verized as the cruel storm, carrying torrents of rain, skirted the edge of the Colfax business district.

In its sweep, the tornado annihilated a construction crew's trailer camp, blowing it over several farms. It spun across four counties before blowing itself out southeast of Eau Claire.

A northside residential district in Colfax, with several new homes lining the street, was all but wiped out. Some houses were reduced to piles of debris atop their foundations. Others were just blown away.

Automobiles, twisted into grotesque shapes, were tossed like toys. One relief worker said "just ten minutes is all it took." The blowing rain that accompanied the blow "came down the street like a wave," she said.

Suction Felt
"We felt the suction," said Melvin Hendrickson, 58, of Colfax, who fled with his wife and three children to their basement.

"The wind was twisting things in the basement. Rain was pouring down on us. The only thing I saw was our water heater standing in the middle of the basement. Everything else was whirling around."

U. S. Airman Admits Strangling Bar Girl

YOKOSUKA, Japan (AP) — The U.S. Navy today said a 20-year-old airman has admitted strangling a Japanese bar girl but claimed she asked him to.

Airman James W. Newmaster of Auburn, Calif., told naval investigators the 23-year-old girl, Yasuko Wakatsuchi, was despondent because her lover, an American serviceman, had left for the United States. Newmaster said she asked him to kill her and he throttled her with a nylon stocking.

The girl's nude body was found March 19 in her room near the Yokosuka naval base.

Thor Missile Firing Success From Launcher

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP) — The Air Force has shown that its Thor intermediate range missile development program is well on the way toward meeting its operational objective.

The huge IRBM took another big step Wednesday when it was fired from a tactical launching pad for the first time. The test appeared to be highly successful.

The pad, a simply-constructed steel platform, was a prototype of the launching stand to be used when the powerful bird is deployed with troops later this year.

Thor squadrons are earmarked for assignment with the Royal Air Force in England by December. Air Force crews are undergoing training aimed toward that goal at the Cape.

The Air Force says that when the Thor is operational it will be fired in 15 minutes.

In previous tests, seven of them successful, the Thor was launched from a standard static pad which is equipped with special devices to facilitate test operations.

The missile was designed for a range of 1,500 miles but it reportedly has soared as far as 2,500 miles or more in previous tests.

The missile is competing with an inter-sterile rival—the Army Jupiter—for the honor of becoming this nation's intermediate range ballistic weapon.

Neither boy, police said, knew how to swim.

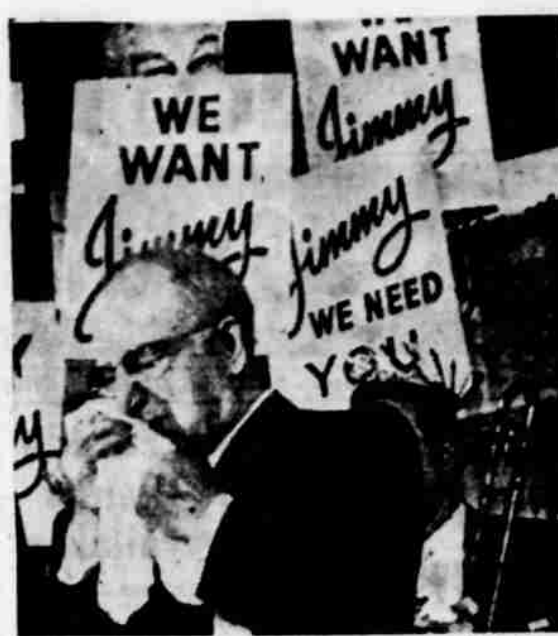
Ex-Portland Policeman Convicted Of Burglary

African territory are Frenchmen with equal rights and equal votes and with France their motherland.

His visit set off an unparalleled emotional binge in Algiers. But Moslems fighting for independence from France indicated he had not offered enough.

De Gaulle spoke only in generalities that left Algerians in the dark on details of his plans for ending the 43-month rebellion. But there was no doubt the general captured and fired the imagination of Algerians residents more than anyone had done in a long time.

"I open the door to reconciliation," de Gaulle proclaimed in offering a program designed to win back rebels whom he praised as courageous. This was the program.

Within three months the nine million Arab and Berber Moslem Algerians and the 1 1/2 million Algerians of French descent will join with 45 million residents of France in voting on the constitutional reforms he is pledged to draw up.

At some future date all Algerians will ballot on a single voting list for "representatives to the public administration."

