

### Tito Defends U. S. Help Acceptance In Swat At Reds

BELGRADE, Yugoslavia (AP)—President Tito and the Soviet bloc swapped broadsides Saturday. Tito defended his acceptance of U. S. aid, and Peiping radio compared him with Judas Iscariot for taking the American help.

Tito asked a crowd of 50,000 in the coal mining town of Labin what right Nikita Khrushchev had to attack Yugoslavia for getting U. S. aid when the Soviet Premier himself was soliciting credit from Washington.

The Yugoslav President said American aid had been sent to his country after his break with Stalin in 1949 "because hunger threatened here and in order to help us to protect our independence against Stalin."

### Darkness Ends Effort To Shoot Down Blimp

Sheriff Ira C. Byrd took to the skies over Douglas County Saturday evening in an effort to shoot down a large blimp of the Navy patrol type that broke its mooring cable at Eugene, but darkness closed in before he could sight it.

The object of the search was identified as one used for sky advertising purposes at Eugene. It was said to be used to advertise a used car lot there.

By that time the blimp had drifted across southern Douglas county and was headed in the general direction of Medford. Several Civil Defense spotters saw it.

It is believed the blimp, which had enough gas to keep it aloft 24 hours, is down somewhere in the rugged Southwestern Oregon forests.

**NO FIRE DAMAGE**  
A Douglas Forest Protective Assn. crew put out an eight-acre grass fire Sunday three miles east of Myrtle Creek. No damage was reported in the fire which started from sparks from an incinerator. The call was received at 1:35 p.m.

### Revival Spirit Retention Urged By Billy Graham

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—Billy Graham, who has ended his seven-week evangelistic battle with the Devil here, wants the fervor to linger.

"Carry the spirit of revival back to your churches," he told a crowd of 18,500 jammed into the Cow Palace for the final crusade session Sunday.

"Get into that church," Graham pleaded. "If you wait a week or two, Satan will take advantage of you."

He declared to the throng packed into the 18,500-seat arena that "some of you are like Judas. You are greedy and will sell your soul and your future for a few pieces of silver. Some of those who steal from God are those with the most money."

Turning to another matter of money, the North Carolina preacher said advance contributions and weekday offerings for the free meetings might not have met all expenses of the crusade, which he estimated at \$400,000.

As assistants toured the aisles collecting offerings, he asked "that you give generously to make sure all expenses are met." Totals were not immediately available.

Total attendance for the seven weeks rose to 696,525. The 570 going forward in "decisions for Christ" brought that total to 25,575.

"If you live less than your best you are committing a sin. Just enough religion to be respectable is one of the sins that nailed Jesus to the cross," Graham said.

"Christ went a long way for you. You can take a few steps for Him."

After visiting Yosemite National Park tomorrow with his 13-year-old daughter Virginia, Graham will rest until Sunday when he will speak at a Seals Stadium rally here. Then he'll tour California.

### Three Drownings Toll In Weekend

Clinton Worden, about 50, of Portland, was washed overboard from the crab boat Heron off Tillamook Sunday. Others on the boat plunged in and brought him ashore but efforts to revive him failed.

Police Saturday recovered the body of Robin Davis, 17, of Idaho, from a mill pond near Mill City. Officers said the boy apparently had slipped off a raft, hit his head on a winch and tumbled into the water. Resuscitation efforts failed.

A search party found the body of DeWayne L. Miller, 39, an Interior Department employee, in the Applegate River about 30 miles southwest of Medford Saturday.

Miller had gone to the river Friday to measure water speed at a station near Copper. His body was recovered about 2 1/2 miles downstream from the point where he entered the water to take measurements.

He was born Aug. 28, 1888 at Carthage, Mo., and had lived in Roseburg since 1951, moving here from Albany. Ruddick, a World War I veteran, was a member of the Baptist Church in Oklahoma and Roseburg American Legion.

He is survived by his wife, Millie, of Roseburg; one daughter, Mrs. Lorraine Russell, of Millwaukie; two sons, Billy and Walter Jr., both of Roseburg; three grandchildren, three brothers and two sisters.

Funeral services will be held at 2:30 p.m. Tuesday in Ganz Mortuary at Myrtle Creek. Interment will follow in the Roseburg Memorial Gardens.

### Sewer Project's Cost City Council's Problem

Financing problems facing Miller's Addition sewer improvements will be aired tonight at 7:30 o'clock by residents of the area and city officials.

The council chambers session was called early this month when it was discovered that low assessed valuations in Miller's Addition threatened the project. This was learned after bids for the sewer work had been received.

The dollar dilemma concerns the bonding capacity of much of the property in the addition. The engineer's estimate of the cost of sewers is about \$200 for a 50-foot lot. State law limits residents to bonding their property at twice the assessed valuation.

Some of the lots in the addition are assessed at only \$40 which would put owners \$220 short of the amount needed for sewer installation.

