**UAW Seeks Break In Deadlock Over Wage Demands**  
DETROIT (AP)—The United Auto Workers Union sought to break a deadlock in negotiations with Ford and Chrysler today while completing plans for some 300,000 General Motors employees to work without a contract.

UAW members at three GM plants worked without a contract yesterday. Others will do the same in all 125 company plants Monday. Contracts at Ford and Chrysler expire Sunday midnight. The contract at GM expired Thursday midnight.

The industry's big three have offered to extend the old contracts two years. The UAW refused this. The GM extension would have included built-in wage increases totaling 16 cents an hour—a 7-cent productivity increase immediately, a 2-cent cost-of-living allowance increase immediately and a 7-cent productivity increase next year.

GM said this week that its 10,000 non-union employees would get both the immediate increases. It also said salaried personnel would get the equivalent.

**Youths Turn Holiday River Cruise Into Riot**  
PENNSYLVANIA, N.J. (AP)—Fired up by alcohol, youthful rioters turned a holiday cruise down the Delaware River into pandemonium yesterday. They smashed equipment aboard a crowded excursion boat and injured 15 passengers.

The crew of "The State of Pennsylvania" had to turn fire hoses on the brawlers during the 35-mile trip downriver from Philadelphia. Twenty state troopers and local policemen were waiting here for the vessel, a two-decker jammed with the gunwales with 1,880 excursionists.

They arrested 34 male passengers, about half of them Negro and half white. Police at first thought the melee was a race riot but later said the fighters were egged on by alcohol, not bias.

## Henry Holloway Pleads Guilty, Put On Probation

Henry A. Holloway, 23, Winston, was placed on probation for a two-year period Thursday after pleading guilty to a charge of receiving and concealing stolen property.

Circuit Judge Charles S. Woodrich dismissed a burglary indictment against Holloway, who then pleaded guilty to the lesser charge. Three other men charged in criminal indictments pleaded guilty Thursday. They were Henry James Burns, 23, and Robert Lee Porter, 22, both of Roseburg, and James Edwin Vanslyke, 40, Hot Springs, Ark.

Sentences were postponed by Woodrich until Monday morning. A local truck driver, Porter was cited for entering an automobile with intent to steal. The car belonged to Ted Powell, Roseburg. A wheel and a tubeless tire were taken the night of May 14.

Vanslyke was charged with malicious destruction of personal property and Burns with burglary in a dwelling.

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**Jets Of Lava Spurt From Volcano In Azores**  
LISBON, Azores (AP)—Jets of lava from the De Capelinhos volcano spurted 12,000 feet into the air Friday while Faial Island was still digging out from another series of quakes and eruptions.

Ashes fell on some areas badly damaged when Calderia volcano in the center of the island spewed forth ash and lava for 10 days earlier this month.

De Capelinhos has been quiet since last December, when it damaged two villages badly. The current volcanic activity began last fall when a submarine volcano off Faial erupted and formed a new island.

The island sank beneath the Atlantic 30 days later.

**Language Riots Rage In East, North Ceylon**  
COLOMBO, Ceylon (AP)—Language riots raged in eastern and northern Ceylon Saturday. The government reported guns and ammunition stolen in a raid in northern Ceylon and three persons killed as police moved against rioting mobs in the east.

Premier Solomon Bandaranaike ordered 28 persons taken into preventive custody in this capital. The nation has been under a state of emergency the past five days as the result of Sinhalese clashes with the Tamil minority.

**CAR KILLS DEER**  
Ken Salmonson, 983 NE Knoll St., Roseburg, reported to state police Friday that he hit and killed a deer on the North Umpqua Highway approximately one mile past the weighing scales. Police took the deer to the Douglas County Home.

**BODY RECOVERED**  
COQUILLE (AP)—The body of Mrs. Wayne Lamb, 28, of Bridge, was recovered from the Coquille River, 1½ miles downstream from Bridge Friday.

She had been missing since March 21. At that time footprints believed to be hers were found, leading from her house to the river bank. She had been under a doctor's care prior to her disappearance.

