LOS ANGELES (AP) — Los Angeles Dodgers President Walter O'Malley won his decision with the voters. Now comes an individual taxpayer to challenge the Chavez Ravine deal.

Louis Kirschbaum, who filed a taxpayer's suit April 10, won a preliminary injunction Friday. His action seeks to halt the city's transfer of 300 acres in Chavez Ravine to O'Malley for a stadium.

Kirschbaum contends the city-Dodger contract is illegal because the deed conveying Chavez Ravine land to the city from the Housing Authority three years ago restricts its use to public purposes. The injunction forbids the city from violating the deed restriction or from engaging in any contract with the Dodgers.

Trial of the suit was set for June 17.

Voters approved the contract at Tuesday's election.

If there's something wrong with Mickey Mantle's swing, he ought to patent it. He's had only eight hits in his last six games—but six of them have been home runs.

The Mick picked a pair last night, driving in the first four runs as the New York Yankees defeated the Cleveland Indians 6-5. It was a two-run, bases-loaded single by Bill Skowron that got the job done in the seventh, however, as Bob Turley became the first to win nine in the majors.

KC Skids

Second place Kansas City skidded 8½ games behind the Yankees in a 2-1 and 3-1 twin-night loss at Baltimore. Boston defeated Chicago 3-2 and Detroit belted Washington 11-2.

Mantle, who had hit only four home runs in his first 37 games, now has 10 for the year. He also singled in a perfect 3-for-3 show, raising his average to .309, and was walked intentionally to load the bases ahead of Skowron's clincher.

Turley Eludes Jam

Turley gave up seven hits, one a two-run homer by Tomanek, his first in the majors, and had to get out of a bases-loaded, one-out jam in the ninth. The once-beaten right-hander fanned nine, for a 62 total that reclaimed the AL lead from Chicago's Billy Pierce, who has 55.

Connie Johnson won his second for the Orioles in the opener, while in the nightcap, Milt Pappas, a 19-year-old right-hander hampered by arm trouble recently, gained his second victory. Ray Herbert was the loser.

Berberet Sox Hero

Lou Berberet singled home a run in the sixth for the Red Sox, then set up the clincher with a pinch-hit sacrifice fly in a two-run eighth. Chicago reliever Jerry Staley lost his fourth. He Delock won his second in relief.

Billy Hoelt, who hadn't beaten Washington since 1956, gained a 4-3 record with a four-hitter after losing four straight. Ossie Virgil, Detroit's first Negro, made his AL debut with a double in five trips and an errorless game at third base. Hal Griggs was the loser.

Elliott Runs Sub-4 Mile

COMPTON, Calif. (AP) — Australia's Herb Elliott is the type of fellow who can shrug off missing a world mile record by the wink of an eyelash.

"No, I'm not disappointed," said Elliott after whipping Ron Delany of Ireland in 3:58.1 Friday night—his fifth sub-four minute mile.

"I'm always happy to run under four minutes and win," said the flier from Perth, who was clocked just one-tenth of a second of the recognized mile record set by John Landy, a fellow Aussie.

The race at the Compton Invitational Track and Field Meet had been ballyhooed as the track duel of the year. But Delany, unbeaten this year until Friday night, fumbled in the final quarter and finished a good 50 yards behind Elliott and Lazo Tabori, a Hungarian refugee.

Delany's coach, Jim Elliott of Villanova, blamed the rush of a busy indoor season for the skinny Irishman's poor showing.

Delany said the 3.8 m.p.h. crosswind might have cost Elliott a record. Others blamed the swift pace set at first by Bob Shankland of the University of California. He was timed at 56.9 for the first 440 yards.

Triple Bill Due In Prep Payoff

PORTLAND (AP) — Grant and Lincoln high schools will meet here Saturday night in the first all-Portland finale since the Oregon A-1 prep baseball championships began in 1946.

The game for the A-1 state title will cap a tripleheader, scheduled to begin at 5 p.m. when Adrian and Gaston meet for the Class B title.

