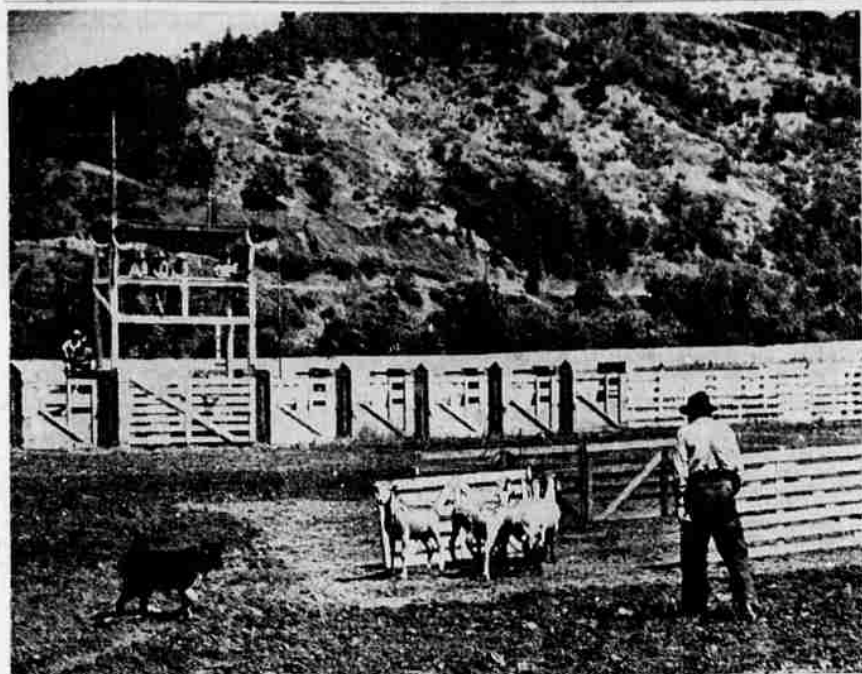


U.S. FAILS TO OBTAIN 9 FLIERS' RELEASE

Winners Listed In Annual Fat Lamb Exhibit

A record of 80 entries — and a total of 180 fat lambs — were shown Saturday in the 19th annual Douglas County Fat Lamb Show at the Fairgrounds.

Mrs. Joe Hunt, Sutherlin, walked away with the top money of the day. Her pen of five lambs was judged best of the show, winning \$50 from the sponsoring Douglas County Livestock Assn. and \$12.50 from the Willamette Valley Ram Sale Committee. Mrs. Hunt also placed a lamb fourth in the open division singles, winning another \$8, making her day's total \$75.00.

It probably came to more than that, for the Douglas Livestock Auction later offered 20 cents a pound for the best fat lambs shown at the Fairgrounds.

A. H. Doerner, Melrose, won the other half of \$25 put up by the ram sale committee. His fat lamb was judged best of the show and won \$12.50 from the committee and \$15 from the livestock association. In addition, he won \$10 for placing 13th in the open class pens. A feature of the show was the sheep dog trials annually held in conjunction with it.

Border Collies Vie

Two border collies named Bob placed one-two in the competition, in which they were required to drive a band of five sheep through a gate and pen them in less than 12 minutes.

The Bob owned by Albert Pelland, Sutherlin, penned his in 3 minutes, 28 seconds to win his master first prize of \$20. Darley Ware's lanky Bob did it in 3 minutes, 40 seconds for second prize of \$15.

The first four places were close. Pelland's Queen won third place and \$10, doing the job in 3 minutes, 32 seconds, and Art Ryckard's Con from Yoncalla took 4 seconds more than 4 minutes to pen his sheep.

Time is only one factor in the judging. Also counting are the manner in which the dog handles the sheep, the help needed from the handler and other factors.

