Dave Beck's Trial Delayed Till Fall

SEATTLE — Dave Beck's trial on charges of evading payment of \$240,000 in income taxes appears likely to get under way in the early fall.

U.S. District Judge George H. Boldt confirmed Wednesday that he has instructed attorneys in the case to keep themselves free after September 15.

Beck originally had been scheduled to go on trial in Judge Boldt's court in Tacoma on May 5, but a postponement was granted at the request of attorneys for both sides.

The delay was to allow the lawyers to agree on stipulations on the validity of more than 1,000 exhibits to be submitted by the Justice Department. Judge Boldt said Wednesday much progress had been made.

Before the trial date can be set the judge must rule on several defense motions seeking dismissal of the indictments, a change of venue or a further postponement.

The charges against Beck cover the years 1939-53. He has denied them.

Graham Would Continue Meets If He Gets Funds

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Billy Graham called on his supporters Wednesday night to decide whether he should extend his San Francisco Bay area crusade by one or two weeks.

Speaking before 12,000 persons in the Cow Palace, he said "there is strong feeling on the team that we should not go beyond June 15," which would be a one-week extension. The local executive committee has urged him to stay until June 22.

He said he wanted to hear from ushers, ministers, choir members and the counselors who attend to those making "decisions for Christ."

He was introduced by Mordecai Ham, an 86-year-old semi-retired evangelist from Louisville, Ky., who induced Graham to make a decision for Christ 24 years ago during a North Carolina tent revival meeting. Graham was then 15.

Ham said Graham's popularity climb was the greatest miracle he had ever seen.

"He's better known than our President or the Pope," Ham declared.

After Graham's sermon 293 persons made decisions.

337 BUSINESS FAILURES

NEW YORK (AP) — There were 337 business failures during the week ending Thursday — 10 more than the preceding week — Dun & Bradstreet Inc. reported Tuesday. The total compares with 309 commercial and industrial failures in the similar period a year ago.

The latest total is the highest since 346 failures were recorded in the week ended April 17.

Political Dispute Ends In Gunfire

CORPUS CHRISTI, Tex. — A political argument at a ball game erupted into gunfire Wednesday night and one of two men who had "stepped outside" to settle the dispute was shot in both legs.

Dewey Tom, 60, a U. S. customs inspector, was jailed for investigation of assault with intent to murder.

Samuel Murff, 52, superintendent of a cotton compress firm, was hospitalized with bullet wounds in both legs.

Riley Attaway said he was sitting in the same box with the two men during the Texas League baseball game between Corpus Christi and San Antonio.

Attaway said the two were arguing politics. He said Tom was a strong supporter of U. S. Sen. Lyndon Johnson (D-Tex) and that his name was mentioned in the argument.

Tom and Murff left the box with the intention of going outside to settle the argument, Attaway said.

Indonesians Claim 77 Rebels Killed In Clash

JAKARTA, Indonesia — The Indonesian army today claimed it has killed 77 rebels in mopping up operations around Gorontalo, in the North Celebes.

Jakarta forces invaded the area two weeks ago in a drive to subdue the rebels, whose headquarters now is at Manado, 135 miles northeast of Gorontalo.

The rebels claimed last week they had killed "no less than 100 Jakarta regulars and 300 enemy-equipped youths" in fighting for the port city.

Man Beats Father Time; To Collect Big Insurance

CHICAGO — John DeWolf, who at 96 will collect \$75,000 life insurance because he tripped up the mortality tables, says he'll soon go to Paris to see some of his lady friends.

"Of course, I'm afraid I'm only joking about the girls," he told a reporter as he celebrated his birthday yesterday. "They're not around any more."

"But I'll be off to Europe next year," said the sprightly old banker and adventurer. "I want to see it again before I die."

DeWolf beats odds of 100,000 to 3, said the insurance statisticians, by living until he reached his 96th birthday.

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