### Stray Bullets Put Three In Hospital

Three stray bullets put three people into surgery in Oregon in recent days, the latest a boy pinked at a carnival shooting gallery at Portland's Rose Festival Sunday.

Gary Anderson, 13, was in a booth adjoining the shooting gallery when a bullet ricocheted and hit him in the leg. Surgery removed it.

A 6-year-old Mill City girl, Judy Bernard, was troubled for several days with what appeared to be a nail cut on a leg. But when it became infected, surgery disclosed a .22 caliber bullet. Sheriff's deputies said it probably came from a gun fired by boys who had been playing.

Most seriously hurt was a Klamath County man, E. G. Guizette, 24, hit by a .22 in target practice Friday near Algona, in northern Klamath County. The bullet struck him in the abdomen, and he was reported recuperating Monday in a Klamath Falls hospital.

### Lost Boy Scout Rescued With Aid Of Bloodhounds

SALEM (AP)—A Boy Scout had only a bad cold to show Monday for his overnight ordeal in the timbered wilderness near the summit of the Cascade Mountains.

A team of bloodhounds early Sunday led Norman Wilson of Dallas to the spot where Albert Donovan, 16, Salem, was wandering, lost in the dense timber.

The 5-1, 104-pound scout became lost Saturday when he left fishing companions at a lake and tried to make his way back to a Boy Scout camp alone.

Donovan was soaked to the skin when found. His mother said he came down with a bad cold Sunday night, but otherwise was unharmed.

### Goldfine's Favor Late Maine Primary Issue

PORTLAND, Maine (AP)—Maine voters choose party nominees today after a dull primary campaign in which the friendship of Bernard Goldfine and Sen. Frederick G. Payne (R) became an 11th hour issue.

The 37-year-old Payne, who wants a second term, disclosed in Washington he once accepted a vicuna coat from Goldfine but said the Boston textile millionaire never asked him for favors.

Payne's opponent Herman D. Sabagian, 61, told home town supporters in Belgrade that Payne was acting like "a man who is trying to cover something." He added: "When I need a coat I buy my own."

The winner meets democratic Gov. Edmund S. Muskie, 44, unopposed today, in the final September election. Maine will ballot in November, with the other states, starting in 1960.

Also at stake are nominations for three House seats, the first four-year term for governor, a Legislature and county offices.

### Boy Fatally Burned In National Park Pool

YELLOWSTONE NATIONAL PARK, Wyo. (AP)—A 6-year-old boy's curious inspection of a steaming pool of water near Old Faithful geyser led to death.

Danny Lewis of Austin, Minn., lost his balance and fell into the natural formation Friday. He died Saturday of burns over his entire body.

Danny had been fishing with his father William Lewis in a clear stream nearby. The father pulled him from the boiling pool, one of several thousand in the park.

### Mass Doctor Care Purchase Spread Planned By Union

WASHINGTON (AP)—Labor unions pledged Monday to spread the mass purchase of doctor care for workers, despite growing objections from the medical profession.

Dr. Morris Brand of New York, president of the American Labor Health Assn., charged that objections from medical groups were "motivated largely by economic rather than ethical principles."

He referred to criticism from the American Medical Assn. and state and local medical societies that mass purchase of medical care interposes a third party between doctor and patient.

Dr. Brand, head of the Sidney Hillman Health Center of the Amalgamated Clothing Workers Union, said in a statement prepared for the opening session of a two-day labor health conference.

"Certain segments of the medical profession have been doing everything in their power to prevent the establishment of consumer and union sponsored prepaid group practice medical programs."

"Their activities take the form of coercion, social and professional ostracism, restrictive legislation and other overt and covert acts. These activities by the medical politicians have been increasing."

A reply to these charges is expected from the AMA at its San Francisco convention next week. Meanwhile, the AMA sent an observer and staff of public relations men to look in on the labor health conference.

standing of law as anyone in the state," Holmes said.

"Workhorse" Preferred  
"Without deprecation to anyone on the bench, I have felt we should have young men. There is a great backlog of cases.

"One way to solve it is to have people with the energy to work long hours. I feel that O'Connell will be a real workhorse," the governor said.

It was the second appointment made by Holmes to the Supreme Court. The first appointee was Gordon Sloan of Astoria. Like O'Connell, Sloan is in his 40s.

Both appointees are Democrats. O'Connell said, though, that before coming to Oregon in 1955 he was a Progressive Republican in Wisconsin. He added he never has taken an active role in politics in the state.

"There is no room for politics in our judiciary," said Holmes. "I certainly would appoint a man of the other party if I found him to be the most qualified."

The governor said he probably will administer the oath of office to O'Connell here next Friday.

Holmes said one of the things that brought O'Connell to his attention was the professor's work as chairman of the Statutes Revision Council.

O'Connell was appointed to that post by the late Gov. Paul Patterson, a Republican, and helped guide a thorough housecleaning of Oregon's law books.
