Roberta Belle Couey's Probation Revoked

Circuit Court Judge Carl E. Wimberly Thursday revoked probation of a 17-year-old Roseburg girl and sentenced her to serve one year in the state penitentiary at Salem.

The court order said Roberta Belle Couey, 1563 Short St., had failed to comply with terms of her probation and had been guilty of trespass and other misdemeanors since her May 6 trial, including lewd conduct.

A one-year sentence had been imposed at that time after Miss Couey pleaded guilty to forgery. She was cited here for writing a \$22 check in the name of Joseph E. Couey on March 14.

The revocation order deducts from the one-year sentence time already served in county jail.

Trucks Collide At Myrtle Creek

Two trucks collided on Highway 99 just north of Myrtle Creek Thursday afternoon, doing extensive damage to the front end of one vehicle.

Neither driver was hurt, however, state police reported.

An International truck driven by Lloyd Kreutzner, 30, of Langlois stopped to allow a car ahead to make a turn off the highway. A logging truck and trailer following Kreutzner tried to stop but skidded into the vehicle ahead.

The second driver was identified as William Dean Pollock, 30, River Rd., Riddle. His truck was towed into Myrtle Creek for repairs. No citations were issued after investigation.

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Navy Polaris Breaks Apart After Launching

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP) — A Navy Polaris experimental missile streaked skyward Friday on what was described as its toughest test yet.

The slim rocket roared straight up for some 20 seconds but then seemed to break apart shortly after it "programmed" toward a more horizontal course.

At least one section plummeted into the ocean where crash boats were standing by.

The Navy said in a brief announcement that the mission was "to test certain components of the Navy Polaris missile system under more difficult conditions than on previous launchings."

Officials explained later that the rocket motor exhausted its fuel in a short time and the Polaris began to tumble end over end high in the sky.

The breakup was due to aerodynamic forces pressing against the missile as it fell.

A twisting vapor trail traced the fiery plunge into the depths some five miles from the launching site.

The last time the trim Lockheed rocket was fired on May 8 it burst apart with a huge flash of flame shortly after takeoff, but the Navy announced that the breakup was expected and the test appeared to be normal.

The rocket, powered by a solid fuel is another step in the development program aimed at readying the 1,300-mile range missile for launching from nuclear powered submarines by 1960.

Green Valley Lumber Co. Will Reopen

Green Valley Lumber Co., which closed its operations in August of 1957 because of depressed lumber market conditions, will open a sawmill within the next week or two at Myrtle Creek, according to Henry M. Bailey, partner in the business.

A planing mill, which is being moved from the Green area, will go into operation at Myrtle Creek about July 4. About 20 men will be employed when the sawmill opens and a total of 30 when both the saw and planing mills are in operation.

The company is moving its planing mill from the Green area to Myrtle Creek to make a more consolidated unit and eliminate long truck hauls, Bailey said. Green Valley Lumber Co. purchased the planing mill at Green in 1949 and the sawmill at Myrtle Creek in 1954.

Operations at the planing mill at Green were closed Aug. 1 and the sawmill at Myrtle Creek Sept. 1, 1957. The company expects to produce about 75,000 board feet of lumber per shift when the mill opens. There will be one shift.

The sawmill will open first to build up an inventory of lumber before the planing mill goes into operation, Bailey added. The company will buy logs on the open market.

Lloyd S. Crenshaw, the other partner in the business, said his company is trying to get people back to work and that he does not expect a big improvement in the lumber industry but a steady one throughout the rest of the year.

Elks Convention Parade Saturday; 29 Entries Listed

A total of 29 units have registered for the annual Elks convention parade which will be held in downtown Roseburg Saturday afternoon.

The parade is scheduled to get under way at 3 p.m. from the vicinity of the triangle of NE Jackson Street. It will proceed south on Jackson to the Elks Lodge on SE Lane Avenue and Jackson.

Glen Ward, chairman, said the parade will be held between showers if it should be raining Saturday afternoon. Although 29 units have indicated their desire to participate in the parade there might be more by parade time since some units will just show up, Ward said.

Massed colors will lead off the parade, followed by the Roseburg Knights of Pythias Drum and Bugle Corps. This unit won grand prize for the best musical unit in last year's convention parade at Coos Bay.

