 Quit crying in your beer, pal, the rest of the American League ain't dead after all.
 Nobody is seriously challenging those New York Yankees yet, but it looks as though the Chicago White Sox and Detroit Tigers are looking at playing patsy, and Kansas City and Cleveland are serious about escaping the second division.
 The A's, though 7 1/2 games behind New York, padded their second-place cushion to a full game yesterday — and they did it the hard way, coming from three runs back for a 4-3 victory over the Yankees. It was their first series sweep against New York since setting up shop in Kansas City in 1955.
 Kansas City now has won four in a row, two over New York. The A's are 2-1 vs. the Yankees so far, after losing 19 of 22 to them last year.

Tribe Moves Up
 The Indians moved into third with a 5-2 victory over the Baltimore Orioles, who have lost seven straight. The White Sox hammered Washington 13-3 behind Jim Wilson's three-hit pitching. The Tigers who had lost nine in a row, won their fifth straight, beating Boston 4-2.

Harris Homer Wins
 A pinch-hit two-run homer by Gail Harris won it in the ninth for the Tigers and Frank Lary (5-4), who gave 10 hits but blanked the Red Sox after Lou Berberet's first homer in the second inning. Willard Nixon lost his fifth. The Tigers tied it on Billy Martin's two-run single in the fifth.

Tito Francona drove in five runs with his first homer, a triple and a double for the Sox, who hit their highest run total since beating Cleveland 14-4 last July 5. The Sox, winning six of their last seven, chased loser Chuck Stobbs with five in the first, then scored five more in the second, three on Walt Droppa's home run.

They may have the best pitching in the league, but the failure to find a replacement for sore-armed Bob Buhl has been one reason the Milwaukee Braves haven't been able to take charge of that National League pennant race.
 Another reason is the San Francisco Giants.

Haney Has Troubles
 But the Giants wouldn't have much more than a percentage-point edge if Manager Fred Haney could find another starter who could get the job done.

He tried Gene Conley again last night, had to hoist the big right-hander in a comeback rally and finally wound up with a 7-4 defeat in 12 innings by the St. Louis Cardinals.

That plunked the Braves two games behind San Francisco again as the Giants scored three in the ninth for a 7-4 victory at Philadelphia. The Chicago Cubs rapped Cincinnati 6-4 with Ernie Banks cracking a pair of home runs. Los Angeles trimmed Pittsburgh 7-1.

Brave Bats Quiet
 The Braves, who left Buhl behind as they took off on a 16-game road trip today, were blanked after scoring three in the sixth for a 4-3 lead. The Cards tied it in the ninth on a walk and Don Blasingame's triple. Pinch hitter Hobie Landrith started the scoring in the three-run 12th with an RBI single with the bases loaded off Humberto Robinson, Milwaukee's fourth and losing hurler. Gene Green's fly ball and the Braves third error got the other two runs across.
 Billy Muffett won his first in relief of Larry Jackson.

A two-run homer by rookie Willie Kirkland capped the Giants' ninth-inning spurt after Ray Jablonski's two-run homer had given them a 4-4 tie in the seventh.

Banks Hits
 Banks, driving in three runs and taking the NL RBI led with 37, broke up Bob Purkey's perfect game with his first homer, setting off a three-run fifth. Then he counted two with his 11th homer as the Cubs scored three more in the sixth off losing reliever Johnny Klippstein.

The Dodgers counted a dozen hits off seven-game winner Bob Feller, who lost his third, and three relievers.

"AQUABATIC" SUB — The Skipjack, the Navy's newest nuclear submarine, promises to introduce new tactics into the art of undersea fighting. The 250-foot Skipjack, shaped like a shark, will be the fastest undersea craft ever built. An experimental sub, the Albacore, is the hull prototype for the Skipjack. The Albacore holds every sub speed and maneuverability record in the world. Sketched above by NEA artist John Lane, the Skipjack is shown making an aircraft-type pass at an "enemy" sub. The sub's driver (inset) will be called a "pilot." He will use a "joy stick" for controls, and be able to direct his sub in "aquatic" maneuvers like a fighter pilot. Performance figures on the Skipjack are secret, but it is believed capable of doing 33 miles per hour submerged. Pitted against the conventional Russian sub of today the Skipjack would be like a jet fighter attacking a slow-moving cargo plane.

In the other league tilt, Yakima edged Eugene, 4-3. Tri-City's marathon 3 1/2 hour game with Lewiston finally ended when the Bronces Kipper walked a pair of batters and, after striking out the next two Bronces, gave up singles to Ray Stotler and Don Whitcomb, which let in two runs.

Starts Out Right
 Lewiston started out right, holding a 4-0 lead until Tri-City's Braves came through with five tallies in the sixth frame. Vern Pivers slugged a homerun to give the Braves a pair of runs in the seventh. That was the extent of the scoring for Tri-City until the lucky 14th.

A record home crowd of 6,731 watched the Bronces lose their ninth NWL game.

The third place Yakima Bears nearly fumbled in their drive to overtake the loop leaders. They held a comfortable 4-1 lead over Eugene until the last of the ninth

when the Emeralds' Bob Turk drove in two runs on a single. But Yakima stanchoned any further Eugene scoring threat and picked up its eighth straight victory.

A driving five-run push by Salem in the last three innings almost overtook Wenatchee. The rally lost steam, however, and the Chiefs won it on the strength of two big innings.