Negro Student Graduated From Carolina School

GREENSBORO, N. C. (AP) — To an 18-year-old honor student graduating last night from Greensboro Senior High School, the words of the Rev. James Jenkins of the City School Supt. Ben L. Smith had a special meaning.

He told the graduates to be ready to stand for what they thought was right, no matter what it cost them materially.

Then, with the others, Josephine Ophelia Boyd received her diploma.

She thus became the first Negro to graduate from an integrated public high school in North Carolina.

There were no incidents. The girl was the target of eggs last fall in the first week of school. She said she was frightened the first day to be the only Negro among 1,900 students, but she added:

"I found that if you don't pay attention to people, they soon get tired of being silly."

Airplane Search Averted As Craft Limp Into Port

BURNS (AP) — A massive air search barely got off the ground before its object—a missing private plane—landed here with engine trouble Wednesday night.

The Oregon Board of Aeronautics had alerted every available rescue unit in Southern Oregon and Northern California for the plane missing on a flight from Willits, Calif., to Pendleton.

Several hours after night fell Wednesday, the craft landed here. Bob Dunn, the board's assistant director, said the plane was piloted by Willard Devine of Halfway, a small town near Baker.

The 21-year-old Devine said engine trouble hit the two-seater plane as he flew over rugged mountains in Northern California.

His passenger was Shirley Anderson, a nurse at Eastern Oregon State Hospital in Pendleton, Dunn said.

The search began when Devine failed to land for a scheduled refueling stop at Bend, some 120 miles from here.

Besides civilian groups alerted, Air Rescue units at Hamilton Air Force Base near San Francisco were poised to join the hunt.

Dunn said Devine told him he would resume his flight to Pendleton Thursday.

Smith Funeral Set In Roseburg Friday

Funeral services for Mrs. Susan Minerva Smith, 81, who died Monday at her Richmond, Calif., home, will be held in The Chapel of the Roses here Friday at 2 p.m. with the Rev. James Jenkins of the First Methodist Church officiating.

Vault interment will follow in Civil Bend Cemetery.

Mrs. Smith was the daughter of Jacob and Sarah Spaur, pioneer residents of Roseburg. Her parents settled on donation land claims in the early 1850s. Her grandfather was captain of a wagon train which crossed the plains in 1832 and was one of the founders of the Masonic Lodge in Roseburg.

Mrs. Smith was born south of Roseburg Feb. 12, 1867, and she grew up in the community. More than 70 years ago, she taught school at Iowa Slough, near Coquille.

She was married to Bardwell D. Smith of Coles Valley in 1894, and they later moved to the Medford area. She died in Richmond, Calif., where she was a member of the Methodist Church and of the Rebekah Lodge.

When the case of the missing bus was straightened out, one policeman mused:

"There'll be a lot of wives who won't believe this story."

Pope Grants Nun Right To Marry Man From Dead

FLORENCE, Italy (AP) — This is the story of a man who returned from the dead and a nun who obtained the Pope's permission to marry him.

It started 2 years ago in the central Italian hill town of Faenza, near Arezzo, south of Florence. Alba Guidotti, a pretty girl of 15, and Rinaldo Matesini, 16, became engaged.

A year later, in 1938, war came. Rinaldo was called to arms. Before he could wed Alba, he was sent off to Greece.

Word came in a few months that Rinaldo was dead. Alba, grief-stricken, entered a nearby Roman Catholic convent and took the vows of a cloistered Benedictine nun.

Rinaldo, however, was not dead. Wounded, he was shuttled from hospital to hospital. Not until 1946 did he return to the Arezzo hill country to learn Alba had entered a convent.

Eventually he arranged to meet her in the presence of the mother superior of the convent. Alba decided to ask to be released from her vows.

Ten years later, last November, came the word that Pope Pius XII had granted her the release.

White Supervisors Observe Negro Teachers

HOUSTON, Tex. (AP) — Two white supervisors have started observing Negro teachers in action in a controversial school program.

School administrators have said the program is needed to close a gap between white and Negro students. Federal Judge Ben Connally has ordered the school system integrated with all deliberate speed.

Mrs. Frank Dyer, school board president, said the plan is an effort to protect Negro teachers in their jobs when integration comes.

Several Negro groups termed the program an insult.

Woman Claims Hospital Refused Her Admittance

LOS ANGELES (AP) — A housewife claims in a million-dollar damage suit that her baby was born dead because she was turned away by a hospital.

Mrs. Roberta Carpenter, 21, said in the suit filed yesterday that she was refused hospital facilities and attendance by a physician when she could not pay \$250 in advance.

Named defendants were Park View Hospital and Dr. Stanley Archer.
