

U. S. Disregards Canada's Growth, Spokesman Says

POUGHKEEPSIE, N. Y. (AP)—Lester B. Pearson, opposition leader in the Canadian House of Commons, said Monday that when Canadians think of the United States their big fear is that their "Big Brother" is not watching them.

Pearson discussed Canada-U.S. relations in an address at commencement exercises at Vassar College, a women's institution.

He said Canadians, with a surging feeling of national pride during a period of great development, are becoming a little touchy—"perhaps occasionally too touchy"—about being overlooked.

"At this time indeed the source of our worry is that 'Big Brother' is not watching us," he said.

Thus, Canadians are prone to feel aggrieved at certain U. S. policies, the Liberal Party leader added.

"In trade, don't fence us out, and in politics don't take us out, and in politics don't take us out," he said.

Discussing criticisms of the U. S., he said they are largely based on envy and anxiety, bred by power and success he added.

"The United States is the most powerful and the richest country in the world. Yet while great national wealth and power can

achieve international recognition and respect, they rarely gain affection—and not always even understanding. This is something to which the giant has to become accustomed."

EX-CONGRESSMAN DIED

WASHINGTON (AP)—James Martin Barnes, 59, Democratic representative in Congress from Illinois for two terms, 1929-1943, died Sunday of a liver disorder. Barnes, former county judge at Jacksonville, Ill., was a former assistant to Presidents Franklin D. Roosevelt and Harry S. Truman. He was born in Jacksonville.

Physical Fitness Of Youth Sagging, Spokesman Says

OMAHA (AP)—The prevailing attitude in America is manufacturing softness, Shane McCarthy, executive director of the President's Council for Youth Fitness, declared Sunday.

He suggested a wholesale change on the part of both adults and children is needed to get America on the road to physical fitness.

"Our council's job is to induce a nation away from passive habits and sedentary ways, and encourage a physically active way of life. It is not to set up a norm for the nation, but to encourage the people themselves, individually and in groups, to do things conducive to good health."

McCarthy said physical fitness is as much a problem of rural life as the city, explaining that "boys and girls in rural areas have scored no higher tests for physical fitness than those in cities."

"The country lad may live 13 miles from the schoolhouse but he rides there on a bus," McCarthy said. "He may have a dozen cows to milk, but he has a machine to do it."

McCarthy commented during a stopover in Omaha en route to the Governor's Conference on Youth Fitness at Laramie, Wyo.

Senate Votes \$1 Duck Stamp Boost

WASHINGTON (AP)—The cost of hunting ducks will go up from \$2 to \$3 if the House acts favorably on a bill passed by the Senate on a voice vote Monday.

Under the terms of the measure, the price of duck stamps would go up and all of the proceeds except printing and distribution costs would go into the purchase of wet lands as wild fowl preserves.

Sen. Warren G. Magnuson (D-Wash.) told the Senate that about five million dollars now is raised annually by duck stamp sales. But he said about 80 per cent of the amount goes into the policing of duck hunting and other administration.

Under the new bill the interior department would get direct appropriations for these activities and the stamp funds would go into land purchases.

Magnuson said the measure would clear the way for the Fish and Wildlife Service to acquire 77,000 additional waterfowl acres in the Puget Sound area, in central Washington near Wenatchee and Tappanish in the northeastern part of Washington State.

Father Slays His Son As Outcome Of Dispute

CHATTANOOGA, Tenn. (AP)—A former Chattanooga labor leader was held without bond on a murder charge Monday after the Sunday shotgun slaying of his son.

Sheriff V. W. Maddox said Roy C. Reynolds, 49, told him he fired one 16-gauge blast at William H. Reynolds, 32, after the son advanced on him and threatened to choke him to death.

The sheriff said the father and son argued heatedly before the shooting over the father's refusal to buy a rifle for his grandson.

Demo Senators Rap Defense Plan Of Eisenhower

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Eisenhower's demand for changes in a defense reorganization bill has met a cold reception from two Democratic senators.

Chairman Richard B. Russell (D-Ga.) of the Senate Armed Services Committee said that "so far as I am concerned, Congress is not going to surrender" its constitutional powers over the nation's military forces.

Other criticism of Eisenhower's position came from Sen. Mike Mansfield (D-Mont.).

The Senate Armed Services Committee will consider the bill after the House acts on it, possibly this week.

Eisenhower, although accepting the bill in large part, has asked for changes in three provisions written by the House Armed Services Committee.

One of these provisions would give Congress final say over any changes in the functions of an armed service, without the possibility of a presidential veto.

A second which Eisenhower finds objectionable would require the secretary of defense to exercise his authority over the individual services through their own secretaries.

A third controversial section would permit the secretaries and members of the Joint Chiefs of Staff to take appeals directly to Congress.

Calgary Man President Of Northwest Shriners

PORTLAND (AP)—The new president of the Northwest Shrine Assn. is Frank Fulton, Calgary, Alta.

He will preside over the next convention of the group which will be held in Calgary.

Fulton was elected as some 7,000 persons planned to participate in a parade through downtown Portland Saturday.

Other new officers include H. C. Anderson, Rawlins, Wyo.; Gordon Shafer, Vancouver, B. C.; and Gordon Gouldager, Eugene, all vice presidents.

The association named Floyd Kinser, Tacoma, to a second term as secretary and Walter Nielly, Boise, was re-elected treasurer.

Spokane was picked for the 1960 convention.