Only five dogs were entered. The fifth dog, Kenneth Conn's Cubby from Roseburg had the ill luck to draw a hammer-headed quintet of wethers which refused to herd. It took the hard-working Cubby 9 minutes to finish the job.

Other Prizes Won

Queen won \$10 and Con \$5 for their masters.

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Adams Center Of Political Storm

Trade Group Plans Probe Of Ike's Aide

Recipient Of Goldfine Favors Both Defended, Criticized In Congress

WASHINGTON — A major political storm mounted around presidential assistant Sherman Adams today.

Chairman Oren Harris (D-Ark) promised to "develop all the facts we can" as he summoned the present and former heads of the Federal Trade Commission to determine whether that agency gave special treatment to Adams' old friend, Boston industrialist Bernard Goldfine.

Adams has acknowledged that he frequently stayed in an expensive Boston hotel suite for which Goldfine paid. He also has said he made two contacts with FTC officials on Goldfine's behalf. But President Eisenhower's top aide has branded as "unwarranted and unfair" what he called insinuations by Harris' subcommittee that he swung federal favors for Goldfine.

Adams was both attacked and defended by prominent Americans over the weekend. One of his staunchest supporters was his wife. Another was former FTC Chairman Edward F. Howrey, who testified today.

Howrey, who headed the FTC when Goldfine had trouble with the agency, said FTC "certainly treated him (Goldfine) no differently from anyone else and it was handled in a perfectly routine way."

Wife Raps Democrats

Mrs. Adams took congressional Democrats to task for the ordeal she said is being visited on her husband. They are "just going to hound him until he has to leave," she said in a copyrighted interview in the Minneapolis Tribune and Des Moines Register.

She said congressional committees take little things "that can be explained" and build them up until they destroy fine public officials.

Mrs. Adams acknowledged her family received many gifts from the Goldfines over the years, but pictured this a part of a friendly relationship between the two families.

Gabriel Hauge, Eisenhower's economic adviser, called Adams a man "with a sense of dedication to the public service, with a sense of probity and integrity with respect for public service."

Knowland Leads Attack

But Senate Republican Leader William F. Knowland (Calif.), running for the California governorship this year, led an imposing array.

Closing Periods Slated For North Umpqua Road

The North Umpqua Road will be closed during periods of weekdays for the next several weeks by construction on the extension of the road between Dry Creek and Marsters Bridge.

The contractor, C. H. Strong Construction Co., Eugene, was to start work on the project today.

The company won the job last month from the Bureau of Public Roads, bidding \$229,630 for grading of the 2.55-mile section. It includes construction of a 95-foot bridge across Dry Creek.

These are the times the road will be open, Monday through Friday, until further notice: 10:30 a.m. to 11 a.m.; noon to 12:30 p.m.; 3 p.m. to 3:30 p.m.; 5:30 p.m. to 8 a.m. The road will be open Saturdays and Sundays.

Also due to start work this week is Central Heating Co., Eugene, holder of the contract to pave between Rock Creek and Apple Creek on the North Umpqua Road.

Both contractors moved equipment to the area last week.

TERRE HAUTE, Ind. — A 30-foot stretch of the Sugar Creek levee broke at Terre Haute early today, flooding about 20 per cent of West Terre Haute and forcing some 1,000 persons to flee their homes.

Civil defense officials said the residents had ample warning and all were evacuated safely from the western Indiana town.

The break was on the Sugar Creek, a tributary to the Wabash River, and was about a mile upstream from where the creek empties into the Wabash River.

Gov. Harold W. Handley declared a state of emergency in Terre Haute Saturday at the request of local officials, who were worried that the earthen levees protecting West Terre Haute might give way and let floodwaters loose on the community.

Extra state police, 60 National Guard troops and 40 prisoners from the state penal farm at near-by Putnamville were rushed to the city to sandbag weak points on the levee. The Indiana Air National Guard was also being used and

sandbags were being flown in from Kansas City and Louisville.

