

Northwest Public Power Opposing Line Plan Of IPC

PORTLAND (AP)—The Northwest Public Power Assn. is protesting an Idaho Power Co. plan to build a seven million dollar transmission line from Brownlee Dam to Lewiston.

The association said an informal protest had been filed with the Federal Power Commission, the agency which licensed Idaho Power to build the low dam in the

Hells Canyon reach of the Snake River.

The public power group said construction of such a transmission line would violate terms of the license. These terms, Northwest said, require that transmission lines be coordinated with existing facilities in the region.

Studies made by the Idaho Power Co. and the Bonneville Power Administration show that a shorter and more economic line to La Grande, Ore., would be the best means of connecting to the existing facilities, Northwest said.

The construction of duplicative and wasteful transmission lines is contrary to sound utility economics and utility regulation and is contrary to the public interest,

said Gus Norwood, executive secretary of Northwest Public Power. The association said that the IPC line, as planned, would inflate the cost of power.

Norwood said a similar complaint last year by the association

forced Pacific Power and Light Co. to abandon a plan to build a duplicative line from the Swift project on the Lewis River to Troutdale, Ore. Instead the line was tied into the federal system at Woodland, Wash., he said.

Potlatch Forests Inc. Extends Union Contract

LEWISTON, Idaho (AP)—The existing contract between Potlatch Forests Inc. and the International Woodworkers of America, representing 3,000 PFI employees in North Idaho, has been extended to June 1, 1959, without a wage increase at this time.

Agreement to extend the contract was reached Friday, with the union gaining a modified wage reopener clause. Under it, the question of wages can be reopened by either party on 30 days written notice given prior to Oct. 15.

WOULD STOP TESTS—Sen. Henry M. Jackson (D-Wash.) has proposed that the United States halt its above-ground nuclear tests for six months after it completes the current series in the Pacific. Jackson, a member of the Senate Armed Services Committee and Joint Congressional Atomic Energy Committee, said the suspension would not hurt the U.S. defense effort and would aid negotiations with the Russians for a future test ban.

SEATTLE (AP)—To test de-icing equipment on engine cowling of the 707 commercial jet airliner, Boeing Airplane Co. engineers rigged up a weird-looking "catcher's mask" device to coat an engine with ice aloft.

A company spokesman said this week the Civil Aeronautics Administration de-icing tests, just completed, were speeded up by use of the special device.

Natural icing conditions sometimes are hard to find, so Boeing decided to give nature a helping hand.

The device extends five feet in front of the engine intake and consists of 14 parallel bars equipped with 109 spray nozzles. They shoot waters at the engine from two 160-gallon tanks in the plane. The bars resemble venticular blades.

At high altitudes the spray quickly turned to ice on the cowlings. The de-icing system, feeding hot air from the engine to the inside of the cowlings, was turned on when the ice became one fourth of an inch thick. The ice melted in less than 30 seconds.

One television and two motion picture cameras were mounted on the framework of the device to check results of this phase of the CAA certification tests. A 21-inch TV set inside the plane monitored the action.

A spokesman for the Cafe de Paris said Lewis quit, as his \$7,500 a week contract allowed him, to take movie role. The club, a new tourist attraction which opened three weeks ago, was only half full for Lewis' first show Tuesday, and had a smaller audience for the second, and last, performance.

By noon Wednesday it was decided to make his show a one-night stand.

Lewis, 22, abruptly ended his English tour recently after unfavorable publicity over his marriage to a 13 year old.

Marie MacDonald Takes Overdose Sleeping Pills

LAS VEGAS, Nev. (AP)—Actress Marie MacDonald was reported in satisfactory condition today after an accidental overdose of sleeping pills put her in a hospital.

Miss MacDonald was taken by ambulance from her hotel to a hospital in neighboring Henderson last night. Her stomach was pumped.

Woman Demands Blood For City Parking Tickets

KERRVILLE, Tex. (AP)—Mrs. Monroe Kensing became so annoyed at getting parking tickets that she demanded — with success — that the police department pay her back in blood.

On the back of a Red Cross sticker she wrote this message to Policeman Billy J. White when she paid her fines:

"I have received about a dozen parking tickets the last six weeks while I have been working on 'donor recruitment' for the Red Cross blood program. . . I have earned all of the tickets because this is time consuming work and I can't always get back to my car."

"But I just thought of a way these tickets can help me, we are looking for new donors. . . So, will Officer White please fill out the enclosed card and return it?" White not only responded but brought along three fellow officers. Each donated a pint of blood to the Red Cross.
