The Lockwood Motors Legion baseball club kicked off its District One season on a highly successful note Sunday. Two top-heavy wins over the Lowell Legion nine were in the record books at the end of 4 1/2 hours of ball at Finlay Field. When the action ceased, it was wins by 12-1 and 17-0 scores for Lockwood.

Some 400 fans saw a variety of interesting baseball. The highlight of the afternoon was lefty John Livingston's no-hit, no-run effort for Lockwood in the second game of the doubleheader.

Livingston handcuffed the Lowell team almost as completely as a chucker can as he wrote a new record in the books for number of strikeouts in a Lockwood Legion team contest.

The hard working southpaw whiffed 17 batters for a new standard for seven-inning tilts. Ron Beamer held the record for a seven-inning game with 16, and still holds the mark set last year for number of strikeouts in a nine-inning fray. That number is 19.

Against the Glendale hurler, the Lowell nine could have been swinging with two bats. He was untouchable. Just 23 batters faced him. The two reaching first did so by a walk and by an error. Just one ball was hit out of the infield and there were just four infield chances.

Here's a summary of Livingston's outstanding day:
Whiffed the first seven out of nine men to face him.
Retired the side in order in every inning but the third and fifth.
Used an average of 13 pitches per inning, or slightly over four per batter.

Was behind the batter on only four occasions.
Struck out the side in the first, second and seventh.
Collected two runs batted in and ended the afternoon with one for six and four RBI's.

The performance, by a hurler, was the finest by far at Finlay Field this year. With his chucking Sunday, Livingston has now pitched 11 innings of hitless ball.

The fine job was unfortunate in one respect. It overshadowed another fine bit of hurling by the other Lockwood front-line man, Bob Whipple.

Whipple pitched four-hit ball and he, too, somewhat silenced the Lowell bats with 10 strikeouts. He gave free passes to two. The big moundman also helped his cause with a held scoreless by left-hander Frank Weber. The Sutherland nine came up with the game-winning run.

Gene Polley led off with a single and advanced to second when Weber gained line on an error. Then catcher Earl Plueard went for the 1-1 pitch by Leon Hayes and leveled a line shot to left to break up the ball game.

6 Records Fall In Oregon AAU
PORTLAND (AP)—Sharon Shepherd, a 17-year-old Salem athlete, cracked a national women's record in the 8 1/2-hour-long Oregon AAU track meet here Saturday.

Shepherd hurled the eight-pound shot 44 feet, 10 inches in the women's portion of the meet. It easily was the meet's outstanding performance, and shaded the recognized national record of 42-10 1/2, set in 1951 by Amelia Bert in Harrisburg, Pa.

Five other records were toppled in the marathon meet, all but one in the high school division.

That came in the open competition, when Erv Garrison of Oregon College of Education tossed the javelin 218 feet, 5 inches—just three inches more than the record set by Oregon's Chuck Missfeldt in 1952.

Spear Record Broken
The prep javelin record also fell, before a 204 feet, 10 1/2 inch heave by Glen Wingham of Grants Pass. The old mark of 194 1/2 was set by Medford's Eldon Francis in 1953.

Jefferson of Portland turned in a record performance of 1:30.9 in the 880-yard relay, while Henry Wyborne of Port Angeles, Wash., soared 6 feet, 4 inches to set a new high jump standard.

Fleet little Jim Puckett of Cove High School cracked the other record—with a time of :49.4 in the 440-yard dash.

The former mark of :50.2 was set by Siegmar Ohlemann of Vancouver, B.C., at last year's meet. Puckett's time in the 100 was only :10.1, but it was good enough for first place.

MINNEAPOLIS (AP)—A 11-America Elgin Baylor, signed by the Minneapolis Lakers for a reported \$20,000, was handed the monumental job Monday of saving the franchise of a team that was once pro
