DETROIT (AP) — So maybe the women in St. Helens, Ore., can't change their own flat tires. But here's what they can — and did — do:

Got a new main street; developed the town's only park; converted a tavern into a boy's athletic club (with labor and businessmen as honorary members); set up a community center and organized a facelift campaign in the town of 3,000.

It takes a 28-pound scrapbook to list it all and the ladies got a man to carry it Thursday to the 67th convention of the General Federation of Women's Clubs, where it won the \$10,000 grand prize in the community achievement contest.

3 Clubs Join Forces
Three women's clubs joined forces in St. Helens to win the \$5,000 first prize for clubs of 75 or more members and the sweepstakes award of \$5,000 in the international competition which grants \$31,500 in prizes through the Sears Roebuck Foundation.

Announcing the winners, Federation President Robert L. C. Prout of Wakefield, Mich., remarked, "It's the kind of contest nobody loses."

For example — the Wild Rose, Wis., Woman's Club won \$5,000 as first prize for clubs of under 75 members. Its community drive built a public library, a migrant recreation center and lined the streets with rose bush plantings in the town of 582.

What's the secret of such achievement? "Hard, hard work."

Unity Drive Scene Hotbed Of Moslems

CONSTANTINE, Algeria (AP) — Premier Charles de Gaulle carried his drive for Algerian unity into this hotbed of Moslem Nationalist resistance Thursday. But already rebel spokesmen abroad were rejecting his offer.

Nationalist sources in neighboring Tunisia said there will be no halting of the 3½-year-old rebellion.

In Cairo, spokesmen for the Algerian National Liberation Front (FLN) said they could not accept De Gaulle's program for integrating Algeria's European and Moslem populations with equal rights and equal votes for all. The front has spearheaded the revolt. It demands independence as the price of peace.

Speaks to Crowd
De Gaulle spoke for five minutes from the balcony of the municipal theater here to a massed and cheering throng of 7,500, about half of them Moslems.

He declared that "even those who were swept up in the flame of despair" — the fighters for Algerian independence — should rally to his program.

Shouts of "De Gaulle, De Gaulle" were followed quickly by equally massive shouts for Jacques Soustelle, the Gaullist deputy and political strongman of the Algerian insurrection who was not named a member of the De Gaulle cabinet.

Soustelle, standing at the right of De Gaulle, waved his arms in an effort to calm the crowd. De Gaulle frowned.

Later, in the northeast coastal city of Bone, a crowd of more than 100,000 cheered De Gaulle as he waved through the street. He was followed by the crowd and made the now familiar "V" sign with both arms raised upward.

Equal Rights For All
The Premier told a crowd of about 100,000 in Algiers last night that all residents of this North African country are "characteristically American."

Television citations went to the programs "This is the Life," filmed by the Lutheran Church, Missouri Synod, and the Christian Brothers; "Captain Kangaroo, children's; "Youth Wants to Know," youth participation, and "Father Knows Best," American way of life.

Radio winners were Dr. Ralph Sockman's National Radio Pulse (NBC); Art Linkletter's Houseparty (CBS); Youth Wants to Know (NBC); and One Man's Family (NBC).

**Coast Guardsmen
Stop Pacifists**
HONOLULU (AP) — Coast Guardsmen stopped pacifists from sailing the ketch Golden Rule toward the Atomic Energy Commission's test area again Wednesday — this time on the high seas.

Albert Smith Bigelow, Cox, Conn., the Golden Rule's skipper, was arrested before the ketch sailed on a charge that he conspired to violate a federal court injunction against the sailing.

William Huntington, St. James, Long Island, N.Y., returned to Honolulu, providing a navigator just in time to get the 30-foot vessel under way.

George Willoughby, Blackwood Terrace, N.J., one of the crew, said the ketch was well outside the three-mile territorial limit when the Coast Guard caught up. Huntington was arrested on the return to Honolulu.