Other units and the order they will be in the parade are: National officers, Ontario lodge members on bicycles, state vice president, state officers, Toledo lodge officers, Toledo float, Tillamook lodge officers, Tillamook Drum Corps, Hood River lodge, Portland Women's Drill Team, Gold Beach Drum Corps, Brookings lodge, Klamath Falls unit, Caveyem from Grants Pass, Grants Pass lodge, Florence lodge, Roseburg High School band, Roseburg lodge, Veterans Hospital band, Beaverton Men's Drill Team, Lebanon Elks band, Myrtle Creek lodge, Ashland lodge, Ashland Kiltie band, Baker lodge, Baker Boy Scouts Drum Corps and Naomi Parin Horses.

Chrysler Closes Operations At Plymouth Plant

DETROIT (AP) — Chrysler Corp. shut down assembly operations at its Plymouth body and assembly plant in Detroit Friday.

This was the first such action by any of the car makers during operations without labor contracts.

The company said 2,700 employees were sent home after 100 members of the United Auto Workers union walked off the job in the trim department of the Plymouth body plant.

The UAW, which has instructed all members to work as usual during a non-contract period, had no immediate comment.

Chrysler said two employees had served as union stewards under the old contract refused to work at assigned jobs and provoked a walkout.

The shutdown came as UAW President Walter P. Reuther sought to prevent incidents involving workers at General Motors and Chrysler Thursday from disrupting the uneasy truce in auto industry contract negotiations.

Paper Survey Findings To Be Explained To C.C.

Mervin Winn, chairman of the Industrial Pulp and Paper Committee of the Roseburg Chamber of Commerce, will explain the findings of a study of the Umpqua Basin Monday noon at a chamber forum in the Umpqua Hotel.

The study, prepared by Sandwell & Co., Seattle, was released last week. It was sponsored jointly by the Roseburg Chamber and the state Department of Planning and Development.

Hearing Scheduled On Pay Request Of Road Employees

The three-man Douglas County court said today a hearing has been set for June 16 in Roseburg to discuss a proposed 15-cent an hour pay hike for road department employees affiliated with the Oregon Public Employees Council.

Leo Butts of Portland, OPEC representative, is scheduled to appear before the court at that time, it was announced.

Of the 206 county road department employees, 61 are OPEC members. Most other department workers are hired at an annual salary and awarded increases annually according to an increment scale.

In budget hearings held during the last two weeks the matter of pay raises for hourly employees was discussed. There was some talk of increases "but less than the 15-cent hourly raise sought by the council." The court, however, took no action on budget making time, it was reported.

There were virtually no pay raises allowed this year in any of the departments except to persons rating a higher increment according to time in service.

Tornado Death Toll Put At 30

MENOMONIE, Wis. (AP) — A young mother died of injuries Friday and, in catastrophe's harsh equation of life and death, a man believed dead was found alive, keeping the toll of Wednesday night's tornado at 30. The grim search through the devastated area continued.

Aid for hundreds of the injured and homeless poured into an Eau Claire collection station as communities near the stricken northwestern Wisconsin area poured out their compassion.

More than \$3,000 was collected Thursday alone in milk cans put out on Eau Claire streets. Boy and Girl Scouts and volunteers sorted clothing, bedding and food contributions at a collection center and 30 truck loads were sent to Colfax, one of the hardest hit communities.

The latest death was that of Mrs. Rolf Lunn, 21, who died at a hospital in Eau Claire Friday of injuries received when the winds shattered the home of Erling Lunn in Colfax, where she was visiting on a trip from Great Falls, Mont. Her baby son is hospitalized. Erling, her brother-in-law, and one of his children also were killed.

Taken from the list of dead was Ralph Huseby of Minneapolis, who had been carried as an unidentified truck driver killed when the winds smashed his truck at Colfax. Officials located him Friday.

Senate Battle Looms Over Cuts In Excise Taxes

WASHINGTON (AP) — House passage of a bill to extend corporation income and excise tax rates opened the way Friday for a Senate floor battle over cuts in these and other levies.

Amendments were barred as the House voted Thursday to continue the taxes for another year at their wartime rates, thus avoiding a \$2,600,000,000 drop in Treasury revenues. They include levies on automobiles, liquor and tobacco.

