The plea was for 3,000 harvest workers at the Washington County labor office in Hillsboro, and other requests ranged on down to 400.

The labor shortage is worst in

Washington and eastern Multnomah counties where growers are waiting early for the end of school.

Some Multnomah County and parochial schools close this week and more pickers will be available when Portland school close late next week.
