Three Ducks Make NCAA Spike Finals

BERKELEY, Calif. (AP) — Three members of the five-man University of Oregon track and field squad went into the finals of the NCAA track championships here Saturday.

Two lost out in the preliminaries—D. C. Mills, in the javelin event, and Otis Davis in the two sprints. Davis reached the semifinals in the 220-yard dash before being eliminated.

Dave Edstrom qualified in the 120-yard high hurdles by finishing second in the third heat of the preliminaries. His time was 14.3 seconds. Edstrom failed, however, to qualify in the broad jump.

Steve Anderson qualified in the low hurdles. But he also lost out in the broad jump.

Jim Grelle, Oregon's distance star, will compete in the mile Saturday. There was no preliminary for this event.

Prep Stars Vie In Portland Meet

PORTLAND (AP) — The Pacific Northwest's top prep track stars met here Saturday in the annual AAU high school and junior track meet.

The meet drew some 200 entries, with the greatest attention centered on the mile and hundred yard dash events. Daryl Burleson of Cottage Grove was favored to win the mile because of his national prep mark of 4:13.2 set earlier this spring.

Jim Puckett, of Cove, Ore., faces tough competition in the hundred but has run the distance in 9.5. His hottest competition was expected from Tom Buckner, Washington sprint champion from Vancouver's Hudson's Bay High.

Chiefs Announce Hoop Slate For Next Season

SEATTLE (AP) — Seattle University announced a 28-game State 59 basketball schedule Friday. It includes meetings here with the University of San Francisco Dons and Xavier of Cincinnati, O., defending National Invitational Tournament champion.

The Chiefs, No. 2 team in the nation in 1958 but barred for two years from postseason competition because of an NCAA crackdown on recruiting violations, will open here Dec. 2 against College of Pacific and close March 8 against Gonzaga of Spokane.

The 28-game schedule is two games more than permitted colleges under NCAA rules but the school said three games will be played in Hawaii "which does not count against its game limit."

Senator Reports He Received Coat From Goldfine

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. Frederick G. Payne (R-Maine) said Saturday he once received a gift of a vicuna coat from millionaire industrialist Bernard Goldfine, whom he described as a "long and close friend."

"But he never asked me for one thing in the way of a favor," said Payne.

The 37-year-old lawmaker said Goldfine operates a woolen mill 100 miles from Payne's home town of Waldoboro. Their friendship dates back to the days when Payne was mayor of Augusta, the senator said.

Payne said his family and the Goldfines have exchanged gifts at Christmas time. When asked if he could recall details of the vicuna coat gift, Payne laughed and said: "No, Lord, I can't. It was some time ago—I can't remember the exact time."

Payne declined to comment on the burgeoning furor over favors given presidential aide Sherman Adams by Goldfine. These reportedly included a gift of a \$700 vicuna coat.

James Hagerty, White House news secretary, refused to say whether Adams received the coat or a \$2,400 oriental rug from Goldfine. Adams has been unavailable for comment.

Payne spoke highly of Goldfine as a man who was trying to help the New England textile industry get back on its feet.

"We have been friends for 25 years and I am very proud of this friendship," he said. "I know the four Goldfine children and Mrs. Payne and I are very fond of all of them."

Rose Festival Parade Staged

PORTLAND (AP) — Portland's Golden Anniversary Rose Festival parade formed Saturday morning with some 45 flower-covered floats, 32 bands and marching units, and 47 equestrian groups in the line of march.

Grand marshal of the parade was Guy Williams, who plays Zorro in the television series. He also was marshal of Friday's children's parade on Portland's East Side. Hundreds of youngsters in floats, on decorated bicycles, and in costumes took part.

The float sweepstakes winner was a 15-foot high spiral of flowers representing the modern architecture of the new Portland Zoo. It was entered by Russellville School.

The parade was led by Queen Pat Adams and Prince Minister Pat Casey, rulers of the junior Rose Festival.

Police estimated the crowd for the junior parade at 100,000.

Baptist Seminary Professors Fired

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (AP) — The embattled president of the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary expressed distress yesterday at the loss of close to one third of his faculty members.

Thirteen professors at the seminary were fired by the board of trustees Thursday as the climax to a long-simmering controversy concerning administrative policies.

Those dismissed included many long-time faculty members, among them Dr. Theron Price, widely noted church historian, and Dr. William H. Morton, who has directed archaeological work of the American Schools of Oriental Research at Jerusalem.

The faculty group opposed policies under which the seminary president, Dr. Duke K. McCall, had control of administrative decisions with the board of trustees.

A kick doubled up one. A blow bruised the face of another. A third was smeared by blood from fingernail scratches on his face and arms.

