

It's Going To Be A Working Vacation

Spurred by recession, a growing number of America's teenagers are turning their backs on the old saw that "all work and no play makes Jack a dull boy." The youngsters already have begun their annual quest for vacation jobs—more than usual, earlier than usual, and in something of a frenzy.

"Man, if you don't get in there and get at least a promise of a job," said 16-year-old Ralph Hornbush of Milwaukee. "The next guy will have gone and done it before you can blink an eyelash."

But even the early birds are finding the market tough. The good summer jobs, said Ted Royal, 15, of Miami, Ohio, are "all going to grown men who are out of their regular work but still have to support their families."

Jan Kribo, 17, of Minneapolis, said he had worked the last two summers for a construction company. "It's good exercise and I was looking forward to doing it this year," he said. "But, no—they've got too much help as it is and not enough work contracted. So I'm out."

Not Just For Fun

Interviews with 760 teenagers in 25 localities across the country showed 66 per cent of the boys and 35 per cent of the girls expect to hold some kind of job this summer. This is a considerable increase over last year when 57 per cent of the boys and 26 per cent of the girls worked.

A sizeable number, 42 per cent of the boys and 26 per cent of the girls, already have lined up jobs.

Those who do not expect to work were vague about their vacation plans. "Good off" was their most frequent answer.

Almost one in every four boys and 16 per cent of the girls acknowledged that vacation work is more necessary for them this year than last.

"With things as they are now, I'll have to give part of my summer earnings to the family," said Albert Salvatore, 18, of the Bronx, N.Y. "My father hasn't been working for some time now."

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find a permanent job. No senior year for me in September."

Fully 29 per cent of the youngsters plan to use vacation income to give their folks a hand with the family financing.

"Listen," said Fred Massoin, a Newark, N.J., 17-year-old, "what have I got to do with my money that's any near as important as my parents'?"

Girls Tell Boys To Work

"They haven't said anything yet about needing my salary this summer," said 17-year-old Sandy Roma of Garden City, N.Y. "But in case they do, it will be there for them."

Others feel their vacation income is theirs to have and to

hold.

"I can't spare my vacation money," said Gary Sperling, 17, of Philadelphia. "My folks can't need it as much as I do for expenses on my car and other things."

Bill Shatz, 18, of Amityville, N.Y., said flatly: "It's my money and they'll have to pry me away from it."

The boys—9 out of 10—feel both boys and girls should work during vacations. The girls—9 out of 10—feel the boys should work. Only about 6 out of 10 girls think girls should.

"Why shouldn't girls work along with boys?" asked 17-year-old Michael Stavy of Chicago. "They are just as strong—even if they

are not as intelligent."

But the girls feel they do more part-time work spread over the year. "I baby-sit all during the school year," said 16-year-old Elaine Budd of Syracuse. "That's enough for me."

"I earn some money while school is on, and I expect to continue in the summer," said Toni Moran, Miami Beach 16-year-old. "But a full-time job is not for me."

Ready For Responsibility

Many of the working girls, however, find work rewarding for its own sake.

Carol Curtis, 18, of New York, said: "The most marvelous time of my life was last year when I worked at a resort in the country