## Huge Douglas DC8 Jetliner's Maiden Flight Successful

LONG BEACH, Calif. (AP)—"Far and away the finest first flight I ever made."

That was how the pilot felt about the maiden flight of the Douglas DC8 Jetliner, capable of carrying 176 persons, across the United States in 4½ hours.

The four-engine DC8 flew 2 hours and 5 minutes Friday. It thundered off Municipal Airport here, cruised over the ocean and landed at Edwards Air Force Base, Calif.

After the flight, pilot A. G. Heimcringer, 48, said: "Of all the Douglas transports I have flown, the DC8 is the greatest. The plane handled so well we were able to accomplish much more than we had originally programmed."

The first DC8 represents a quarter of a billion-dollar investment over a three-year period by its manufacturer, Douglas Aircraft Co. Douglas plans to start delivering the Jetliners to airlines the middle of next year. It has 700 million dollars worth of orders from 17 airlines for 138 DC8s.

The DC8 has a top-rated speed of 600 m.p.h. It flew about 300 m.p.h. Friday. It has a maximum range of 3,500 miles. Its wingspan is 129 feet 9 inches, length 150½ feet and tail height 42 feet.

## Eisenhower Bangs Golf Ball Hard

GETTYSBURG, Pa. (AP)—President Eisenhower banged a ball about 200 yards down the fairway Friday at the start of an early round of golf.

The President was joined at the Gettysburg Country Club by his son, Army Maj. John Eisenhower, and an old friend, retired Brig. Gen. Arthur S. Nevins.

Ending the Memorial Day weekend at his farm estate, Eisenhower also was accompanied to the club by his 10-year-old grandson, David Eisenhower.

As the men started out, David stayed behind with the club pro, Dick Steinhilber, for a golf lesson. "Get your hands blistered a little," Eisenhower played the 18 holes in two hours and 35 minutes.

Eisenhower arrived at his farm by helicopter from Washington late Friday and got in a fast nine holes before dinner.

**Soldier Saves Three, Then Is Electrocuted**  
AFTON, Okla. (AP)—A young soldier, ignoring warnings for his personal safety by bystanders, rescued three men from a wrecked and burning car Friday.

After he pulled the third man out of the car and up an embankment, the soldier touched a high-voltage line knocked down by the wrecked car and was electrocuted. He was William Howard Britt, 21, Cashmere, Wash., who stopped to aid the motorists while enroute from Ft. Ord, Calif., to Ft. Monmouth, N.J.

The tragedy was witnessed by Britt's bride of less than three months, Joanne, 18.

The wrecked car had gone out of control 250 feet and down a 10-foot embankment before catching fire.

**Weather Outlook Enough To Wet Holiday Spirits**

**Russia Replies To Ike On Policing Bomb Tests**  
WASHINGTON (AP)—Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev replied Saturday to President Eisenhower's week-old proposal for an immediate meeting of scientists to work out ways of policing an atomic test suspension agreement.

It was understood that Khrushchev's response in general was favorable to getting the proposed talks started at Geneva in the immediate future.

The State Department said the three-page letter to Eisenhower was being translated and would be sent to Eisenhower. The President is spending the weekend at Gettysburg, Pa.

## Fire Breaks Out In Unoccupied Home At Winston

Fire broke out Thursday in an unoccupied house at Winston, state police report.

The blaze was discovered by Ronald Elliott, who lives nearby. He kept the fire under control with a garden hose. The Winston-Dillard Rural Fire Department answered the call.

The four-room wood frame house is located at 4957 SW Holgate St. The fire is believed to have started from soaked oil or kerosene rags, firemen said. Several residents of the neighborhood observed a vehicle leaving the scene shortly before the fire was noticed, according to state police reports.

Approximately \$20 damage was done to a chair, wall and rug, firemen added. The blaze started by an oil stove in the living room. Cause of the fire is being investigated.

## Custom-Ingrained Bus Segregation Continues In City

NEW ORLEANS (AP)—Custom-ingrained bus segregation continued, with few exceptions, in this Deep South metropolis Saturday despite a federal court order.

