Signs were posted and guards stationed in the beach area which adjoins the city's long municipal pier jutting into Tampa Bay. Also a part of the swimming area is the spa pool.

The Negroes walked to the pool, demanded entrance and were granted admittance. They dressed in the locker room used for pool bathers but did not use the pool itself. Instead, they walked onto the beach.