Because of the doctrine of hot pursuit, it made no difference that the ketch was nabbed outside the limit of United States jurisdiction, said Asst. U.S. Atty. Edgar D. Crumacker. The doctrine holds that a criminal can be pursued across a border and that his capture in such cases is legal.

City police Wednesday morning cited Roseburg truck driver, Kenneth Howard Miller, 50, for following too closely in a line of traffic following a truck-car collision that did only minor damage.

Officers reported his pickup truck hit the rear of a car driven by Mrs. Retha Irene Batson, 46, of Box 604, Roseburg. She also was driving south on Stephens St. and had stopped to make a left turn onto Shambrook Ave.

No injuries were reported. The front end of the truck and rear end of the Batson vehicle were damaged slightly, police reported.

Cuts Foot With Mower**
Judy Hankins, 3½-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Hankins of Coos Bay, was admitted to Douglas Community Hospital Wednesday with a foot injury.

She was visiting with her mother in Roseburg. Four toes on her right foot were lacerated after she cut her foot with a lawn mower, hospital authorities said.

**Power Failure Blamed
For Sub Being Rammed**
HONOLULU (AP) — The executive officer of the submarine Stickleback says its own power failure on a dive was responsible for its being rammed and sunk by the destroyer escort Silverstein.

Li Robert W. Dickson told a naval court of inquiry Wednesday that after the power failure, the submarine's crew barely was able to halt its diving by hand-operating its plunger planes. When the vessel rose, it was rammed. That was last Thursday.

All 74 enlisted men and eight officers were rescued.

HOTEL PERMIT ISSUED
PORTLAND (AP) — A 2 million dollar building permit was issued Wednesday. It was for a 14-story, 200-room addition to the Benson Hotel. Excavation work has been underway at the site for some time.

Little Chance Seen To Grant Russian Large-Scale Credit

WASHINGTON (AP) — Administration officials saw little possibility today of granting large-scale credits to finance Soviet purchases of industrial machinery and consumer goods in the United States.

They also said privately they think Soviet Premier Khrushchev has greatly exaggerated the possibilities of increasing trade.

But they did not rule out any change of material and some trade. They said that most, perhaps all, that Khrushchev says he wants to buy here could be sold without any violation of Allied agreements which prohibit the export of material and some trade.

The Soviet Union of strategic goods to the United States. Khrushchev told President Eisenhower in a letter this week that trade between the two countries could run into several billions of dollars in the next few years.

He offered to sell a wide variety of goods, including machinery, to this country and he asked to buy considerable quantities of industrial equipment and consumer goods to speed up expansion of the Soviet economy. He said the deal would help overcome the U.S. embargo.

He offered to exchange Soviet products, largely raw materials such as furs, ores and lumber, for some of the U.S. purchases. But he proposed that the President consider financing Soviet orders to U.S. factories by large-scale, long-term credits in order to speed up trade expansion.

Motorist Plans To Appeal Drunk Driving Verdict

A Roseburg motorist, Everett E. Akers of 2735 W. Gary Ave., gave oral notice to Municipal Judge Randolph Slocum Wednesday he intends to appeal a drunk driving conviction from the lower court.

Judge Slocum found Akers guilty of the charge at his Wednesday trial and fined him \$200 and five days in jail. Bail was fixed at \$350 after the driver announced he would appeal the case.

Akers was cited Feb. 27 while driving in downtown Roseburg. Lee Robert Sanders of Grants Pass, arrested here Jan. 18 by city police and charged with being drunk on a public street and for carrying a concealed weapon, was also found guilty Wednesday.

Judge Slocum fined him \$50 on each count. He was arrested on W. Center St.

Trip To Dodgerland Won By Businessman

Howard Kluever, owner of Kluever Radio Service of Roseburg, was named winner of a weekend trip for two to Los Angeles in August for outstanding sales work during April and May.