The only incident reported in connection with the U.S. District Court order to end enforcement of state segregation laws on public transportation was a cross-burning on the lawn of the judge who signed the order Friday.

Most Negro bus and streetcar riders continued, as they had by custom in public transportation since decades before the Civil War, to seat themselves from the rear, leaving the front of the vehicles to whites.

A newsman saw only two Negroes break the custom during the ride. Deadline for responses to the court order is Tuesday. Such responses may be made by calling Miss Elizabeth Randall at OR 3-4438.

**Slack Funeral Set For Sunday**  
Funeral services for Mrs. Leona Savilla Slack of Sutherlin will be held Sunday at 2 p. m. in the Sutherlin Neighborhood Church of Christ.

Mrs. Slack, a News-Review correspondent, died at a Roseburg hospital Wednesday. Survivors include her husband, Brittain of Sutherlin; one son, Edgar of San Diego, Calif.; two brothers, Laverne Bamber of Portland and Clint Bamber of Sutherlin; and three grandchildren.

She was 63 years old. Mrs. Slack was born July 21, 1894, at Joplin, Mo., and moved to Sutherlin in 1910. She was married Nov. 24, 1912 to Brittain Slack at Sutherlin.

Interment will follow the church services at the Valley View Cemetery in Sutherlin. The Rev. Lloyd Wright will officiate. Stearns and Little Mortuary of Sutherlin is in charge of arrangements.

**North Atlantic Treaty Forces Start Maneuvers**  
PARIS (AP)—Annual maneuvers of North Atlantic Treaty forces in Europe will be held Tuesday through Thursday over an area ranging from Norway to Turkey.

The supreme commander of Atlantic alliance forces, U.S. Gen. Lauris Norstad, announced that the exercise, dubbed Full Play, will involve all the air force units assigned to the allied command. Also participating will be the national air defense forces of Norway, Denmark, Belgium, Holland, France, Italy, Greece and Turkey.

There will also be limited participation by army and naval forces within command.

**More Rioting Reported In Eastern Ceylon**  
COLOMBO, Ceylon (AP)—Communal rioting worsened today in eastern Ceylon, where three persons were killed as police moved against Sinhalese demonstrators harassing the Tamil minority.

Authorities said the disturbances had also taken a violent turn in Ceylon's northern province. Rioters there put the torch to a customs house and a ferry boat.

**Cottage Grove Motorist Given Fine, Jail Term**  
A Cottage Grove motorist was fined \$150 and given a five-day jail sentence Wednesday by Municipal Judge Randolph Sincum after pleading guilty to a drunk driving charge.

Lloyd M. Cox was arrested by police here on March 20 and posted a \$250 bond pending trial in municipal court.

**HUSKIES WIN**  
SEATTLE (AP)—Washington's tall and talented Husky crew won a ticket to England's Henley Regatta Saturday with a narrow victory over the University of British Columbia in a 2,000-meter sprint on Lake Washington. Oregon State trailed in third place.

## Refresher Course Will Be 'Feeler' For Future Plans

Tentative feelers are being put out this year to determine possibilities of success for a summer refresher course and credit course program for high schoolers in the Roseburg area.

A summer course in mathematics will be taught in the high school if enough response is shown. The program would be made available to any high school pupil within easy radius of Roseburg. It has been approved by the Roseburg School administration.

Teacher for the courses in Algebra I and geometry will be Mrs. Doris Neely, Oakland High School mathematics teacher. The mathematics summer school would be conducted each week during the morning hours. The Roseburg High School texts will be used and classes will be taught in Roseburg High classrooms. Cost of the course will be \$30 for the term which starts June 16 to July 25.

The courses will be designed to serve as a review in preparation for college mathematics, to serve as a makeup course for credit to be applied toward graduation and finally, merely as a refresher.

If this one-course session proves successful, the program might be expanded in future years to other now being carried on in Eugene, subjects. Similar programs are Portland and Salem.

