Things haven't looked this good for the Los Angeles Dodgers in a long, long time. They've gained voter approval for the Chavez Ravine deal, Johnny Podres has junked his four-game slump with a three-hit shutout and those crowd-collecting Milwaukee Braves are coming to town.

The Dodgers are still in the cellar, but it's only a 4 1/2 game spread to third place after last night's 3-0 job on Cincinnati. It was the first shutout of the year for Podres, who led the majors with six last season.

The Braves, again drawing a near capacity crowd, moved into a one-game lead over second place San Francisco by beating the Giants 10-9 in 11 innings. St. Louis whipped Pittsburgh 6-3 and gained a virtual tie for fourth place with Chicago. The Cubs bombed Philadelphia again, 11-3, with Ernie Banks belting his 15th and 16th homers, high in the majors.

Chisox Dump Yankees

In the American League, the Chicago White Sox beat New York 7-2. Second-place Kansas City beat Washington 5-4. Cleveland defeated Boston 7-5 in 10 and Baltimore clipped Detroit 6-4.

Charley Neal drove in two Dodger runs with a 429-foot triple to center and a solo homer that cleared the nearby left field screen at the foul pole. Podres, now 5-4, breezed, twice retiring 11 in a row and no-hitting the Redlegs over the last 4 1/3 innings. He struck out seven and walked two.

Johnny Klippstein (2-2) lost it. A pinch-hit single by pitcher Warren Spahn clinched it for the Braves off losing reliever Stu Miller (1-3). Down 7-1 after three, they tied it 7-all in the ninth as Wes Covington belted a three-run homer on the first pitch from reliever Pete Burnside—who was sold to Phoenix a few hours later. The two clubs swapped two-run spurts in the 10th. The Giants got theirs after two were out on consecutive pinch homers by Hank Sauer and Bob Schmidt off winning reliever Ernie Johnson.

Musial Hits Homer

Stan Musial hit his 10th homer and Ken Boyer rapped a two-run, inside-the-park homer for the Cards against Ron Kline. Jim Brosnan gave seven hits, three by

SPOKANE (AP)—The Spokane Athletic Round Table hesitated, then decided to go ahead Wednesday and give \$250 to help send the University of Washington crew to the Henley regatta in England this summer.

Labor Reform Bill Approved By Committee

WASHINGTON (AP)—A Senate labor subcommittee approved Wednesday what it termed a labor reform bill setting up a union democracy code and modifying major provisions of the Taft-Hartley law. The vote was 6-1.

Among other things, it would require secret ballot elections for union officers and public reporting of union financial data.

As approved by the subcommittee, the bill largely follows a draft introduced by Sen. John F. Kennedy (D-Mass.), chairman of the group.

The opposition vote came from Sen. Barry Goldwater (R-Ariz.) who said he would try to tighten the bill in the full committee or by amendment on the Senate floor.

Kennedy told reporters he was highly pleased with the final product. He predicted the bill would win prompt approval of the full labor committee which starts meeting on Tuesday.

If enacted, the bill would represent the most extensive change in the nation's labor relations laws since Taft-Hartley was passed in 1947.

Chances that the bill will be passed by the Senate, it faces a highly uncertain fate in the House.