The contest was sponsored by Packard-Bell Distributing Corp. The award was announced Wednesday by M. J. Miles, Salem, branch manager for Packard Bell.

The prize includes a round trip air flight for two, expense money and reserved seats for a game between the Los Angeles Dodgers and San Francisco Giants in the Los Angeles Coliseum. The weekend trip is tentatively scheduled Aug. 8, 9 and 10.

While in Los Angeles, Kluever will also be hosted at the Packard Bell electronics plant. The estimated value of the weekend is between \$250 and \$350.

Human Error Crash Cause

GUADALAJARA, Mexico (AP) — Pilot failure was singled out Thursday as the most likely explanation of the Mexican airliner crash Monday night that killed 45 persons, including 14 Americans and two Canadians.

Gen. Alberto Salinas Carranza, director of Mexican civil aviation, praised the veteran pilot, Alfonso Ceceña. But Carranza said he found nothing to account for the disaster except possible human error. He said that was the most reasonable explanation of the crash.

Fourteen Americans and two Canadians were among those killed when the Aeroline de Mexico Constellation crashed against El Picacho, a 7,500-foot peak.

The 45 victims, most of whom were Mexicans, now have been identified.

The bodies of the Canadians and the Americans — 13 passengers and a crew member — were being flown Thursday to Tijuana, Mexico south of San Diego, Calif. All the Americans and the Canadians lived in California.

100 DIE FROM SUN
CALCUTTA, India (AP) — One hundred Indians have died of sunstroke in a heat wave in Bihar state during the past two weeks.

Supreme Court Justice Brand About To Resign

SALEM (AP) — Supreme Court Justice James T. Brand was reported Thursday as about to resign.

The 72-year-old member of the seven-man court has served on the bench since May 8, 1941, when Gov. Charles A. Sprague appointed him to succeed the late Justice Henry J. Bean.

Justice Brand was a circuit judge in Coos County before joining the Supreme Court.

Justice Brand left Thursday for Oberlin, Ohio, to attend a meeting of the trustees of Oberlin College. He will return next Wednesday.

Sources in the Supreme Court and the governor's office said they had not heard the report that Brand was ready to quit.

Justice Brand's successor, who would be appointed by Gov. Robert D. Holmes, would serve until the general election next November. The vacancy would be filled by write-in vote at the November election.

Justice Brand spent all of 1947 serving as a justice in war crimes trials in Germany.

Only two justices have served on the high court longer than he. They are Justices George Rossman, member of the court since 1927, and who was virtually re-elected in the primary last month, and Hall S. Lusk, appointed in 1937.

Brand served as chief justice in 1951 and 1952.

Civil Service Employees' Pay Boost Hits Snag

WASHINGTON (AP) — A minor snag held up final congressional action Thursday on a bill to give a 10 per cent pay raise to the government's one million white collar and supervisory civil service employees.

The House rejected a Senate amendment to increase the number of super-grade civil service posts and sent the bill to a Senate-House conference committee.

The pay issue itself seemed to be settled when the Senate accepted Wednesday the 10 per cent figure approved by the House. The Senate had previously voted for a 7½ per cent increase.

Musicians To Sponsor Dance Following Rodeo

The Musicians Union Local 539 will sponsor a dance, the "Western Rodeo Jamboree," on Sunday night, June 22, following the county rodeo.

Art Delaney, dance chairman, said the affair will get underway at 8 p.m. at Lindy's, on Highway 99 S. south of Roseburg. Six bands, led respectively by Chuck Gonge, Delaney, Joe Powell, Emmett Ray, Earl Sharp and Art Lucas, will furnish music, said Delaney.

House Votes Against Cutting Army Strength

WASHINGTON (AP) — The House voted 108-79 Wednesday against cutting the army from 900,000 to 870,000 men during the next 12 months as proposed by President Eisenhower.

The teller vote — on which members are not recorded by name — could be reversed later by a roll-call ballot.

