

College Profs Come To Defense Of Indian Tribe

PULLMAN, Wash. (AP)—Two Washington State College professors came to the defense of north Idaho Indians Wednesday and said their study shows that charges of hunting violations against the Nez Perce tribe are false.

Irvan O. Buss, professor of wildlife management at WSC, and Richard D. Daugherty, assistant professor of anthropology, said the Nez Perce asked them to make the study two years ago.

"Data collected effectively dispose allegations that Indian hunters slaughter deer and elk in great numbers throughout the year," Dr. Daugherty said.

"The total kill of deer and elk by Indian hunters outside Idaho's regularly scheduled hunting season is so small it is not significant to wildlife management practices."

"Since the 202 reported hunters in the Nez Perce tribe of Indians shot an estimated 65 elk and 187 deer in 1955, as contrasted with 15,800 elk and 65,100 deer shot by licensed hunters during the same year in Idaho, it is evident that the kill of big game by Indians in the area is insignificant."

The professors said they were asked for help after the hunting charges reached the state Legislature and even members of Idaho's congressional delegation.

Much of the information for their report, they said, was obtained by questioning about 50 percent of the Indian hunters in northern Idaho.

HOPE OFFERED

Hospital Wins Verdict In Suit For Damages Here

A Circuit Court jury has found for the defendants in a \$35,000 personal injury suit tried before Judge Charles S. Woodrich.

Elizabeth Osborne brought the civil action against Forest Glen Hospital and owners Rollin L. and Esther I. Falk, claiming she suffered injuries to her back in a fall from a hospital bed May 29, 1955. She alleged negligence on the part of hospital operators.

The plaintiff asked for \$35,000 general and \$1,876 special damages.

Judge Woodrich has dismissed with prejudice a suit brought by Clay C. Anderson against Reedsport Lumber Co., Victor Lunn et al., claiming \$1,005 plus interest was due for services rendered by the logger in November of 1954. A judgement of nonsuit has been entered in the court record by Circuit Judge Carl E. Wimberly in a civil action filed by Ben J. Howard against Myrtle Burgoyne. The plaintiff sought \$10,000 general damages, \$250 medical expenses and \$2,000 for lost wages.

Howard claimed the defendant was negligent and failed to properly hook up a trailer in which he was to haul livestock to Riddle. En route the jeep used to pull the trailer turned over on Sept. 9, 1955.

Wildlife Control Measure Passed

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Senate Interstate and Foreign Commerce Committee passed and sent to the Senate floor Wednesday two measures aimed at protecting fish and wildlife.

Sen. Warren G. Magnuson (D-Wash.), committee chairman, said one bill would require any branch of the federal government to consult with the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service before altering fish or wildlife conditions through the construction of dams or canals or diversion of streams.

The other measure would require approval of the secretary of interior and the Federal Power Commission of any power development where fish and wildlife might be affected.

Magnuson said the provisions of both bills parallel authority now granted the Corps of Engineers regarding supervision of navigable waters.