Myrtle Creek and Central of Independence clash for the A-2 pennant at 7 p.m.

The games will be played in Multnomah Stadium, thoroughly soaked by nearly two inches of rain that fell here Friday.

The Weather Bureau said sunshine was due Saturday, mixed with a few sprinkles.

For the first time in 12 years, Portland League teams dominated the A-1 playoffs this season. Grant won its berth by tripping another Portland school, Douglas. And Lincoln won its way into the finals by edging South Eugene 4-3.

Grant Well Rested

And therein lies the secret of what made Grant the favorite to again take the title it first won in 1951.

For Grant played Tuesday, and its pitchers are well rested for the championship game.

Lincoln, though, went through a 16-inning ordeal in nipping South Eugene Thursday, and its top hurler, left-hander Mickey Lohich, pitched 10 innings in relief.

The Grant team also has five regulars batting above .300. Lincoln took the state title in 1956, but its hopes for another crown may be snuffed out by lack of rested pitchers.

The Grant squad took the Portland League title with a 15-3 record. Two of the losses were inflicted by Lincoln. And both times Lohich was the winner.

Brede Grant Hurler

Dick Brede is expected to open the game on the mound for Grant. He has a 10-0 record.

The outcome of the Myrtle Creek-Independence game appeared a toss-up, with Myrtle Creek going into the title game with a 15-5 record and Independence at 12-3.

Myrtle Creek, which stole 74 bases this season, probably will start right-hander Wes Davidson, who has a 7-2 record.

Bill Lukens and Jim Turner, who both have 6-1 marks, are the likeliest candidates to be the starting pitcher for Independence.

The Class B title game matches the teams which also went to the finals last year. Gaston took the title on a narrow 3-2 triumph.

Gaston Hurler Good

Gaston raced to a 16-2 record this season, and stole 95 bases. Gaston's top hurler is Ladd Gooding, who has an 8-2 record and an 0.69 earned run average.

Phil Hatch, Adrian's starting pitcher, this year won 11 games and lost two. Adrian has a 12-4 record.

If the games are rained out, the Oregon School Activities Assn. either could re-schedule them or declare co-champions.

Nobody's been able to get Willie out in his last eight at-bats. He ran his consecutive hit streak to seven last night with his 14th home run and a pair of singles that just missed getting the job done for the Giants.

Giants Nipped

One big inning gave Cincinnati a 5-4 victory over San Francisco, but the Giants stayed within .008 percentage points of first place Milwaukee, beaten 4-3 at Los Angeles.

Don Zimmer's leadoff home run in the ninth—the first ever off Milwaukee relief ace Don McMahon—gave the majors—saw it to the Dodgers, whose last place pitching staff cooled off the Braves' hot homer streak. In the Coliseum yet.

Mays took the bat lead from Stan Musial (now .420), who was 0-for-2 as his St. Louis Cardinals won their fourth in a row with a 3-1 decision over Philadelphia. The Chicago Cubs beat Pittsburgh 6-1.

Mays, the 1954 batting champ with a .345 average, picked up his 10th stolen base, also tops in the NL.

Monzant Loses

The Giants took their fourth defeat in five games, all by one run, as the Reds socked Ray Monzant for his fourth loss in a five-run sixth. Jerry Lynch clinched it with a three-run homer, his fourth.

Rookie Don Tausig also homered for the Giants, his first in the majors, but reliever Willard Schmidt blanked 'em on two hits over the last 5 2-3 innings for his second victory.

The Dodgers twice hustled from behind to tie the score against the Braves' starter, Bob Rush, and Glen Labine won his second, pitching only the ninth after following starter Don Drysdale and Johnny Podres.

Jones Fans 12

Right-hander Sam Jones took the major league strikeout lead at 65 by fanning 12 Phils, a one-game high for the NL season.

Right-hander Dick Crotts won his third with a four-hitter for the Cubs as the Pirates lost their fourth in a row. He blanked the Bucs on two hits after a first-inning run. Vern Law lost it for a 5-4 record.
