Sutherlin Folks Have High Regard For Their Schools

A recent poll taken by University of Oregon students indicated that Sutherlin citizens have high opinions of their schools.

Of the 184 persons polled, 21 rated the schools "excellent," 44 "good," 44 "fair," 44 "poor," 15 "no opinion." Eighteen did not comment.

A high regard for instructors at the schools was the reason given by 35 persons for their high estimates. Others listed curriculum or buildings and facilities. A few liked the report cards.

"Poor discipline" or an insufficiency of "the three R's" were reasons for low ratings cited by several respondents.

About one-third of those polled said they never had attended school activities. More than one-half said they desire a college education for their children.

More than four out of five said they liked to live in Sutherlin. Chief community improvements suggested included better streets and sidewalks, recreational facilities — especially for young people — and more diversified industry.

Although the poll covered many walks of life, most of the women interviewed were housewives and most of the men were connected with the lumber business.