The vote adopted an amendment to the \$38,310,561,000 Defense Department appropriation bill to keep army personnel at 900,000 during the year starting July 1.

The President and the House Appropriations Committee recommended 870,000. The cost of keeping the extra 30,000 was estimated at \$9 million dollars.

TEST PILOT KILLED
BOSCOMBE DOWN, England (AP) — Squadron leader John Booth, chief test pilot of Saunders Roe, was killed Thursday in the crash of a rocket-powered fighter plane still on the partly secret list. The experimental SR3 described as Britain's first manned aircraft with a rocket as its main power plant, exploded after takeoff.

Eugene Grocer Shot By Robber; Assailant Held

EUGENE (AP) — The owner of a little grocery store was wounded in the head when he thwarted a gunman's attempt to rob the neighborhood market here Wednesday.

Two hours after Carl August Ehrlich, 62, was wounded, state police took into custody a young man and a woman nearly 50 miles south of here.

The police acted on a tip from an alert 13-year-old schoolgirl who saw the gunman run from the store and jotted down his car's license number.

Police here said the man arrested was Richard Eugene Founts, 26, of Los Angeles, who once lived here.

He was held without formal charge.

Girl Companion Held

His companion was Patricia Yoergler, 20, of Los Angeles, said Lt. William Smith. She was held on a warrant charging vagrancy.

East gave this account of the attempted robbery:

As Ehrlich worked alone in the store, a slim young man wearing dark glasses walked in, pulled a pistol and demanded money.

Ehrlich refused, and the gunman fired once. The shot creased the side of the old man's head. The gunman then fled, empty-handed.

Maryann McFarland was walking home from school, and was just across the street from the store when she heard a noise she said sounded like a firecracker.

Then a man, she said, "came leaping out of the store" and jumped into a car that contained a young woman.

House Rejects President's Plan To Reduce Army

WASHINGTON (AP) — By a roll vote of 224-158, the House rejected Thursday President Eisenhower's plan to cut the army's strength to 870,000 men during the next 12 months. It then passed a \$38,409,561,000 defense appropriation bill.

The roll call vote nailed into the measure an amendment to finance a 900,000-man army during the year starting July 1 at an additional cost of 99 million dollars.

Passage of the bill was by a 389-0 vote which sent it on to the Senate.

The vote on the issue of the army's size upheld a tentative decision made Wednesday without a roll call. This question was a only controversy in the bill.

Voting for the amendment boosting army strength were 173 Democrats and 51 Republicans. Against it were 32 Democrats and 126 Republicans.

Nasser Backs Cyprus Freedom

CAIRO (AP) — President Nasser of the United Arab Republic last night expressed his support for independence of Cyprus from Britain.

Nasser spoke at a dinner honoring Archbishop Makarios, leader of the Greek Cypriot independence movement. The archbishop, an exile from the British island colony in the east Mediterranean, came here to confer with the U. A. R. chief of state.

"Freedom of Cyprus is for us confirmation for the principles in which we believe... and also is for us reaffirmation of peace in this part of the world," Nasser said.

He added that security of the eastern Mediterranean island means "safety to our borders" and charged Britain's occupation of Cyprus means aggression.

He pointed out that Britain and France used the island as a base for the 1956 attack on Egypt.

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Roseburg Company Purchases Coquille Textron Operation

Douglas Fir Plywood Co., a newly established firm owned by Roseburg Lumber Co. President Kenneth Ford, Wednesday purchased the Coquille Division of Textron American Inc.

The Coquille operation has plants at Coquille and Bandon. The latter plant was closed in February and resulted in layoff of 110 men.

Ford told The Associated Press that all workers at the Coquille plant, numbering about 400, will be laid off by Textron this week.

Applications for employment with the new firm, he added, will be taken following the shutdown and hiring will begin about June 23.

The AP quoted Ford as saying the Bandon plant will remain closed.