Wabash Crest Due

The Wabash was expected to reach a crest of 28 feet at noon today. Flood level is 14 feet.

At Terre Haute proper, with a population of 85,000, it is on the east side of the river and is mostly on higher ground and not believed to be in danger.

The threat at Terre Haute came after the city of Anderson and most other northcentral Indiana communities passed their flood crisis.

Anderson, a battered earthen levee held up under pounding by the west fork of the White River, but extensive flood damage was reported in the city. The river crested at 29 feet Saturday night and has been falling slowly since.

Supreme Court Post Filled

Kenneth J. O'Connell, U. Of O. Law Professor, Named By Gov. Holmes

SALEM — Kenneth J. O'Connell, a scholarly professor at the University of Oregon Law School, Sunday was appointed to the Oregon Supreme Court.

The appointment was made by Gov. Robert Holmes, who said the 48-year-old O'Connell "has had a very distinguished career."

O'Connell was appointed to replace Justice James Brand, 72, who resigned effective July 1—to become a law professor at Stetson University in Deland, Fla.

"I plan to run for a regular term in the fall," said O'Connell at his Eugene home. "I plan to do whatever campaigning I am able to do."

The term O'Connell seeks will be for six years. The job pays \$13,500 a year.

O'Connell is a graduate of the University of Wisconsin and was brought to the Oregon faculty in 1953 by Wayne Morse, then the law school's dean and now a U.S. senator.

In explaining the reasons for the appointment, Holmes said, "I honestly feel that as much as possible the governor should balance the composition of the court."

"It should contain lawyers who have had a well-rounded practice. Areas of specialization are fine to be represented. Mr. O'Connell represents the scholarly approach."

"There is no question but that he has as thorough an understanding of the law as anyone."

Three Die In Crashes On Oregon Highways

An automobile left the highway 30 miles northwest of Burns Sunday and threw its driver to his death.

It was the third highway death of the weekend in Oregon.

The Burns accident killed Isadore Lavinsky, 46, of Miami, Fla., and critically injured his wife, Betty Maude, 50. She was reported somewhat improved Monday in Harney County Hospital at Burns.

The Lavinskys apparently were on an extended vacation trip, police said.

A Portland youth was an automobile victim as he stood on the curb beside his own car Saturday.

He was Ronald French, 17. Another car, driven by Roy Ramsey Glover, 63, struck young French's car and drove it against him.

An Oregon State College student, Rodney Albert Alexander, 22, of Milwaukie, died Saturday in the plunge of his car over a high bank and into a stream.

Monday morning the Oregon highway toll for the year in the Associated Press tabulation stood at 156.

Glimpse Of Sputnik III Reward Of Early Riser

What was taken to be Sputnik III's carrier rocket made a brief visit over Western Oregon early Sunday and was spotted by at least one Roseburg resident.

Dan Olin, administrative assistant on the Umpqua National Forest, said he was up with the chickens Sunday in time to see the carrier rise out of the southwest at 3:46 a.m., the time scheduled for its appearance.

It was in view for about a minute, moving to the northeast, Olin said it appeared to be about 70 degrees above the horizon to the east.

Olin said it was as bright as a first-magnitude star at first and the rocket appeared to be tumbling, with the reflected light reaching peaks, then dimming.

It disappeared after about a minute into a haze in the northeast sky.

Some 49 members of the Roseburg Knights of Pythias Drum and Bugle Corps embarked on a tour of famed Disneyland this afternoon after their arrival in Los Angeles, where they will participate Wednesday in the National Junior Chamber of Commerce "Parade of the States."

A charter bus whisked 39 members of the group southward early Sunday. The other 10 left on a regularly scheduled bus. They were slated to arrive in Los Angeles at 9 a.m. today.

Trip expenses were furnished through various projects carried on by the Roseburg Jaycees and the girls themselves.

