

Lockwood Hosts Lowell In Double Header Sunday

Behind the plate will be Byron Baker, Camas Valley. He is a veteran Lockwood catcher and currently is hitting .230.

Douglas County baseball fans will have their first opportunity to see the Lockwood Motors Legion team in action this year Sunday at Finlay Field.

The Lockwood nine will host the Lowell Legion club in a District One doubleheader which begins at 2 p.m.

Bill Harper's team takes a 2-2 pre-season mark into the district opener. The Lockwood nine holds wins over North Bend and Medford and has lost to the North Bend team and to the Cheney Studs Legion team of Central Point.

Second baseman Mike Hatfield is leading the Lockwood batters with a healthy .384 average. Hatfield has connected for five hits in 13 times at the plate, including two doubles. The five base blows by Hatfield give him four RBIs. He has scored five runs.

In one of the games with Lowell, Bob Whipple, Drain right-hander, will handle the mound chores. Whipple is 1-1 thus far, with a win over Medford and a loss to North Bend.

In the other contest, Harper might go with any one of five hurlers who have seen action this year or the chucking assignment could go to one of the untied hurlers.

Bill Eswine, Jerry Halladay, Dave Mansfield and Rick Summers, all right-handers, and southpaw John Livingston have all worked in the four games played thus far. Eswine holds the win over North Bend, while Livingston took the loss against Crater of Central Point.

At this early point of the season, the Lockwood club appears to be having difficulty with its hitting, according to Harper. But he says, "They have been looking ok other than that."

Just four regulars are hitting over the .200 mark, with the exception of Hatfield. Bob Scott and Ron Hoensch, both outfielders, own .250 averages. Catcher Byron Baker is hitting .230 and shortstop Don Wells .222. Hoensch, Baker and Wells all have collected two RBIs while Scott has one.

'New' Bolt Out To Hold Narrow National Open Golf Advantage

TULSA, Okla. (AP) — Fighting twin plagues of appetite and anger, the "new" Tommy Bolt set out Saturday to hold his lead in the National Open golf championship against two unexpected rivals.

The 39-year-old Bolt still flares up occasionally, but he was tranquil Friday despite the double bogey six that marred his second straight round of 71.

"I wasn't tired but I was awfully hungry," he said. "I had been out there 4½ hours and

hadn't eaten since breakfast. I didn't care much what I shot on that last hole.

As 55 survivors of the field which numbered 2,150 original entries and 162 starters here plunged into Saturday's final 36-hole marathon, the leaders were: Bolt at 142; Gary Player, the 22-year-old South African who is the tournament's only par-breaker so far, at 143; and 35-year-old Frank Stranahan at 144.

The two entrants from Tacoma, Wash., both failed to survive the halfway mark. Pro Ken Still finished Friday with an 80-85-165 and Dr. Herman Dahl, amateur, with an 82-86-168.

Missing for the first time in this stage in 18 National Opens was Sam Snead. Cary Middlecoff, two-time champion who shared the favorite's role, barely escaped elimination with 154. Four-time winner Ben Hogan, made a brief bid for the lead but wound up six strokes behind Bolt at 148.

Dick Mayer, defending champion, was farther back at 159 and Ken Venturi, brilliant leader of the younger generation of touring golfers, had 152.

The Big Guy, who last year won the batting crown at an unlikely 39 with an equally unlikely .388 average, has been having it tough so far. But Friday night he cracked a pair of singles, drove in two runs and scored one while reaching his percentage high — .295 — of the season as the Red Sox tightened their grip on second place with a 9-3 victory over Kansas City.

That left Boston eight games behind the American League leading New York Yankees, who were beaten 4-2 by the Detroit Tigers. Cleveland defeated fourth place Washington 10-1, and Baltimore and the Chicago White Sox ended a 5-5 tie at 14 innings because of a Baltimore error.

Willie Mays broke an 0-for-10 slump with a third-inning single for the Giants. He is tied for the NL lead at .392 with Cardinal Stan Musial, who was 0-for-2. Dodger Clem Labine won his third in relief. Ron Kline (6-7) was the loser.

Ohio Runner Tops NCAA 220 Mark As Fast Times Posted At Berkeley Meet

BERKELEY, Calif. (AP) — Les Carney, Ohio University sprinter, claimed a new NCAA track and field mark for the 220 yards around a curve Saturday, after preliminary events of the 37th meet.

Carney sped the furlong in 29.8 seconds Friday to eclipse the 29.9 set in 1955 by Northwestern's Jim Golladay. He beat such stars as San Jose State's Ray Norton, who had the best 100-yard time with 9.4, just one tenth of a second off the world record, and Ed Collymore of Villanova, the NCAA champion.

Other top performers in the preliminaries included Manhattan's Tom Murphy, with 1:50.0 in the 880; and Buster Quist of New Mexico with 2:39.9 in the javelin, with defending champion John Fromm of Pacific Lutheran second at 2:35.11.

On Saturday's program were two great races, the mile and the 440-yard dash.

USC and Kansas paced the qualifiers with six places each as 10 events Sunday preliminaries. The finals Saturday included all 14 NCAA events.

Dave Klieker, Whitman, placed third in 22.8 seconds Friday in a preliminary heat of the 220-yard low hurdles, and Walt Arlt, Washington State, was fourth in 23.9 in the same heat. Steve Anderson, Oregon, was fourth in 24.4 in another heat of the low hurdle preliminaries.

Klieker was second and Anderson third in the first heat of the 220-hurdle semifinals. Both were timed in 23.9. Arlt finished third in 23.6 in another heat of the hurdle semifinals.
