Tiger Boss Out; New Man Hired

DETROIT (AP) — Jack Tighe was fired as manager of the Detroit Tigers Tuesday. Bill Norman was named to succeed him.

Tighe was dismissed on the recommendation of General Manager John McHale. The board of directors approved the move immediately.

The team is in Boston. Tighe was offered a job in the Detroit Tiger organization. But the 44-year-old sophomore manager delayed a decision and said he would return to his home in Spring Lake, Mich.

The Tigers are in last place. They finished fourth under Tighe last season.

Norman, 47, has been manager of the Tigers' Charleston farm club in the triple-A American Assn. for the past year and a half. He will take over the club with Tuesday night's game.

McHale went to Boston Monday and Monday night saw the Tigers lose a 9-4 decision to the Red Sox. That defeat put them in last place, 12½ games behind the league-leading New York Yankees.

Whitworth Grid Post Goes To Adams, Ex-End

SPOKANE (AP) — Sam Adams, regarded as the finest end the school has ever produced, was named head football coach at Whitworth College Monday to succeed Wally Uphoff who resigned after one year at the job.

Paul Merkel, an assistant football coach, was appointed athletic director. Uphoff held both positions.

Adams was graduated from Whitworth in 1952 and played with the San Francisco 49ers and the Vancouver, B. C. Lions before a knee injury ended his professional career.

Patterson Bout Is Pete's Goal

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Pete Rademacher is looking beyond his heavyweight charity bout with Zora Foley here July 24.

After the signing Monday, Rademacher told newsmen he's certain he'll get a rematch with heavyweight Champ Floyd Patterson if he beats Foley.

Rademacher, 29, of Yakima, Wash., 1956 Olympic Games champion, was making his first professional start when Patterson defeated him last August in Seattle.

He said Monday: "I'm three times the man I was then."

He added that he weighs 214 now as against 204 last August, and he said he knows better how to pace himself.

Foley, 25, who hails from Chandler, Ariz., was modest in his comments. He predicted his fight with Rademacher would be a good one. Speaking of his foe, he said: "Anybody who can go six rounds with Patterson and even knock him down is a good fighter."

Tribe Claims Top PCL Attendance

SPOKANE (AP) — The Spokane Indians, stumbling around in sixth place in the Pacific Coast League, laid claim Monday to the top spot in home attendance among the nation's minor leagues.

Spokane is a farm club of the National League's last place Los Angeles Dodgers who are far in front in major league attendance.

The Indians have drawn 107,089 in 25 playing dates here and General Manager Spencer Harris said this is the best in the minors this year.

"I'm amazed in view of our low standing in the league," Harris said.

Spokane had no professional baseball at all last year and dropped out of the Class B Northwest League two years ago for lack of local support when attendance skidded to 68,371 for the entire season.

The Dodgers moved their Los Angeles PCL franchise here this spring after Spokane city and county commissioners agreed to build a new 8,500-seat stadium for more than \$500,000.

Spokane set a Class B league attendance record of 287,000 in 1947 and that still stands.

Amateur Win Not Likely In Open Golf

TULSA, Okla. (AP) — It has been 25 years since an amateur won the U. S. Open Golf Championship and it is unlikely one will come through this year on a course that Billy Joe Patton calls "a monster."

But the 31 amateurs in the field of 162 players scheduled to start Thursday on the 6,907-yard Southern Hills Country Club course constitute a strong threat to the pros.

One qualified observer thinks three or four could bring back the days of Bobby Jones and Johnny Goodman.

The last amateur winner was Goodman in 1933, five years after Jones gave up his habit of licking the pros.

The observer is Bill Kaiser, a veteran pro from Louisville, Ky., who barely missed qualifying for the tournament.

He thinks it would be good for golf to have an amateur win or at least come thrillingly close as Ken Venturi did in the 1956 Masters.

The four Kaiser mentioned as having the potential are Patton, Harvie Ward and two youngsters, Jack Nicklaus, Columbus, Ohio, and Bobby Nichols, Midland, Tex.

Moore Takes Nod But Loses KO Bid

SACRAMENTO, Calif. (AP) — Is aging Archie Moore finally slowing down? No, says boxing's grand old man, Howard King is just getting better.

