

Revised School Standards To Be Recommended

SALEM, Ore. — Revised school standards will be recommended to the state Board of Education at its meeting here June 12, Rex Putnam, state superintendent of public instruction, said.

Putnam made the announcement at the annual meeting of the Oregon Assn. of County School Superintendents.

He said that two studies of school standards have been completed, but that the findings won't be announced until the board meets.

The superintendents, opening their two-day session Monday, discussed publicly and testing programs for grade school children.

Alf B. Mekvold, Jackson County superintendent, was elected president for the next year. Rita Simmons, Wheeler County, was named vice president.

Florence E. Beardsley, of Putnam's staff, continues as secretary. The officers were elected in a mail ballot, and results were announced Monday.

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Lightning Bolts Pelt State; Search Started For Fires

Lightning bolts pelted Oregon Monday night and Tuesday, and worried foresters expected more strikes Tuesday night.

Clinging clouds obscured the mountains in much of the state Tuesday morning, and foresters said they were not certain whether there were undiscovered fires touched off by the bolts.

Lookouts have not yet been posted in much of the forests. Foresters held planes in readiness to scan the timber when clouds cleared away.

In lower hills, no serious fires were reported, but the lightning played havoc on the floor of the Willamette Valley.

Power lines were knocked out and at Portland one bolt set a trolley bus aflame Monday night. Some 50 passengers escaped with only minor injuries.

Power Failures

From Eugene northward power companies reported scattered failures from lightning. The Bonneville Power Administration said its lines were struck at least 20 times in a single hour Monday night.

Another lightning storm formed east of Salem about 5 a.m. Tuesday, moved northward, reaching the Portland area about 6:30 a.m., and continued on to the north along the Cascade foothills.

All parts of Oregon were warned by forecasters that electrical storms were possible Tuesday night and Wednesday.

The saying that lightning never strikes twice in the same place was challenged by two city policemen in Portland, Andrew Wallman and Paul Peterson.

They said that in a three-minute span separate bolts hit the same utility pole at the intersection of Greeley and Lombard in North Portland Monday night. Power was out three hours in that area.

Bolt Hits Line

A bolt knocked out Bonneville's Salem-Tillamook line, and other strikes disrupted Pacific Power and Light Co. and Tillamook PUD systems out of Beaver in northwestern Oregon.

A number of Portlanders reported lightning hits on trees. One householder, Kit Meuser, said a bolt came down his chimney and knocked out the fuses in his home. No other damage was reported at his place.

Thunderstorms were reported at many places. Portland recorded the heaviest downpour, more than two-thirds of an inch Monday night.

Skies were clear in Southern Oregon Tuesday, but residents were warned of the possibility of thunderstorms later.

A 50-acre fire which has been burning in the Bohemia district, east of Cottage Grove, was reported under control Tuesday morning, although still not extinguished.

Several fires broke out in the forests of southwest Washington.

The Gifford Pinchot National Forest said lookouts reported 21 lightning strikes in the Lewis River district alone.

Fight Dozen Fires

George Beckum, supervisor of the state Department of Natural Resources at Vancouver, said his crews were fighting a dozen fires on state lands.

Federal foresters reported at least six fires in Washington state started by the lightning.

Separate bolts dazed a man, destroyed a barn and killed two horses in the area around Salem.

A lightning-set fire destroyed the barn of Gus Schleker near Salem. Banks lightning knocked out power and telephone lines, then set fire to the barn of Myron Dwyer. The barn burned down because firemen could not be summoned at once.
