

Enlarged Exam Set For Drivers Of School Buses

Requirements for school bus drivers have been established by the state departments of Motor Vehicles and Education, according to County School Supt. Kenneth F. Barneburg.

While some of the requirements remain the same, new ones have been set up. Effective Nov. 1, all school bus drivers must have a School Bus Driver's license which will be issued by the Department of Motor Vehicles.

Drivers may appear before a driver's license examiner after July 15 to file applications and complete the required examinations. Under the old regulations school bus drivers had to have a chauffeur license and a health certificate, showing freedom from tuberculosis.

The examination will consist of a written test on driver and chauffeur regulations as outlined in the drivers manual. This requirement is the same as in the past. In addition, drivers will have to pass a written test on school bus regulations as outlined in the school bus drivers manual. The manual is not new but drivers have not had to pass an examination on it before.

After the applicant satisfactorily completes the tests, he is issued a certificate of examination by the Department of Motor Vehicles. Applicants will also be given a vision and driving test, as before. The driving test may be taken with any type vehicle.

Physical Test Included
Applicants will be given a certificate concerning their physical condition and instructions for its completion by a physician of the driver's choice. The physician may be designated by the school district or bus contractor.

The State Board of Health will determine what is to be required on the physical examination. Before, the only health requirement for drivers was a certificate showing freedom from tuberculosis, but the new physical examination will be much more extensive, Barneburg said.

After the written and driving examinations are passed and the health certificate is filled out, no further action is necessary on the part of the bus driver.

Hit Composer, With 'Blue Caps,' Dated At Lindy's

"Be Bop A Lula" will echo at Lindy's, south of Roseburg on Highway 99BR, Thursday night when Gene Vincent and his "Blue Caps" make a scheduled appearance at 9 p.m.

Vincent, the Capitol recording star who has turned out five records which have sold a million or more copies, has just returned from a barn-storming tour of Australia and an appearance on the Ed Sullivan Show. He appeared at Lindy's last fall.

The 21-year-old rock and roll idol wrote "Be Bop A Lula," his first hit, aboard ship during his return from Italy two years ago. He and the "Blue Caps" appeared in the Jayne Mansfield movie, "The Girl Can't Help It," while sales of the record still were booming.

Since then, he has appeared in four other movies and waxed "Dance to the Beat," "Lotta Lovin'" and two other big hits. His latest movie, "Hot Rod Rock," still is to be released.

Shortly after he appeared in "The Girl Can't Help It," he was involved in a motorcycle accident. Although he wears a leg brace as an aftermath of the mishap, he is said to be as lively as ever on stage.

Under contract with Ed McMahon and a Dallas, Tex., booking firm, he currently is on an extensive personal appearance tour of the U. S. and Canada.

Legislative Committees Now Busy Puzzling Over Problems Which Face 1959 Lawmakers

SALEM — State department and legislative committees are busy dealing with problems for the Legislature, which meets here next Jan. 12.

It already is certain that the next Legislature will have more and tougher problems than ever before. The list should be enough to discourage even the most optimistic lawmakers.

The most difficult problem is balancing the budget. There just won't be enough revenue during the 1959-60 biennium to finance current state activities.

The agenda being prepared by the departments and interim committees calls for greatly added costs of government.

For instance, the state Board of Control will ask for 19½ million dollars for institution buildings. The state Board of Higher Education will ask for 20 million for college and university buildings, plus more millions to take care of the increasing enrollment.

Would Up Gas Tax
The Highway Commission wants to increase gas taxes one cent a gallon and add \$5 to the annual \$10 cost of license plates. The commission says it must have this increase to finance Oregon's share of the interstate highway program.

Oregon employers are certain to get higher payroll taxes. The tax isn't large enough to pay the jobless benefits.

The public school lobbyists will demand an increase in the basic school support fund.

Those are the more expensive items facing the 1959 Legislature. Estimating many millions of dollars, they make talk of a state tax reduction sound rather futile.

But there are some other big problems being considered now for presentation to the Legislature.

These include putting the state into the power business, how to help people over 45 years old get jobs, elimination of many boards and commissions, abandonment of Oregon Technical Institute, combining the fish and game commissions, reform of the courts to speed up justice, and establishment of state junior colleges.

Rural School Issue
There are many more controversial issues than that, such as what to do about the rural school law which is causing hardship in some districts.

It seems as though all the issues faced by Legislators in the past 20 years, plus some new ones, are being dumped into the next session.

The state Board of Education might have news at its June 12 meeting to make the school children and the farmers very unhappy.

It will consider a recommendation by a committee of school administrators and teachers that the schools maintain school for at least 180 days a year. The requirement now is 170 days.

Generally, the board accepts the recommendations of its professional committees.

The problem in the Willamette Valley is: How should the extra days be added?

If extra time is added at the end of the year, the strawberry growers object. They need the school kids to harvest their crops. If school is started earlier in the fall, the bean growers are hurt.

Spring vacation could be eliminated. But many schools have their spring vacation during the state high school basketball tournament. The kids who go to tournament would take a dim view of cutting out that vacation.

The school administrators heard all of these objections before they made their recommendation. They feel that the schools should be open longer to provide more education.

TACOMA (AP) — Bennett Cerf, New York publisher-humorist-televison panelist, ranged from a defense of the pun to a dig at the secretary of state in his address to the 70th College of Puget Sound graduating class.

Cerf was honored Friday with an honorary doctor of literature degree. Also receiving honorary degrees were W.W. Kilworth of Tacoma, chairman of the board of trustees, doctor of laws; and Norton Clapp, Tacoma-Seattle financier, philanthropist and civic leader, doctor of civil law.

The pun, said Cerf, has long been slighted. It is not intended to draw laughter, he said, only a deep groan from the audience.

"I wish our secretary of state would smile, instead of always looking as if he had a stomach ache," the humorist added.

"Winston Churchill once said Dulles was the only bull who carried his own china shop."
