Airborne Search Underway For Light Airplane

SPOKANE (AP) — A big airborne search got underway Tuesday for a light plane piloted by a Bremerton man that disappeared on a flight from Spokane to Portland Monday.

More than 40 Civil Air Patrol planes took off in an attempt to find a trace of the plane piloted by Bill Tappe, about 35. The Civil Aeronautics Administration said Tappe left at 10:30 a.m. Monday on a planned 2 hour and 15 minute flight to Portland. He arrived here Sunday night from Seattle.

It was believed he planned to fly to Portland via Pendleton-The Dalles because he requested weather information for the Oregon points Monday morning. A jet plane from Geiger Air Force base here searched for the single engine, red and white aircraft late Monday, the CAA said. The pilot flew from Spokane to Pendleton and Walla Walla and returned without sighting anything. Tappe, described by the CAA as a "conscientious pilot who was in the habit of closing out his flight plan with a position report," has been piloting his own plane for 10 years. An industrial painter, Tappe was on a business trip.

Nuclear Power Plant Is Plan Of NW Utilities

PORTLAND (AP)—Three Pacific Northwest privately owned utilities have joined with five other firms in a two-year research program to find ways of taking electric power from nuclear energy.

The three are Portland General Electric, Pacific Power & Light and Washington Water Power. In announcing the program here, Pacific Power said the projects are to study the possibilities of directly converting heat from electricity and to develop gas-cooled nuclear power reactors.

The research, expected to cost a half million dollars, will be directed by General Dynamics Corp.'s John Jay Hopkins Laboratory at San Diego. In the project with the Northwest firms are Utah Power & Light Co., Public Service Co. of Colorado, California Electric Power, Public Service Co. of New Mexico and Arizona Public Service.

The utilities have set up the Rocky Mountain-Pacific Nuclear Research Group, through which they will work with General Dynamics.

Elfrida Von Nardroff Nears Quarter Million

NEW YORK (AP) — Elfrida Von Nardroff, biggest money winner in TV quiz show history, pushed her total to \$248,000 Monday night.

The 32-year-old Brooklyn woman returns next week to NBC's "Twenty One" with a 10-0 lead over Herbert Hulst, hotel clerk and lawyer from Goldsboro, N.C. Time ran out on their game Monday night.

Earlier, Miss Von Nardroff added \$10,500 to her winnings by defeating Wolfgang Weissleder of New York City, a patent attorney and marine architect. Their game involved questions on fictional romances and classical composers.

Miss Von Nardroff blanked Weissleder 21-0. She said she plans to continue on the program as long as her "spirit holds out."

Under federal income tax laws, assuming Miss Von Nardroff's deductions are in the normal range, she would pay close to \$200,000 on her winnings at this point. Also, if she loses on "Twenty One," some of her winnings will be deducted.

Kelly And Miller Circus Billed Here For July 3

The Al G. Kelly and Miller Bros. Circus will appear at the Douglas County Fairgrounds south of Roseburg on July 3, circus spokesmen announced today.

Spokesmen for the wild animal and variety show claim the circus is the largest currently on tour in the United States. The performance will mark the first Roseburg appearance of the circus in seven years, said advance publicity men.

The travelling show now is on its 38th annual tour of the nation.

Senate Passes Bill For New Indirect Federal Investment

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate has passed a bill proposing a disputed new program of indirect federal investment to strengthen the capital structure of small businesses.

The measure now goes to the House, leaving behind it a row as to whether Congress has been illegally short circuiting its appropriations committees.

The bill passed Monday would set up a program under which the government would make low interest loans to new agencies to be known as small business investment companies. These, in turn, would invest the borrowed federal funds in small businesses needing more equity capital. The investments would be in the form of debenture purchases.

Sen. A. Willis Robertson (D-Va) raised a point of order, but quickly withdrew it, against a provision of the bill which would let the Small Business Administration borrow from the Treasury the 250 million dollars provided to back the program over a period of years.

Robertson said this amounts to appropriating money without approval of the Senate Appropriations Committee and that this is illegal. He withdrew his point of order because many senators were absent, but said he would renew it on some other bill later. The multibillion dollar housing bill now being drafted by the Senate Banking Committee is expected to contain provisions for some similar big borrowings from the Treasury.
