Americans Able To See Few Signs In Business Pickup; Seasonal Trends Helpful

NEW YORK (AP) — Americans who turned their thoughts away from vacation plans were able to scan a few signs in the business picture this week.

Many indicators pointed upward, some reflecting seasonal trends as hot weather hit much of the country. Big things were in the works in Washington which could give a shot in the arm to the railroads and copper mines.

Wall Street liked what it saw and the stock market rode up to new high ground for 1958.

Commerce Secretary Weeks commented: "Recent business statistics have looked better than at any time since the decline started last year. The field day of the head-wringing pessimist is about over."

Pickup In Appliances

Appliance men noted a slight pickup in business but hesitated to draw conclusions. Robert Paxton, president of General Electric Co., put it this way: "Some of our people see a few rosin."

Steel output and rail freight traffic reached the highest levels since December. Much steel buying was aimed at heating a July 1 price increase. Steel shipments and a bumper winter wheat crop boosted carloadings.

Electric power production rose almost of last year, largely due to a whopping 25 per cent increase in the Middle South.

Oil refineries worked at the fastest pace since early January. Little by little, the petroleum companies were shaking off their Washington provided some encouraging data on the month of May. New home starts rose by one million annual rate for the first time since January.

Personal Income Higher

Personal income was higher, led by the first gain in wage payments since last August. A boost in construction payrolls was a new factor.