House members seeking cuts in individual rates were limited to an effort to send the bill back to committee. That move failed and the bill was passed by voice vote.

But no such take-it-or-leave-it rule applies in the Senate, and some members already were pushing for various reductions.

Revenue measures must originate in the House. The Senate cannot start a tax bill, but can amend one sent to it by the House.

Little or no Senate change is expected, but the one considered most likely is a repeal of wartime transportation taxes. They impose a 3 per cent levy on freight rates and 10 per cent on passenger fares.

Swimming Pool Opens Saturday; Free Day Set

The Roseburg municipal swimming pool will open for three months, beginning Saturday.

Swimmers will be admitted to the pool free Saturday. The pool, located in the 1300 block on SE Jackson Street, will be open from 1 to 5 and 6 to 9 p.m. every day. Red Cross swimming classes will start June 16. The classes will be held from 10 a.m. to noon five days a week.

Douglas Co. Planning Discussion Over KPIC

The Douglas County planning program will be discussed over Roseburg television station KPIC at 7 p.m. Friday.

Representing the county planning commission will be Robert Lund, Pete Serafin and Bruce Elmgren. Also in on the discussion will be Lloyd Anderson of Eugene, director of the Planning Assistance Program.

LOSE AIR SUPREMACY

JAKARTA, Indonesia (AP) — An Indonesian air force spokesman said Friday the rebels have lost their air supremacy in the North Celebes and have not flown a mission since May 8. Eleven rebel planes have been lost, he claimed, and "no aircraft of the air force has been downed by the rebels."

John McCone Named To AEC; Strauss Quits

WASHINGTON (AP) — John A. McCone, Los Angeles businessman, was nominated by President Eisenhower Friday to succeed Lewis L. Strauss as a member of the Atomic Energy Commission.

The nomination is subject to Senate confirmation.

The White House listed McCone as a Republican. He represented Eisenhower in Rome last year in connection with observance of Pope Pius XII's installation anniversary and birthday.

On the question of who is to become chairman of the AEC, Mrs. Anne Wheaton, associate presidential press secretary, said that Eisenhower will not designate a new chairman until the Senate has acted on the McCone nomination.

Asked whether McCone ever had any experience in the atomic energy field, Mrs. Wheaton said she understood he had considerable experience in that area when he served as a Defense Department official in the Truman administration.

McCone, 56, is an engineer as well as having widespread business interests. He was deputy to the secretary of defense in 1948 and under secretary of the Air Force in 1950-51.

He is former president and a director of the California Shipbuilding Corp., chairman of the board of the Pacific Far East Line, and a director of the California Pacific Mutual Life Insurance Co.

Like President Eisenhower, he is a member of the Burning Tree Country Club in Washington.

Roseburg Man To Help Launch Survey Society

Three Roseburg men will help launch the Oregon section of the American Congress of Surveying and Mapping late this month at an organization meeting in Portland.

Fred Darby, Douglas County surveyor and a sponsor of the Oregon group, said today more than 30 persons are expected to adopt a constitution and by-laws and elect officers at the June 25 meeting to be held in the Portland General Electric auditorium.

Ben Irving and Robert Lecklider, both of Roseburg, joined Darby last month in signing a petition for affiliation with the ACSM.

Purpose of the organization, Darby said, is to improve standards and ethics on the profession, and educate the public to the need for proper surveys.

Darby has been elected temporary chairman and secretary-treasurer for the Oregon section. He said all persons interested in surveying and mapping may join, and those desiring to do so should contact him. About 50 engineers and surveyors live in Douglas County.

Rose Show Postponed By Inclement Weather

The Roseburg Rose Society has postponed its annual rose show, which was to have been held Saturday.

Jim Loomis said weather had forced the delay. The wet weather, he said, had ruined many roses now in bloom.

Date of the re-scheduled show will be announced later.

Searchers Organized In County

Plane Reported Losing Altitude; Observer Says She Heard Crash

Searchers for an F4B Navy jet in the Curtin area were stalled late this morning by a heavy rainstorm that kept airplanes from looking through the area.

A ground search party of state police and deputies from the Douglas and Lane sheriff's offices waited at Curtin Cafe until the rain slackened.

A News-Review reporter there said the ground party probably will be unable to move until the missing airplane is spotted.