Jaycees projects, including the "block of dimes" a week ago, a used car auction last Friday and a solicitation campaign, brought in the bulk of the funds. The goal of \$2,000 was realized, said Dr. V. J. Anderson, a fund-raising campaign leader.

Anderson said the winning bidder on one of the auctioned cars had not been located. He urged the bidder, one Red Kaine, to contact the Jaycees and obtain the automobile.

Anderson said the Elks Club and the U.S. National and Douglas County Banks each contributed

\$100. The Jay-Cettes gave \$50 and the Knights of Pythias \$25 in contributions.

Exhibitions Slated

Tuesday, the girls will participate in marching exhibitions and will tour local points of interest.

The big parade, held in conjunction with the national Jaycees convention, will wind its way through downtown Los Angeles streets Wednesday morning.

Anderson said Roseburg will be the only out-of-California city represented in the parade. The opportunity came about when an eastern state failed to submit an entry, creating a vacancy in the parade lineup.

The girls will carry banners publicizing both the 1959 Oregon Centennial and the Roseburg area as a vacationland.

Accompanying corps members is Billy Black, who is in his 18th year as director of the talented unit.

Four local Jaycees and their wives are attending the annual confab. They are Merv Hise, Clarence Paul, Bob Rattensperger and Jack Spindler.

Strikes May Tie Up 700 Ships In U.S.

Marine Engineers, Tanker Crews Back Four-Point Demands

NEW YORK — Two maritime unions struck today, refusing to sail without contracts.

A walkout of 1,700 engineers and 10,000 unlicensed tanker seamen could tie up nearly 700 American-flag ships operating out of East and Gulf Coast ports.

The striking unions, the Marine Engineers Beneficial Assn. and the National Maritime Union, said negotiations would pick up again later in the day. Meanwhile, they said, "no contract, no sailing."

The engineers are employed on 448 dry cargo and passenger ships, the 10,000 seamen on 231 oil tankers.

A third union, the American Radio Assn., bargained through the night and into the daytime hours with shipowners on behalf of radio operators.

Radio men earn \$569 a month for a 40-hour week.

All contracts expired last night. The Engineers' contract with the tankers runs until next year.

Four-Pronged Demand

The Engineers' negotiations broke down over four major items, the union said. They were:

Increases in retirement pensions from \$100 to \$250 a month; increases in paid vacations, "substantial" wage increases and a clause providing that if an operator sells or transfers his ship the MEBA contract must follow the ship or the operator must pay one year's severance pay.

Engineers pay ranges from \$493 a month for junior engineers to \$1,052 for chief engineers.

The AMU agreement with the dry cargo and passenger ship operators is subject to union membership ratification. A three-year pact, it provides for no change in wages but permits reopening the wage issue at union option twice.

Seamen now receive a monthly base pay of \$357 for a 40-hour week.

The formula provides an improved vacation schedule, increased pension payments and hospital benefits and increased supplementary unemployment benefits.

Pacific Highway Bridge Job Bids To Be Opened

The Oregon Highway Commission Tuesday will open bids for construction of a 204-foot, three-span reinforced concrete bridge to carry the Pacific Highway over the north access road from Myrtle Creek.

The bridge is scheduled to be open for traffic by early autumn and to be completed by late autumn this year to coincide with the relocation of the highway between Myrtle Creek and Ford's Bridge.

The commission said the contractor probably will have to work two shifts during much of the job to have the bridge ready for traffic on schedule.

A second project to be contracted by the commission Tuesday is removal of some 46,500 cubic yards of slide material along the Pacific Highway about two miles south of Wolf Creek. The highway was blocked there for several hours by a slide last winter, and the area is an habitual troublemaker to highway maintenance.

In all, 26 projects are on the commission docket Tuesday, with cost estimated at \$6,600,000. The commission will meet in Salem.

MAYOR DIES

SILVERTON (AP) — Jacob Bercholdt, 79, mayor of Mt. Angel for 22 years until his retirement last January, died Sunday in a Silverton hospital.