SMILEY, Tex. (AP)—A car-truck collision early Saturday snuffed out the lives of four teenage boys.

The four were in an auto which collided with a truck on the outskirts of this South Texas town. State Highway Patrolman O. L. Whaley said the auto, driven at high speed, passed an auto, then met the truck. The truck driver swerved, Whaley said, and the auto crashed into its side.

The truck driver, Sabino Torres, 48, was not injured. The four dead, all of Nixon, were Jesse Leal, 18, Miguel Fonseca, 18, Manuel Sandoval, 18, and Bonifacio Infante, 15.

## Highway Projects Bids Are Opened

SALEM (AP)—The Oregon Highway Commission opened bids on 20 projects Thursday, including the largest grading job in its history.

The huge job is for grading 3.71 miles of the Hooskanaden Creek-Thomas Creek section of the Oregon Coast Highway, eight miles north of Brookings.

The apparent low bid of \$2,544,385 was submitted by Morrison-Knudsen Co., Seattle. There were six other bidders.

The project is part of the reconstruction of the Oregon Coast Highway between Gold Beach and Brookings. The 1957 Legislature authorized \$12,500,000 worth of bonds to pay for this work.

The bid opening marked the start of the commission's new policy of opening all bids in Salem, rather than in Portland. Contracts for these jobs will be awarded at the commission meeting in Portland, June 19.

**Gen. De Gaulle Agrees To Take Over As Premier**

In the small, exclusive Hotel La Perouse where De Gaulle has set up headquarters near the famed Arc de Triomphe, security troops ranged the hotel.

Political sources said De Gaulle reassured the politicians he would bring the French civilian and military insurgents in Algeria back under the law of the Republic. Paris newspapers predicted De Gaulle would fly to Algeria.

De Gaulle also guaranteed that he would make no move against civil liberties in France.

He also said he would respect the treaties which France has signed—specifically the North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO) pact, the six-nation European common market and the atomic development program.

In the buzzing corridors of the National Assembly, the names of a prospective cabinet began to spread.

A De Gaulle supporter said the general intended to name an old hand as foreign minister, Catholic Pompidu, a Republican movement (MRP) Deputy Georges Bidault.

## Three Found Dead In Wreckage Of Light Airplane

BAKERSFIELD, Calif. (AP)—Three men were found dead Saturday in the wreckage of a light plane they were flying in a holiday race from Hayward, Calif., to Las Vegas, Nevada.

The Kern County sheriff's office said the bodies of William H. Hooker Jr., 42, Hayward; Donald Lee Carter, 28, Hayward; and John Francis Nausby, 45, Oakland, Calif., were found in the wreckage plane in mountains 40 miles south of Bakersfield.

Hooker was piloting the plane on the second leg of the aerial race sponsored by the 30-30 Club when his Cessna 170 apparently developed engine trouble, sheriff's investigators said.

The plane was unreported after refueling at Bakersfield and heading for Palmdale, Calif. The sheriff's aerial squadron began a search Friday afternoon and the wreckage was spotted about 6 p. m.

## 6 Persons Killed In Headon Crash

MOUNT VERNON, N.Y. (AP)—Six persons—including a driver who had been warned about speeding shortly before—were killed early Saturday in a head-on collision of two automobiles.

The other five perished in flaming wreckage of the second car. The collision occurred when the other car veered across the dividing line, officers said.

The driver given the warning was identified as Llewellyn C. Byrd, 30-year-old Negro of Greenwich, Conn. Before the crash he had picked up three hitchhikers. They were critically injured.

The others killed were in a car with New Jersey license plates. After a check police tentatively identified them as:

Mrs. and Mrs. Vincent Muccia, and their 12-year-old daughter, Barbara, of Ridgefield, N. J.; Muccia's father, Nicholas, 70, and Antoinette De Biase, 12, of Ridgefield.

Police at Greenwich said an officer there halted Byrd about 4:30 a.m. and warned him to proceed without giving him a ticket. The crash occurred about an hour later 15 miles southwest of Greenwich.