Ford could not be reached for comment today, but reliable sources at Roseburg Lumber said the new firm would have no direct connection with the Dillard company. The sources said the first work applications probably would be accepted next week.

George Ulett, manager of the Coquille plant, will retire, said The Associated Press.

Textron, which has head offices in the East, leased its Norway veneer plant to Plywood Products Corp., Corvallis, about the same time it closed the Bandon mill.

Ulett reportedly said last month that the Coquille plant faced competitive disadvantages because it did not have its own supply of logs as do other plants in the area.

State Forester Denies Muzzling Dept. Employees

SALEM (AP) — State Forester Duane L. Phipps denied Thursday that he had ordered Forestry Department employees not to testify before the Lane County Board of Equalization in the county's timber tax argument.

Phipps said the department long has had a policy that employees must get clearance from headquarters before they testify in such hearings.

He said that Lane County Commissioner Robert Straub, chairman of the Equalization Board, had misquoted this policy to mean that Phipps wouldn't let his men testify.

Straub asked Gov. Robert D. Holmes Wednesday to investigate the matter. The governor, who got Straub's letter Thursday, was out of town.

"The reason we have this policy," Phipps said, "is to permit the department to send the best qualified men to testify at these hearings."

"There would be cases in which the department would wish to send an expert to testify in place of a field man whom a board of equalization had summoned."

Many Injured As Twister Cuts Swath

Colfax Hardest Hit;
Menomonee, Chippewa Falls Also In Path
MENOMONEE, Wis. (AP) — A vicious set of three parallel tornado funnels raked a destructive furrow across northwestern Wisconsin Wednesday night, leaving a mounting toll of at least 28 dead and more than 100 injured.

Wisconsin Gov. Vernon Thomson, declaring the Coeur County path the storm took an emergency area, ordered out the National Guard, then made a personal flight to survey the damage.

A Weather Bureau meteorologist from Madison, Wis., Joseph Riney, said the storm dropped three parallel tornado funnels as it swept from the Minnesota border toward the southeast.

Full fury of the storm was unleashed on the small town of Colfax, where bodies of 10 persons were recovered from the debris and another 35 were hurt.

A six-week-old baby, Chris Allen Lunn, was found alive in a field some 200 feet from his parents' demolished farm home. The child, whose father and brother, Leon, 3, were killed, was taken to a hospital in critical condition.

The child's mother also was reported alive after previously being listed as dead. Leon died late Thursday in an Eau Claire hospital.

Four died at Chippewa Falls, four near Menomonee, two at Knapp, two at Boyd and one each at Bloomer, Wilson, Thorp, Rice Lake and Stanley.

Houses Smashed
Houses were smashed, trees splintered and stone buildings pulled (Continued on Page 2 Col. 1)

It was announced that persons interested in running for city offices in November should file before Sept. 2. Offices to be filled include one councilman from each of the city wards, each term running four years; a two-year term of mayor; and city recorder and city treasurer, with terms of both offices running two years.

Dr. Milton Eisenhower Delays Good Will Tour

WASHINGTON (AP) — Dr. Milton S. Eisenhower is delaying a planned good will tour of six Central American nations for the stated reason that it has not been possible to work out convenient dates for visits to all the countries.

After the delay was announced, State Department spokesman Lincoln White said he had no way of knowing whether the trouble Vice President Nixon found recently in some South American countries had anything to do with the decision.

Dr. Eisenhower, president of Johns Hopkins University, had been expected to head this month for Guatemala, El Salvador, Nicaragua, Honduras, Costa Rica and Panama as a personal representative of the President, his brother.

BODY RECOVERED

DELAKE, Ore. (AP) — The body of 17-year-old Willis M. Stuart, Portland, was found on the beach here Wednesday.

He had drowned May 15 on an outing with 30 students from Portland Union Academy where he was student body president.

The body was found close to the spot where he had been swimming when he was carried out to sea.

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
