Douglas County, said.

Ford said his contact station will continue to be in the Roseburg City Hall council chambers each Tuesday morning from 8:30 a.m. until noon.

Under the permanent form of the law, an application must be made within two and a half years after the onset of disability has forced a worker to retire from covered jobs if disability consideration is to be granted, according to Dean O. Haley, Social Security Administration district manager.

Anyone applying after June may not meet the requirement of the law if his disability forced him to retire before 1936. Applications filed through June 30, however, may establish qualification for disability consideration to many persons who were forced to retire by impairments suffered in the fall of 1941.

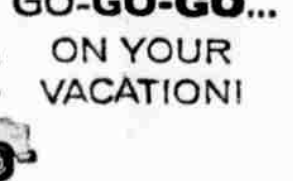
Consumer Spending Slides Off A Bit During Week