The light heavyweight champ decided King for the fourth time in his career Monday night in a 10-round non-title bout, but found the going a little rougher than in that first battle two years ago.

The decision was unanimous, but fortyish Moore, weighing a pudgy 196½, failed to make King a record-breaking 127th knockout victim.

Moore admitted he was trying hard for that KO.

But he added: "Howard is improving and, like a fish, is harder to catch each time you go after him."

King, 197 - pounder from Reno was floored for a count of nine in the ninth but said Moore "never had me in serious trouble."

Burglarly Rap Given Former Portland Cop

PORTLAND (AP) — An ex-Portland policeman, convicted of burglary last week, was sentenced to one year in the state penitentiary Monday.

Circuit Judge James W. Crawford passed the sentence on Warren L. Moore, 33, West Linn.

Moore and two other former policemen were charged with the burglary of a Portland appliance store last February.

The other two pleaded guilty and are serving 18-month sentences. All three resigned from the force when they were indicted.

Incorporation Issue Faces Tigard, Aged 100

TIGARD (AP) — More than a hundred years after the first residents arrived, this community is going to vote on whether to incorporate as a municipality.

If voters Tuesday favor the proposal, Oregon's newest city—with a population of 1,800 to 2,000—will be formed.

Tigard is in Washington County, southwest of Portland.

Atomic Blasts May Be Used To Excavate Harbor

WASHINGTON (AP) — If studies show it is safe and practicable, the United States may use atomic blasts to excavate a harbor along Alaska's coast north of the Arctic Circle.

The Atomic Energy Commission announced Monday survey parties will study the site, located between Cape Seppings and Cape Thompson, this summer to determine whether the project is feasible.

If the findings are favorable, the harbor could be excavated in 1960, the AEC statement said. It said lack of harbors along Alaska's northwestern coast has hampered development of mineral deposits and fishing.

In addition to providing data on costs and various other technical aspects, the survey teams will determine whether the project would endanger any lives, including fish and wildlife, within and outside the immediate area.

The commission described the harbor venture as part of its Project Plowshare to find new peaceful uses for nuclear blasts.

The AEC said both Canada and Russia have been informed of the plan and that other nations would be invited to witness the excavating blasts.

Motorist Found With Bad Injury

PORTLAND (AP) — A man found unconscious in the cab of a truck at Newport is suffering from a skull fracture, Good Samaritan Hospital said Tuesday.

The hospital said the condition of Dean Fuller, 28, Waldport, was serious.

At Newport, Police Chief W. J. Mulkey said "It's a guess that he may have been robbed and beaten."

Mulkey said that Fuller was discovered Sunday in a truck parked on a street along the shore of the ocean.

He failed to recover consciousness by early Monday, so was brought to the hospital here. Good Samaritan said he recovered consciousness late Monday night.

Mulkey said Fuller apparently had several hundred dollars in cash on him Saturday. The money was gone when he was found in the truck.

Fuller, a former Corvallis resident, is owner of a fuel business at Waldport.

Japanese Court Hears Plea Of 3 Yank Sailors

NAGOYA, Japan (AP) — The Nagoya higher court Monday heard statements from both prosecution and defense in the appealed case of three American sailors convicted of assaulting and robbing a Japanese taxi driver.

The defendants are Bobbie E. Patterson, 20, Denver City, Tex.; Michael F. Mitchell, 20, Grass Valley, Calif.; and Michael Gritch, 18, Beaumont, Calif.

Monday's hearing was the first since their Feb. 21 conviction in Nagoya district court. Both sides Monday presented grounds for appealing.

Defense attorney Takeo Hayashi is asking suspension of Patterson and Mitchell's 2½-year sentence, and Gritch's 2-year sentence.

The prosecution appealed because the minimum penalty of the law under which they were convicted is seven years.

The court adjourned until July 14.

Grants Pass Firm Gets Air Station Contract

SEATTLE (AP) — Army Engineers here have announced award of a \$188,640 contract to a Grants Pass, Ore., firm for construction of an Air Force station near Duxton in Lane County.

Known as a gap-filler facility, it will be called the Duxton Air Force Station.

The contract went to the Ausland Construction Co. The work includes a communication building with 1,604 square feet of floor area, a 20,000-gallon steel fuel oil storage tank and 450 feet of chain link fence.

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