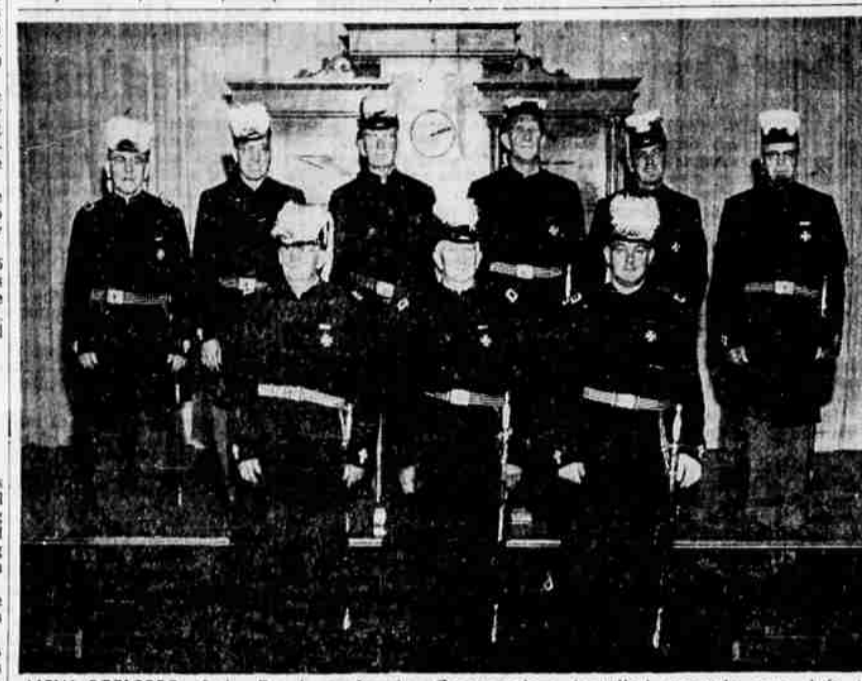

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Trujillo Won't Graduate But Gets Promotion

KANSAS CITY (AP) — Lt. Gen. Rafael Trujillo Jr., who got a major's commission at the age of three in the Dominican Republic, still is advancing up the military ladder.

Now 29 and attending the U.S. Command and General Staff College at Ft. Leavenworth, Kan., he may not graduate with his class next Friday but he will head a new combined chiefs of staff when he gets home.

Although he cannot fly a plane, his present title is commander of the Dominican air force.

His uncle, Dominican President Hector B. Trujillo, announced that the combined chiefs were being set up to better coordinate the army, navy and air force.

The general said last month he plans to go back to Hollywood to court film star Kim Novak some more on his way home after his class graduation.

A free-spending two-month sojourn in Hollywood during the spring interrupted Trujillo's classwork and aroused criticism in Congress.

Soviet Union Agrees To Begin Scientific Talks On Atomic Ban

MOSCOW (AP) — The Soviet Union has agreed to begin exploratory scientific talks in Geneva July 1 on ways to police any worldwide ban of nuclear explosions.

The Russian agreement came Friday in answer to proposals made Tuesday by President Eisenhower. Eisenhower's message avoided a flat U.S. commitment to stop testing atomic and hydrogen bombs. The West has insisted that technical talks on inspection must come first.

Russia announced in April that she was suspending nuclear tests and challenged the West to follow her lead. The Russians have consistently rejected the idea of inspection and control and have claimed the tests could be stopped by a simple declaration from the atomic powers, currently Russia, the United States and Britain, with France believed coming up fast.

Bernard Goldfine Undergoing Probe

NEW YORK (AP) — The New York Herald Tribune said Saturday Bernard Goldfine, friend of chief presidential assistant Sherman Adams, is under investigation of the criminal division of the Department of Justice.

In a dispatch from Washington, the newspaper said U. S. Atty. Paul W. Williams in New York has subpoenaed certain of Goldfine's books and records. The U.S. attorney's office is an arm of the Justice Department.

The Herald Tribune story continued: A spokesman for Atty. Gen. William P. Rogers declined official word on whether the Justice Department is conducting a parallel investigation of Goldfine in connection with a House subcommittee. However, the reports were not denied by the Justice Department.

The subcommittee is investigating charges that Goldfine received favored treatment from two federal regulatory agencies because of his friendship with Adams.

Adams conceded Goldfine paid his hotel bills in Boston totaling \$1,642 but flatly denied he sought preferred treatment for his friend.

BALLOTS SAID FORGED

MURRAY, Ky. (AP) — A circuit judge supervising recount of primary ballots cast in the election that unelected veteran Rep. Noble Gregory (D-Ky.) said yesterday ballots had been found which bore forged signatures.

Judge Earl Osborne said he is keeping a list of "obvious forgeries" on the ballots for future use by state and federal authorities.

Gen. Salan Says All Is Now Well With De Gaulle

ALGIERS (AP) — Gen. Raoul Salan indicated Saturday all is well now between Premier Charles de Gaulle's government in Paris and the French insurgents ruling troubled Algeria.

The general, a big question mark in the feud between Paris and Algiers, praised De Gaulle's television address Friday night and the junta's motion backing it up.

"They have solved all the problems," he said.

This apparently meant Salan now was falling in fully behind De Gaulle. Since the May 13 insurrection here it never was completely clear whose side Salan was on.

He acted as President Rene Coty's representative here but took the stand with the revolutionary junta. De Gaulle named him his personal delegate here, but it still never was certain he was supporting De Gaulle to the hilt.

Salan said the big problem in Algeria now is the revolt against the French by Algerian nationalists. He said he expects the rebels will step up their fight for independence and expressed the wish for troop reinforcements.

The supreme French commander in Algeria said the rebels have been increasing the number of attacks since De Gaulle visited here last week. Since then, he said in an interview, his troops had fought 150 battles on the battalion level.

Playmate Search Ends In Long Hop

SEATTLE (AP) — A search for a playmate ended for Charles James McMillan, 9, when the Western Airlines plane on which he stowed away landed here Friday night.

Dressed in a T-shirt and jeans, the youngster stood huddled in the aisle when the plane landed at 10:40 p.m. after a flight from Los Angeles.

Only then did airline officials realize they had a stowaway on their hands.

Charles, son of Mr. and Mrs. C. H. McMillan of Hawthorne, Calif., disappeared from his home Friday afternoon. How he got to Seattle still is something of a mystery.

According to Western's senior agent here, John Lee, the boy first said he boarded a Trans World Airlines plane in Los Angeles and transferred to Western's flight 628 in San Francisco.

Mixed Up Kid — The scared and hungry nine-year-old was somewhat mixed up, Lee said. Charles said he was going to Portland, Seattle, and even once announced he'd just arrived from New York.

"I don't have anybody to play with," Charles told Lee.

Asked if he had brothers and sisters, Charles said, yes, but they were too young for him.
