Between 150 and 200 people visited the site of the new 14-target field course on the foot and Gun Club grounds just west of canyonville. Helping to make the dedication a success were Joel Callison, Portland, Oregon field governor for the National Field Archery Assn.; Gale Staley, Grants Pass, Oregon Bow Hunters representative, and a good share of the club's 66 members.

The Lewiston Broncs have a chance Friday night to increase their lead at the expense of Salem.

The Broncs move to Salem's home field, where the last place Senators have been anything but spectacular, losing 15 of 17 games.

Second running Wenatchee takes on a hard-fighting, third place Yakima squad and Tri-City travels to Eugene in other Friday contests.

Thursday's games failed to change any league positions. Lewiston and Wenatchee split a doubleheader, the Broncs winning the first game, 3-1, and Wenatchee taking the nightcap, 6-1. Eugene slapped a 12-8 defeat on Salem while Yakima beat Tri-City, 9-5.

Three runs in the first inning were all that was needed in the second Lewiston-Wenatchee game. The Broncs could only break through for a lone unearned tally in the third frame.

In the initial fracas, Lewiston's Ernie Sadler earned his fourth straight victory in pitching a four-hitter. The Broncs won it on a run in the fourth and two in the fifth, including Jerry Linnel's home run.

Wenatchee hurler Claude Osteen's winning streak was stopped at seven straight by the loss.

It was a home run-filled exhibition at Kennewick, with Yakima's Ted Tappe clouting one for two runs in the fifth and Tri-City's Len Lindborg and Harry Williams getting solo homers.

It was Lindborg's 13th round-tripper and gave him a tight hold on the league home run title.

At Salem the lowly Senators dropped another, after ending a 15-game home park losing streak with a win Wednesday night.

Eugene scored six runs in the first inning and then methodically racked up six more, as Salem desperately attempted to overtake the Emeralds.

Bill Eastburn wielded a heavy bat for Eugene, driving in four runs on a double and a homer. It was Eastburn's third home run of the series.

Akims, Martinez To Battle For Welter Crown Tonight

ST. LOUIS (AP) — A new world welterweight boxing champion will be crowned tonight when Virgil Akims, a stiff-punching home town boy, meets Clever Vince Martinez of Paterson, N. J., in the 15-round final match of an elimination tournament.

Carmen Basilio, who vacated the title last September when he entered the middleweight ranks, will watch the fight. He picks Martinez.

Akims, a 30-year-old slugger who has come into his own in recent months after years of erratic performances, is the 2-1 favorite on the home front.

It will be a healthy payday for both fighters. Each gets \$15,000 from TV and an additional \$15,000 guarantee or 30 per cent of receipts.

Akims and Martinez, 29, are survivors of a six-man elimination tournament set up last year. Akims bypassed the tourney for a time and won the Massachusetts version of the world title by knocking out ex-champ Tony DeMarco. After repeating the job on DeMarco in a rematch, Virgil eliminated Isaac Logart by a sixth-round knockout in New York March 21. Martinez ousted Gil Turner in January and drew a bye into the finals with Akims.
