

Mill Prices On Dimension And Standard Lumber Dips

After slowing down a week ago, market demand for transit cars of green mill random lengths standard and better fir dimension is holding steady but mill prices have dropped at least one dollar, according to The Weekly Shamrock Market Letter.

Except for mills supplying regular customers, demand for specified dimension slackened this week and prices are \$1 less than a week ago with a downward price trend. For mills with regular customers the stud market holds an even keel with no price changes.

Market Languishing

Except for a continuing good market for low grade dimension, the large mixed-car fir shipping mills are drifting in a languishing market. Retail yard buying is steady but low in volume. This week brought a slight temporary pick up in buying by country yards in specific areas to fill inventory holes or to anticipate fourth of July holiday mill closures throughout the industry. Holiday shut-downs will follow the pattern of past years: One day to two weeks, with the former having their annual closures later in the summer or early fall.

The Australia and South Africa

export markets remain quiet. The Japan log market is active but lumber buying is negligible and mostly for low-grade stock. There is limited spot buying for the United Kingdom in hemlock and balsam fir species. The Atlantic Coast cargo market continues active and lumber is moving from docks to jobs and retail yards. Mills are booked through June. The California cargo market is steady although sales volume of some mills is below normal for this time of the year.

Pine Weakens Some

The overall market for western pine shows some weakness. This week but the market for the associated species is maintaining demand and price levels prevailing for the past month, or longer.

The sanded fir plywood market holds firm at the \$84 index price for 4-inch A. D. The Plywood sheathing market is getting stronger and plywood plants advanced prices this week.
