Portable Rocket To Speed Movement Of Foot Soldiers

DENVILLE, N.J. (AP) — Development of a portable rocket unit allowing a man to run with the speed of a racehorse and jump extraordinary heights was described here Wednesday. Reaction Motors, manufacturer of rocket fuels for missiles and aircraft, said it has run successful tests on a unit strapped to a man's body. The unit provides enough thrust to partially overcome the pull of gravity and give a man a degree of weightlessness. The device will increase the mobility of troops in battle, a Reaction Motors spokesman said, and the Army is "very much enthusiastic."

Wholesale Food Prices Drop Sharply This Week

NEW YORK (AP) — Wholesale food prices, as measured by the Dun & Bradstreet Inc. food index, dropped sharply this week.

At \$6.90 the index was off eight cents from last week's \$6.68 as nearly half the foods represented showed declines on the week.

The index represents the total cost at wholesale of one pound each of 31 foods in general use.

Only three were higher this week — oats, bellies and lard.

Among items lower were flour, wheat, beef, butter, sugar, eggs, potatoes, steers and hogs.

California's Primary Vote Points Up Democrat Trend

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — What happened in California's primary election Tuesday? Why the big Democratic splash?

Probably no one reason can explain. A number of factors appear to fit into the complex pattern of California politics that background the election figures.

Something similar happened in 1954. It didn't create the same stir, however, because a national figure like Sen. William F. Knowland wasn't involved. And the Democratic margin wasn't as great.

Four years ago, the California ballot began to identify candidates as either "Dem" or "Rep." for the first time, Democrats — who outnumbered the Republicans 3-2 — harnessed their big vote and nominated a full slate for state officers.

But in November, Californians returned to their old independent voting ways. They ignored party lines. Every Democrat running for statewide office was defeated — except one. That was Atty. Gen. Edmund G. Brown.

Republicans think they can win again next November. But Democratic party leaders are openly talking about a landslide. They feel the voters are ready for a change.

There's no doubt the primary showed a definite party resurgence in California. One test is the huge vote rolled up by Brown, leading his ticket as the Democratic candidate for governor.

Republicans pointed out that Knowland devoted only 14 days in the state to his primary campaign. That was all he needed for the Republican gubernatorial nomination. It's true. But Brown, who barnstormed for weeks, walked off with the high popular vote by more than 300,000.

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Boeing Workers Told To Resume Contract Talks

SEATTLE (AP) — Boeing's 36,000 hourly production workers in Washington were told by a top union official Wednesday to call off strike talks because "too much labor-management unrest already has plagued the Northwest."

The Boeing workers, represented by the IAM's Aero Mechanics Union, had been scheduled to meet Sunday to vote whether to strike if they do not come to contract terms with Boeing by June 21, when the current agreement expires.

Harold J. Gibson, general vice president of the IAM, whose authority extends over seven Western states and Alaska, ordered cancellation of the Sunday meeting and a resumption of contract talks.

Gibson, himself, headed the Aero Mechanics Union at Boeing for 14 years before becoming an IAM vice president last year.

William A. Bullwinkel, president of the Seattle Aero Mechanics local, said:

"We intend to comply completely with the IAM directive."

A. F. Logan, Boeing vice president for labor relations, commented:

"The Boeing Airplane Co. is gratified. We consider Mr. Gibson's action to be thoroughly constructive for the employees, the community and the company."

Bullwinkel said the union would ask for an immediate resumption of contract negotiations, which were broken off May 28.

Boeing has offered a two-year contract calling for 12.20 cents more an hour this year and 4.64 cents next year. The Aero Mechanics now average \$2.11 an hour.

Vagrancy Counts Draw \$30 Fines

District Judge Warren A. Woodruff Wednesday fined a Roseburg man and a Myrtle Creek youth \$30 each after finding them guilty on vagrancy charges.

They were Kenneth Cisco, 20, of Myrtle Creek and Walter Higginbotham, 23, Rt. 4, Roseburg.

A third youth, 20-year-old Dale Cisco and brother of Kenneth, was found innocent as charged at their trials.

The three were booked May 28 on the all embracing vagrancy charge after local police broke up a brawl at a dance hall on the south side of Roseburg.
