Oregon Farmers Received 2 Per Cent Less In May

CORVALLIS (AP) — Prices received by Oregon farmers dropped 2 per cent from mid-April to mid-May.

Mrs. Elvera Horrell, extension agricultural economist at Oregon State College, said this week, however, state farm prices were still 2 per cent higher than mid-May of 1957.

It was the second straight month that Oregon farm prices had declined, Mrs. Horrell said.

She said that a decline in prices of potatoes, hay, dairy products, lamb and food grains more than offset price increases for feed grains, beef cattle, calves, wool, and eggs.

School Year To Stay Same For Present

SALEM (AP)—Oregon's public school children were assured Thursday that the state probably will not lengthen the 1958-59 school year.

The state Board of Education took no action on the recommendation of its professional committee that the minimum school year be increased from 170 to 180 days of actual classroom instruction.

The board asked Rex Putnam, state superintendent of public instruction, to study the question, and report to the board at its next meeting Sept. 4-6.

At that time, the board is expected to refer the question to the 1959 Legislature.

The board received a letter from Kenneth Barneburg, Douglas County school superintendent, asking for a 180-day school year to permit "more emphasis on basic subjects."

But M. C. Deller, Roseburg school superintendent, said the Roseburg school board wants it left at 170 days.

Two Eugene women, Mrs. Fred Fox and Mrs. Edward Williams, wrote in support of a 170-day school year.

Delays Action
The board also delayed action on proposals to increase high school graduation requirements. It said it wants more information from local school officials.

The board announced that E. E. Brogotti, Helix, would become board chairman on Aug. 1. He will succeed Mrs. Lucille O'Neill, Klamath Falls. Brogotti recently was elected president of the National Assn. of State Boards of Education.

Other action by the board: Permitted Beaverton Union High School to reduce the length of its classes from 60 to 40 minutes. This is necessary, the board said, because the school will have to go on double shift because of overcrowding.

Approved appointment of an aviation consultant for the schools.

Approved the driver education handbook to be used in teaching pupils how to drive.

Voted to support a statewide conference on "the role of the secondary school" to be held here Nov. 6-7.

Approved the secondary teacher training programs at Linfield and Reed colleges.

Josephine County Road Worker Is Electrocuted

GRANTS PASS (AP)—A Josephine County road department worker, Joe Lamica, 35, Grants Pass, was electrocuted and two others burned in an accident with a concrete machine and a power line near the Illinois Valley town of Selma Thursday.

Reported to be in good condition at a local hospital were Arthur Honey, 55, and Leonard Clary, about 26, both of Grants Pass.

An elevated boom on the machine was reported to have come close enough to the power line to allow electricity to arc across. The men were standing beside the machine. Lamica reportedly with one hand touching it.

Judgments & Orders
Kenneth and Esther Copeland, dha C. & S. Feed and Seed vs. W. P. and Mary J. Jurgensen. A judgment against defendant over Jan. 15, 1956, promissory note of \$2,912, plus interest at 6 per cent, \$400 attorney fees and \$23.58 costs. Before Judge Charles S. Woodrich. Marcia L. Stone vs. Gus T. Rush. Order by Judge Woodrich on jury finding for plaintiff in sum of \$1,600 general and \$21 special damages surrounding car accident in Roseburg market parking lot Feb. 24, 1957. Plaintiff sought \$10,000 general damages.

City of Winston vs. Liles Ray and Margaret Gregory. Judge Woodrich ordered case over adjudication of sewer line right-of-way dismissed and bond returned to city. Winston asked for jury to determine easement price.

Grove Credit Service, Inc., vs. Earl V. Badger. An order by Judge Carl E. Wimberly that plaintiff recover \$300, interest and attorney fees, and real property held under attachment be sold to satisfy judgment.

State unemployment Compensation Commission vs. Ronald L. Owens. Judge Wimberly found defendant liable contractor in default and ordered him to pay 10 per cent of 196 to commission for unpaid employee contributions.

State of Oregon vs. William P. & Mary H. Weaver, et al. Jury found just compensation for property involved in reconstruction on U.S. 99, Myrtle Creek-Canyonville section to be \$14,640. Some parties other than Weavers found in default and claims dismissed. Case held before Judge Wimberly.

D. L. Parker, dha Parker Tire-cap Service vs. Guy Metcalf. Judge Wimberly ordered action dismissed with prejudice. Company alleged \$1,144 debt due for parts and services dating back to Oct. 30, 1957.

First Cattle Shipment To Leave New Zealand

AUCKLAND, New Zealand (AP)—The first shipment of 1,300 head of live cattle to be sent to San Diego for the Modern Imperial Cattle Co. of Imperial, Calif., will leave Taunanga by sea in 10 days. It will be the first of 10,000 head to be shipped over a year.

Meanwhile, another American has arrived in search of meat. Robert Griffith, of the Southern California firm of R.G. Griffith Meat Co., after a fruitless quest in Australia, comes "with no intention of jumping in feet first, pressuring anyone or wrapping things up in five minutes."

Griffith plans discussions with meat interests and the Department of Agriculture.
