

Springfield Rate Slash Justified, PP&L Declares

SALEM (AP) — Pacific Power & Light Co. said Monday that it cut any rates in the city of Springfield, it did it legally to meet competition of the municipal electric system.

The privately owned utility filed that answer Monday with Howard Morgan, state utilities commissioner, in answer to a complaint originally issued more than a year ago.

Moreover, the PP&L answer said, the Springfield municipal utility had "repeatedly and unlawfully violated" its established rates and regulations.

This was done, PP&L charged, in an effort to take away PP&L's business in the city.

Francis F. Hill, attorney at Portland for the private utility, said the company and its predecessor, Mountain States Power Co., were authorized under a 1950 PUC order to operate with competitive rates in Springfield.

If the company could not do this, Hill said, it would be deprived of its property without due process of law.

The company said the municipal utility made improper charges for some customers, failed to collect certain charges and cut rates to some commercial and industrial customers.

U.S. Action Bars Courtesy Flight Of Soviet Plane

VANCOUVER, B.C. (AP) — The possibility of interception by U.S. Air Force jet fighters has put a damper on a courtesy flight by the Soviet Union's TU104 jet airliner on exhibition here.

The plane, biggest attraction at the Centennial Air Show, was scheduled to fly 75 miles from Sea Island Airport to Victoria, the British Columbia capital on Vancouver Island.

It flew instead in the Greater Vancouver area after Royal Canadian Air Force officials said they had been unable to gain assurance from the U.S. Air Force that the Soviet plane wouldn't be chased by U.S. fighters should it cross the international boundary.

A spokesman for the 25th Air Division of the U.S. Air Force Command at McChord Air Force Base near Tacoma, Wash., said he had no knowledge of the TU104's proposed flight. He indicated that any aircraft would have to come from higher headquarters.

He did say, however, that any plane that flew an approved flight plan with the Civil Aeronautics Administration as an approved U.S. territory would not be challenged.

"We challenge only those aircraft that cannot be identified," the spokesman added.

Gov. Hammaran Labels Gov. Faubus A 'Quizzing'

KEOKUK, Mo. (AP) — Gov. Warren E. Hearnes called Arkansas Gov. Orval Faubus a "quizzing" last night in a broadcast honoring the 100th anniversary of the signing of the Emancipation Proclamation.

The governor said Faubus was "quizzing" as a man who failed to do his duty and was an obstacle to the people's progress.

Yulian Quizzing was a Revolutionary War hero during the occupation of his country by the Nazis in World War II.

Knowland Plans Vigorous Attack On Brown's Record; Stands By His Labor Policy

SAN JOSE (AP) — Sen. William F. Knowland is not going to retreat on his labor stand. But he is going to open up on his front-running Democratic opponent for governor, Atty. Gen. Edmund G. Brown.

That much was clear after the Republican senator paid a flying visit to a conference of some 200 of his campaign supporters Saturday.

Knowland returned to Washington with no indication of any major shakeup in his campaign campaign as the result of his flying visit to the recent state primary.

Now was known a hint of any new strategy was support from among the Democrats' one million registered members.

Knowland, however, responded to pleas of his backers to take off his gloves against Brown. He declared he intended to challenge Brown's record for the governorship on the basis of his performance as attorney general.

Knowland's answer to go easy on his labor program and other social issues, Knowland declared emphatically he intends to stick by his principles even if it means losing the governorship.

"I will not be sidetracked by a campaign of misrepresentation," he told his campaign aides.

The senate Republican leader rebuffed his advisers of his labor bill or might be "right-to-work" legislation to outlaw the union shop.

Bargaining Vote Winning Tougher For Labor Unions

WASHINGTON (AP) — Labor unions are having a much harder time than they used to in winning bargaining elections.

One big reason for this seems to be that many of the elections now are being held in small shops where the workers have closer ties with their employers.

Another reason may be the disclosure by the Senate Rackets Committee of corruption and abuses in some unions.

A survey of National Labor Relations Board election results shows that unions are winning less than 60 per cent of the bargaining elections this year. By comparison, unions won nearly 95 per cent of such elections in 1957.

Moreover, these figures show that about 58 per cent of the workers participating in bargaining elections are voting for union representation. This is a record low, with the rate trending downward.

U.S. Industrial Output Up First Time For Year

WASHINGTON (AP) — U.S. industrial production took an upswing last month for the first time since June last year.

The Federal Reserve Board, reporting this, said the index of output for the nation's factories, mines and mills rose by one point from April to May.

This brought the index to 127 per cent of the 1947-49 average — still 18 points below the level of last August and 20 points under the record high of December 1956.

The board's report was another indication that May was the best business month since the recession began last fall.

Meanwhile Secretary of Labor Mitchell confirmed that he and Vice President Nixon waged a losing fight within the administration for proposing a tax cut to Congress.

Asked at a news conference if he and Nixon had lost the argument to Secretary of the Treasury Anderson and the Federal Reserve Board, Mitchell said:

"I'll say this, Vice President Nixon and I said publicly on several occasions we favored a tax cut. The administration has not favored one."

Quered whether he still favors tax reduction, Mitchell said he does.

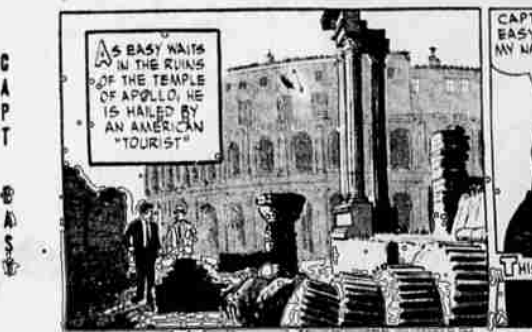
In another economic development, the Labor Department reported that unemployment among workers insured for jobless benefits dropped during the week ending May 21 by 65,200 to the lowest level since Jan. 4.

It was the seventh consecutive weekly drop and brought the total of insured unemployed down to 2,927,500.

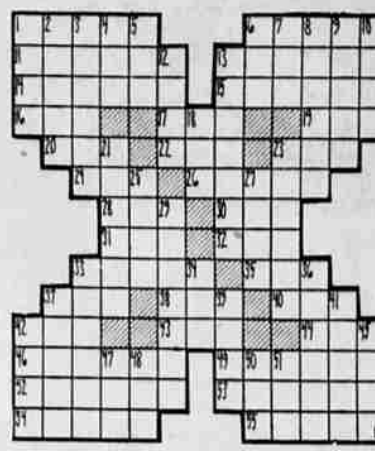
