

Polo Grounds Seen As Poor Hitters' Park By Rigney

PHILADELPHIA (AP)—Among the wonderful things that have happened to the San Francisco Giants this season was not having to play in the Polo Grounds, their former home in New York.

That is what Manager Billy Rigney said today as he tried to explain why the surprising Giants were leading the National League.

"Two of our biggest surprises," he said, "have been Orlando Cepeda and Jim Davenport, our rookie first and third basemen. Another revelation has been the hitting of Daryl Spencer, our short-

stop. Cepeda and Spencer each has hit 12 home runs so far.

Fences Would Hurt

"I'm sure neither would have done nearly as well had the Giants still been in the Polo Grounds. Those shortfences proved a handicap to Spencer and I feel they would have been just as much of a handicap to Cepeda. Orlando has tremendous power—as much as anybody on the club—but he is not a pull hitter. His power is to left center and right center. He's hit several long 400-foot homers in San Francisco but they would only have been long outs in the Polo Grounds. Such things tend to discourage young ballplayers.

"It took Spencer two years to find that out," Rigney added, "and then he still wasn't convinced. He hit a few home runs his first year with the Giants and he got to pulling every ball. I had a tough job convincing him that he'd never amount to a great deal as a hitter unless he learned to hit to the opposite field. He finally began to see the light last year—at least I thought he did—but toward the end of the season, he was back trying to pull again.

Mays Hit On Road

"Any young player, unless he's a dead pull hitter, faces a handicap at the Polo Grounds. He takes one look at the short fences and tries to take dead aim with every swing. All he gets for his efforts, however, are long fly ball outs. Look at Willie Mays. How many homers did he hit at the Polo Grounds? Most of his homers were on the road."

Pitchers Swapped By Beavers, Padres

PORTLAND (AP)—Portland's newest pitcher and a former University of Oregon baseball star will be opposed when the Portland-Phoenix Pacific Coast League teams meet here Wednesday in their rain-delayed series opener.

Vic Lombardi, acquired from San Diego Tuesday in a swap for Ray Bauer, will pitch for Portland. Curt Barclay, sent to Phoenix by the San Francisco Giants, will be on the mound for the team that took seven in a row from the Beavers at Phoenix.

Barclay played both basketball and baseball for Oregon.

Grelle Enters Relays

EUGENE (AP)—Two University of Oregon athletes, miler Jim Grelle and freshman pole vaulter Phil Paquin, will compete Saturday night in the annual California Relays at Modesto.

Grelle, who ran a 4:06.3 mile last weekend, will be in a field featuring Australia's Herb Elliott who has been timed repeatedly in under 4 minutes.

Paquin's best height this spring has been 14 feet 8 1/2 inches.

Changes Made In PCC Results

BERKELEY, Calif. (AP)—Pacific Coast Conference officials have taken a good look at films of Saturday's conference track meet and changed their minds on results of the 320-yard low hurdles.

Robert Gordon Sproul, California president and head judge, and Harold Berliner, the meet referee, moved the announced winner, Southern California's Dave Hollingsworth, back to fifth place Tuesday.

Walt Arlt of Washington State, ruled the second place finisher Saturday, was declared the winner with Steve Anderson, Oregon, second; Bob Lawson, USC, third, and Monte Upshaw, California, fourth.

The mixup apparently resulted when one of the hurdlers smacked into the final hurdle.

The films also straightened out results of the photo finish 100-yard dash. Willie White, California, remained the winner and Dean Smith, Stanford, stayed in second. The third spot went to Jack Morris, Oregon, fourth to Otis Davis, Oregon, and fifth to Hollingsworth.

The final decisions cost USC two points but the Trojans still ended with 38 1/2 points, plenty for the conference crown. California picked up one point, remaining in second place ahead of UCLA. Stanford and Oregon tied for fourth with 26 1/2 and Washington State grabbed sixth place with 14 1/2. Washington followed with 13 1/2.

County Agent Warns Cherry Growers To Spray Trees Now

J. Roland Parker, county extension agent, today said cherry fruit flies have begun to emerge locally and warned farmers to take immediate steps to curtail the spread of the destructive pest.

Parker said the first flies began to emerge Monday and will begin depositing eggs in the cherry fruit in a week or 10 days.

Success of control measures depends on immediate application of sprays or dusts when the first flies emerge and repeat applications every 10 days until the fruit is harvested and after every hard rain, said Parker.

Emergence at Several Periods

He emphasized that flies emerge over a period of time and protection of fruit requires frequent applications of insecticides.

For use in protecting cherries grown for home use and fresh market, Parker recommended the following insecticides:

Perthane—One part of emulsifiable concentrate containing four pounds of actual Perthane per gallon in 100 gallons of water. Do not apply the last spray within two days of harvest.

Methoxychlor—Two pounds of 50 per cent wettable Methoxychlor powder to 100 gallons of water for the first spray and follow-up sprays of Perthane as recommended.

Parker said cherries grown for processing, canneries and barrelling should be protected with a lead arsenate spray or dust. The spray, added Parker, is produced by combining three pounds of lead arsenate with 100 gallons of water, then adding a commercial or home made spreader. He said a spreader may be made by combining two quarts of skim milk with four ounces of hydrated lime.

Gives Formula

The county agent said lead arsenate dust should contain 15 parts of acid lead arsenate and 85 parts dusting sulfur. He said hydrated lime may be substituted for the sulfur.

Britannica Faces Charge Of False Representation

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Federal Trade Commission accused Encyclopaedia Britannica Inc., Chicago, Tuesday of falsely claiming to offer its encyclopaedia at a bargain price for a limited time only.

The commission complaint said the company claims to offer price reductions on a combination purchase of the encyclopaedia and other books, "services and merchandise." It said the prospective customer is told this offer is for a limited time only.

The commission said the purportedly reduced prices are those regularly charged for the items, whether bought singly or together, and are usually available at any time.

A hearing will be held July 8 before an FTC examiner in Chicago. The company has 30 days in which to answer the complaint.

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New Naval Commander For Pacific Chosen

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Adm. Harry D. Felt to become the U.S. Atlantic Fleet. Eisenhower named him to have the Pacific upon the retirement on Aug. 1 of Adm. Felix B. Stump. Felt now is vice chief of naval operations. Eisenhower nominated Vice Adm. James S. Russell to take over that post when Felt assumes the top Pacific naval command. Russell now is deputy commander in chief and chief of staff of the U.S. Atlantic Fleet. Eisenhower nominated him to have the grade, rank and pay of a full admiral while serving as vice chief of naval operations. Eisenhower, in sending the nominations to the Senate, also asked approval for Stump to be placed on the retired list with the rank of four-star admiral.



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
