



Navy To Continue Trying To Place Moons Into Orbit

WASHINGTON (AP) — Despite four failures in five attempts, the Navy will continue trying to blast Vanguard satellites into orbit.

This is the blunt answer given at the Pentagon to inquiries as to why the Vanguard project isn't dropped in favor of more satellite launchings with the Army's Jupiter-C rocket combine.

Although the Army has succeeded in two of its three tries at putting a satellite in orbit, the Defense Department says it has two big reasons for sticking with Vanguards.

They are the best vehicles available — when they work; and the country requires a greater return on the millions already invested in the program.

Actually, the Army probably will have one more try at putting up an Explorer satellite to join the two already in orbit. But right now the Army is more interested in further penetrations of space, such as probing of the moon, than in hurling partly-instrumented satellites into orbit around the earth.

The Navy, administering the Vanguard project for the U.S. contribution in the International Geophysical Year program, already has poured at least 110 million dollars into the development and preliminary testing of the Vanguard.

Six or seven additional Vanguards with fully instrumented satellite spheres, each costing about one million dollars, already have been made or are under construction.

He and Allen Parker, 31, originally were charged with first degree murder in the death of Robert Holloway, 44, whose body was found last Dec. 15 in an abandoned well near Vernonia.

Fish Packers Accept Offer

ASTORIA (AP) — Members of the United Fish Packing Workers Union chopped their demands Monday night and voted to return to work for a 3-cent hourly pay increase and some improvement in holiday pay.

Some 800 members of the union walked off the job May 23 and 25 to back up demands for a 7½-cent hourly increase. The workers abided by a contract provision, however, which outlaws a strike without sufficient notice to prevent spoilage of fish on hand.

The new contract is retroactive to May 1, the termination date of the old contract.

John Janosco, international representative for the union, said the vote to accept management's offer was 325 to 32.

The union was to meet Tuesday to go through the formality of voting to end the strike. The 14 Columbia River fish processing plants planned to be back in operation by Wednesday.

The increase will raise workers' base pay to \$1.59 an hour. They also are receiving a seven-cent cost-of-living increment, making their pay \$1.66 an hour.

ST. LEONARDS-ON-SEA, England (AP) — Mrs. Ella Petry reported Tuesday a chicken had hatched from an egg she carried in her bosom for 21 days.

The chick weighs slightly more than an ounce. It has been named Bald Eagle, after one of the favorites in the Epsom Derby.

Mrs. Petry, 48, said the whole thing started as a gag in the bar of her neighborhood pub. The proprietor's son had a startling egg which he wanted hatched. Mrs. Petry put it down the front of her dress, but two days later it broke.

"Everyone said I couldn't hatch out an egg," she said. "So I went out and bought a pullet's egg from

a breeder. I carried it night and day in a cotton lined wire holder next to my skin.

"Then last night while the proprietor was saying 'time' the chick began tapping. It made its way out of the egg in the presence of a dozen witnesses."

Mrs. Petry said she will raise the chick as a household pet.
