Chaplain Henry W. Anderson of Vancouver, Wash., assisted by Dr. Eugene Gerlitz, pastor of the church, performed the impressive double ring ceremony in the presence of more than 300 guests.

Six floor baskets with arrangements of calla lilies with four candelabra draped with white satin ribbons to form an arch decorated the altar. The pews were marked with white net and lace medallions, roses and white streamers. Mrs. Earl Wiley and Mrs. A. B. Taylor decorated the church. Lighting the altar candles were Carl Schweinfurth and Theodore Anderson.

Mrs. Homer W. Glue, organist, played the traditional wedding marches and accompanied John Davis of Seattle, who sang "O Perfect Love," "I Love Thee," and the "Lord's Prayer." During
