Administration Releases Added \$300 Million

WASHINGTON (AP)—The administration Tuesday released an additional \$300 million dollars to carry out the government's anti-recession housing program.

Without the new allocation, the program would have run out of funds in about two weeks.

The Budget Bureau made the money available to the Federal National Mortgage Association to buy government-backed home loans.

FNMA can commit itself to buy up to \$300 million in new loans, but not more than \$150 million on homes not yet under construction.

In an effort to revive home building as a counter to the recession, Congress made available up to one billion dollars for FNMA purchases of FHA and VA mortgages.

The administration allocated only \$50 million when the law went into effect last month, however, and \$250 million of this already has been committed.

With this second allocation, the Budget Bureau still has authority from Congress to release an additional \$400 million dollars in the future.

\$290,000 In Cash Found In Cellar Of Rancher-Oilman

HOUSTON, Tex. (AP)—The late James M. West, multimillionaire rancher-oilman who liked to give away silver dollars, left an estimated \$290,000 in cash in a hidden cellar of his mansion here.

Atty. Robert H. Parsley said the existence of the hidden treasure, in silver dollars and smaller coins, had been kept secret for fear of prowlers in the West home.

An armored car was reported to have made seven trips in carrying the money to the Texas National Bank, where it was piled 5 feet high in an area of 8 by 10 feet in a counting room.

West, a diabetic, died Dec. 18, at the age of 54. An inventory of his estate has not been filed, but unofficial estimates of its value run as high as 100 million dollars.

His idiosyncrasies were many. In addition to handing out silver dollars, West frequently rode night patrol with Houston policemen.

His home and his fleet of cars, which once included 41 Cadillacs, had elaborate radio equipment. His home also had disappearing doors and other trick devices.

Guards were reported to have crawled under the house to reach the hidden cellar where the money was found in cotton bags, paper sacks, barrels and gallon cans.

Senators Reject Move To Revise Jobless Pay Bill

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Senate rejected Wednesday a move to revise an emergency jobless pay bill so as to require all states to provide benefits for an additional 16 weeks.

The proposed amendment, offered by Sen. John F. Kennedy (D-Mass.), was defeated 57-27 on a roll call vote.

This was the third setback suffered by senators who say they want to strengthen the House-passed bill to authorize federal advances to the states for a temporary extension of unemployment benefits. The Eisenhower administration has endorsed the measure.

A number of other proposed changes in the bill still remained to be considered before a final vote.

Kennedy's amendment would have permitted unemployed workers who have exhausted their benefit rights to draw compensation at the prevailing state rate for an additional 16 weeks.

It would have applied to the unemployed in all states. The House-passed bill authorizes each state, if it wishes, to extend by as much as 50 per cent the number of weeks in which insured workers could draw jobless benefits. More than half the states now pay benefits for 26 weeks.

Unitarians Favor Birth Control

BOSTON (AP)—The American Unitarian Assn. has adopted a resolution favoring birth control toward solving world overpopulation problems.

Passage came with only scattered opposition at the closing session of the association's annual meeting Tuesday night.

The vote followed a statement from the floor by Mrs. Alison Matthews of Olympia, Wash., that since Roman Catholics oppose birth control, "it is the duty of Unitarians" who disagree to take a public stand approving it.

Donald Harrington of New York told the delegates that "the Roman Catholic Church is not opposed to birth control; it is opposed to certain methods. We ought to keep that in mind."

The Rev. Stephen H. Fritchman, former editor of the Unitarian Register, declared:

"I am hearing rumors of religious prejudice here in a Unitarian meeting for the first time in 30 years. We should remember that only a few minutes ago we passed a resolution against discrimination."

Controversial Painting To Give Portland Eyeful

PORTLAND (AP)—The calendar art lovers of a generation ago will be able to see the most controversial painting of the pre-World War 1 era—"September Morn"—at the Portland Art Museum.

The painting of a slender nude girl, made famous by the attacks of Anthony Comstock, will go on display June 1.

Museum officials said they expected no raised eyebrows.

They also expected little critical praise of the painting, by the French artist, Paul Chabas, as a great work of art.

"It is more important as a social document," said Max Sullivan, museum director.

Comstock, who saw the painting as a threat to New York's morals, campaigned against its display in 1913. It has been one of the best known of paintings since that time.

Its owner is the New York Metropolitan Museum of Art, which values it at \$30,000, and which arranged for its display on a nationwide tour.

Strawberries Begin To Ripen, Pickers Lacking

HILLSBORO (AP)—Berries are beginning to ripen on Washington County's 5,000 acres of strawberry fields and there are no pickers in sight right now to get them to market.

This week a thousand pickers were needed and only 150 were found.

At the peak the county will need 20,000 pickers, said Alvin Elkins, office manager for the state employment service.

The 5,000 acres of strawberries is believed the biggest single unit acreage of the berries anywhere in the United States.

Three schools — at Beaver, Cloverdale and Sand Lake — have closed for the season and 34 youngsters were recruited from south of Tillamook Monday. They were transported 78 miles to the fields of Louis Malensky.

The berry crop this year is expected to be the biggest single crop of any kind in Washington County's history, Elkins said, valued at more than 4 million dollars.

Two major processing plants posted 12 cents a pound Monday morning for stemmed berries delivered in receiving stations. That is 4 cents higher than last year's starting price.

Growers said Monday that in non-irrigated areas, rain is needed to bring the berries to quick ripening.

Adjudication Set For Heinline School Of Music

Recitals and public adjudication ceremonies will be held for the Heinline School of Music June 2 and 3.

Adjudications will be held at the new educational building of the First Methodist Church both days from 9 a.m. to 6 p.m. Dorothy Doll, national dean of curriculum for the National Guild of Piano Teachers from San Antonio, Texas, will be adjudicator for 25 pupils, most of whom will receive national honors.

An ensemble program will be presented Tuesday at 8 p.m., when all pupils will participate in group work. A party will follow the program.

Presbyterians Form One Church

PITTSBURGH (AP)—In a pouring rain, two colorfully garbed processions of Presbyterians met at a Pittsburgh street corner Wednesday and joined hands to form one church.

"Praise God from whom all blessings flow," they sang as the lines of representatives of the Presbyterian Church in the U.S.A. and the United Presbyterian Church.

Their union in the new United Presbyterian Church in the U.S.A. reunited two denominations torn apart in a dimly remembered quarrel of long ago.

"We extend the right hand of fellowship and join hands and hearts in the merging of our two great churches," said the Rev. Dr. Robert N. Montgomery, moderator of the U. S. church, as he clasped hands with the Rev. Dr. Harold R. Martin, moderator of the U.S.A. church.

Then, side by side, the two groups marched into the big auditorium of Syria Mosque, Pittsburgh's shrines center, to seal their union in worship and song.

The merger creates a new church of more than three million members, fourth largest among American Protestant groups.