GIRLS' STATE OPENS

SALEM (AP) — The 17th annual week-long Girls' State opened Monday at Willamette University.

About 240 girls were expected to attend the sessions, sponsored by the American Legion Auxiliary.

The girls will set up simulated state and county governments to aid them in learning citizenship.

Water Resources Board To Talk Budget Slash

Members of the Douglas County Water Resources Advisory Committee met tonight at 7:45 for what they consider one of their most vital sessions.

The meeting will be devoted to a discussion of the cuts made by the county Budget Committee from the Douglas County Water Resources Survey office budget.

The original budget request was more than \$50,000. It was trimmed by the advisory committee to \$40,000 and then slashed to \$28,380 by the budget committee.

Members of the advisory committee have issued a strong appeal to citizens of the county to attend the meeting tonight in an effort to mobilize public opinion before the budget hearing.

E. Germans Raise Issue Of Prestige

Insist On Recognition Of Their Government, Spurn Compromise Bid

BERLIN (AP) — The United States failed Monday in its second contact with Communist East Germany—to win the release of nine U.S. Army men held prisoners.

Responsible diplomatic sources said the Communists insisted that the helicopter case be negotiated on a government-to-government level.

East Germany's Foreign Ministry rejected a compromise formula on protocol put forward by the American negotiator, U.S. Army Col. Robert B. McQuail of Bluefield, W.Va.

In a 40-minute meeting at the East Berlin Ministry, McQuail reportedly presented credentials from Gen. H. I. Hodess, the U.S. commander-in-chief for Europe. He also indicated he was negotiating with the approval of the State Department.

Seeking international prestige for their regime, the Communists apparently demanded that McQuail show diplomatic accreditation.

McQuail walked into the East Berlin Ministry at noon. He was accompanied by Maj. Raymond J. McCrory Jr. of Wauwatosa, Wis., of the U.S. liaison mission in Potsdam and three soldiers who kept newsmen from getting close enough to ask questions.

The first contact was made Saturday by McQuail, chief liaison officer to the Russian army in East Germany. It reversed a nine-year U.S. policy of no direct dealings with the East Germans.

The prisoners—eight officers and a sergeant from the 3rd Armored Division in West Germany—were seized by the Reds June 7 when their helicopter strayed across the Iron Curtain in a thunderstorm.

As the price for release of the Americans, the East Germans are demanding negotiations on an intergovernmental level that would give their regime more prestige.

Suitor Guns Two Officers, Wounds Parents Of Girl

PENSACOLA, Fla. (AP) — An enraged suitor killed a deputy sheriff and wounded his girl friend's parents and another deputy last night.

The assailant then fled into a nearby wooded area of a Pensacola suburb with his sweetheart following him. The girl, Wessie Jerigan, 19, was found a short time later near her home.

The Alabama highway patrol reported that Alabama and Florida state and local police were alerted to watch for Ed Golden, 25, identified as the gunman.

The Alabama patrol reported that the Escambia County, Fla., sheriff's office said Deputy Bert Adams, 32, died soon after the shooting of a bullet wound in the head.

In critical condition at a Pensacola hospital is Pierce Jerigan, 48, the girl's father. Less seriously wounded at the same hospital is Escambia Deputy Leslie Brock, 31, who suffered a bullet wound in the neck, and the girl's mother, Mrs. Essie Jerigan, who suffered a flesh wound in the right shoulder.

Garland Wilson, radio operator for the Escambia County sheriff's department, said Golden and the girl were in Golden's car parked at the Jerigan home when the deputies arrived about 10:15 p.m.

He said Golden, using a .32-caliber pistol, shot first Brock and then Adams as they approached the car.

Wilson said neither deputy had an opportunity to return the fire.

He added that Golden then left his car, took Brock's .38-caliber pistol and went into the Jerigan home, where the girl's parents were wounded.

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