The missing airplane was spotted at 8:46 a.m. on a radar screen at North Bend. The Navy there said the plane appeared to go down in the Anlauf area.

A Navy jet airplane, reported losing altitude from a flame-out, apparently crashed this morning in the Curtin area.

Search parties were organized immediately in the area, and the Roseburg squadron of the Civil Air Patrol started an aerial search.

Sources at Portland Air Force base said the plane, an F4B, en route from McChord Field, Wash., to Moffett Air Force Base in California, went down about 8:15 a.m. The search was in the Black Butte area southeast of Cottage Grove near the Douglas-Lane county line.

A ground observer at Curtin, Mrs. Max Ames, said she heard the plane crash, and pinpointed the crash on the Buck Creek Road running east from Curtin.

Search Units On Way

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The jet was thought for a time to have gone down a few miles east of Roseburg. But that report, from Moffett Air Force base, apparently was in error.

Sheriff Ira C. Byrd, leading the local air search, turned its efforts from the Roseburg area to Curtin. Three planes were in the air.

Portland Air Force base sources also reported that the pilot of a second jet plane accompanying the downed craft had watched his companion go down.

The pilot of the downed airplane apparently tried to make it as far as Mahlon Sweet Airport at Eugene, according to the Eugene Register-Guard. The Eugene Fire Department made a run to the airport, but the craft failed to land.

Pilots Killed In Crash Identified By Air Force

Wendover Air Force Base, Utah (AP) — The Air Force has identified the two officers killed in the crash of a Larson Air Force Base, Wash., jet trainer in recent western Utah Thursday.

They were 1st Lt. Darrell E. Rosenbark, 24, of Mount Vernon, Wash., pilot, and 1st Lt. George T. Jost, 26, of San Jose, Calif., copilot.

The T33 jet trainer was on a training flight from the 32nd Fighter Interceptor Squadron at Larson AFB, near Moses Lake, Wash.

Ray Talbert Takes Principal Position At Douglas High

Ray L. Talbert, principal of Glide High School, will fill the same position at Douglas High School when school opens in September.

The Glide school administrator was hired by the Dillard School Board at a recent meeting. Talbert has been principal at Glide for the past three years. He previously taught chemistry and physics at Hillsboro High School. Talbert taught at Hillsboro for seven years.

Talbert will move to the Winston-Dillard area about July 1 with his wife, Carol, and three children, Nicole S., Ronald S., and Maria S.

De Gaulle Says Insurgents Must End Authority

ORAN, Algeria (AP) — Premier Charles de Gaulle told representatives of the all-Algeria Public Safety Committee Friday its insurgent authority must come to an end. He said he will run Algeria — a new post.

He named Gen. Raoul Salan, military commander of the junta, as his own delegate-general in Algiers — a new post.

But de Gaulle will personally assume control of Algerian affairs, acting as his own Cabinet minister for the strife-torn territory.

De Gaulle said the committee, which led the drive to bring him to power, must now concentrate on integration of the Moslem and European communities in Algeria.

On the last day of his tour of Algeria, he told representatives of the Algerian and the local safety committee.

"You must not trespass or substitute yourselves for legal authority. Your task is to work for a complete integration of souls."

His statement cleared up his attitude on the future of the public safety committee movement that spread throughout Algeria as well as metropolitan France and parts of the French Empire.

Damage To Two Autos In Accident About \$450

Damage totaling about \$450 to two cars which collided at the corner of Stephens and Oak Sts. at 10:50 p.m. Thursday was reported by city police today.

They said the car driven by a 19-year-old Milo student hit a 1950 vehicle driven by T. H. Allen, 48, who resides on the North Umpqua highway near Roseburg.

No injuries were reported, but the Allen car going north on Stephens received front end damage and the other to the left front fender.

The student, Leon Duane Russell, was cited. He admitted he went through a red light which he said was green as he approached it.

Barbara Burns Will Be Sentenced For Addiction

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Barbara Ann Burns, 18-year-old daughter of the late comedian Bob Burns, will be sentenced Monday for addiction.

A jury convicted her Thursday after a two-day trial. The charge carries a sentence of 90 days to a year in jail.

Miss Burns testified that officers kept her from contacting friends until she gave a statement implicating her husband David Mach, 26, as the source of her narcotics.

Mach was also found guilty and is awaiting sentencing.

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
