

Drew Pearson Fires Back At Hagerty, Tells Newsmen That 'A Hit Dog Howls'

CHICAGO (AP) — Columnist Drew Pearson replied Tuesday to criticism by James C. Hagerty with the comment: "A hit dog howls."

Pearson also said Hagerty, press secretary to President Eisenhower, once ate as a guest of Bernard Goldfine at a Washington hotel.

Hagerty opened the long distance exchange in a special news conference in Washington. He discussed a Pearson column which said Eisenhower had received a vicuna coat from Goldfine, Boston industrialist who made gifts to Sherman Adams, aide to the President.

Hagerty denied that the President had received a coat but did say he received a gift of vicuna cloth. Hagerty told newsmen Pearson's column contained at least 10 "complete falsehoods."

Pearson Replies
Pearson, in Chicago to make a speaking appearance, replied in

this statement to newsmen here: "If Hagerty will examine point by point his memory and if the House committee will subpoena certain witnesses, they can get the truth."

"If the committee will subpoena the chief of the Sheraton Carlton Hotel, it will find that Hagerty, who now says he doesn't know Goldfine, was a guest of Goldfine's at the hotel, got sick and Goldfine complained that the food was poisoned."

"Hagerty has a very convenient memory in regard to the unnamed and now forgotten friend to whom he says Eisenhower gave the vicuna cloth. If the friend exists, his name should be produced."

Many More Gifts
"President Eisenhower has received more gifts than any other President during the 30 years I have covered Washington. In the past presidential gifts were merely turkeys at Thanksgiving or similar presents for the White House table, but Eisenhower has received 55 head of cattle, 48 Norwegian spruce, a \$4,000 tractor, a disc drill, several horses, farm implements, a mechanical electric kitchen and all sorts of other presents on which the average citizen would have to pay taxes."

"While the House committee is investigating, it should investigate this amazing array of gifts and whether any taxes were paid."

"A hit dog howls. A careful investigation will show that Hagerty is covering up for the fact that the Republican cloth coat era once proclaimed by Nixon over television has now ended."

Unander To Ask Adams Censure By State GOP

PORTLAND (AP) — State Treasurer Sig Unander Tuesday said he will ask the Oregon Republican Central Committee to censure Sherman Adams.

Unander, long one of Oregon's top Republicans, said Adams has not acted in accord with the job he holds as the chief aide to President Eisenhower.

"I will vigorously seek a resolution of censure at the next meeting of the state Central Committee. Achieving that, I will seek a further resolution of disassociation," Unander said at his home here.

Such a resolution, he said, "would be a divestment of association by the Oregon Republican Party with Mr. Adams."

Unander said his decision was prompted by gifts Adams said he had accepted from Bernard Goldfine, a wealthy Boston industrialist.

"There is the matter of protracted and lavish hospitality and Adams admits accepting gifts from Goldfine," Unander said.

"That is something no one in public life should do. That is not the quality of conduct that goes with public office—especially high public office," he said.

Unander also said he had given some thought to whether Adams should resign the key post in the Eisenhower Republican administration.

"When a shadow of doubt is cast on a public official, his usefulness is greatly impaired," Unander said.

He added: "I think Adams should carefully consider whether his continuation in the White House will be beneficial or harmful to President Eisenhower."

Unander is a former state Republican Party chairman and an unsuccessful candidate for the governorship nomination.

Frenchmen Turn In Gold Under Immunity Grant

PARIS (AP) — France Wednesday observed the 18th anniversary of Gen. Charles de Gaulle's call to victory in World War II by rallying behind his National Recovery Loan.

"If the gold subscription keeps coming in at this rate," Finance Minister Antoine Pinay said, "we will have to enlarge the vaults of the Bank of France."

The government disclosed that Frenchmen gave up 11 million dollars worth of hidden gold Tuesday, when 3 1/2 per cent bonds went on sale for gold.

Possession of the gold is illegal, but the government has promised boarders immunity from prosecution if they buy bonds. Frenchmen traditionally have held onto their gold in times of trouble.

De Gaulle, who has declared that success of the bond campaign would be a vote of confidence in his new government, was honored throughout France and its overseas territories.

Ceremonies commemorated his broadcast from London on June 18, 1940, after France had surrendered to Germany.

"France has lost a battle," he declared then. "France has not lost the war."

METER PARKING FEE

PORTLAND (AP) — The Port of Portland Commission has set a fee of 5 cents for 15 minutes of metered parking at the new Portland International Airport terminal, which will be opened later this year.

Maximum time allowed for parking on the meters, which will be in operation 24 hours a day, will be 45 minutes.

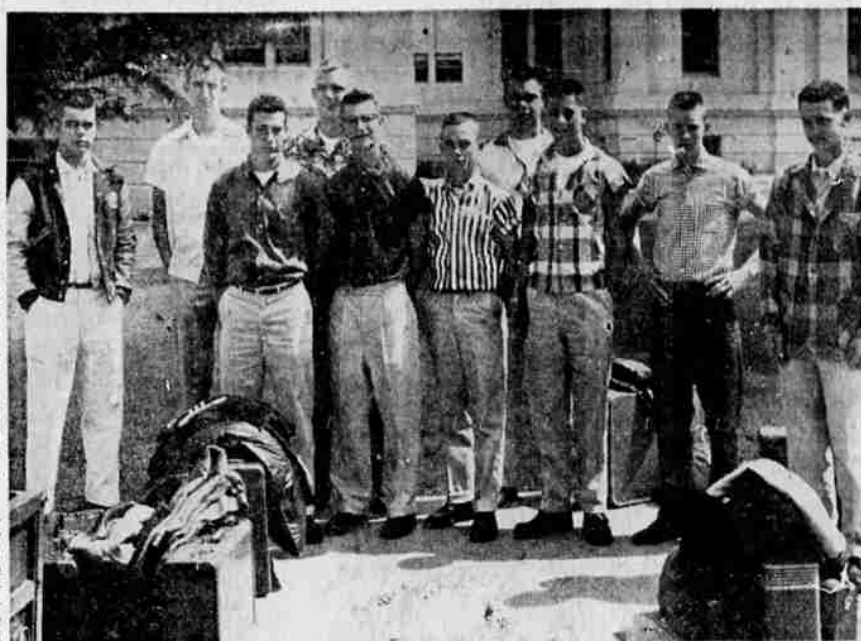

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Kidnaped Canadian Child Is Located

OTTAWA (AP) — Joel Reitman, 2 1/2-year-old Montreal child kidnaped last Saturday, was found safe Tuesday in an Ottawa taxi-driver's home and turned over to Ottawa friends of the family.

Inspector Bordon Hobbs of the Ottawa police department said young Joel had been left Monday with Edward Royer, Ottawa cab driver, by an unidentified woman.

Royer told police he picked up the woman and child at a hotel and the woman asked him to get a baby sitter while she went shopping.

He said he took the child home and his wife cared for it. When the woman failed to return for the child, he said, he telephoned police.

Young Joel was kidnaped from his Montreal home Saturday night while his wealthy parents, Mr. and Mrs. Cyril Reitman, were at a dance.

A ransom note demanded \$10,000 for his safe return.

The child's 46-year-old nurse, Greta Goede, a German woman, was still missing. She was hired two weeks ago.

Oakland Slates Kindergarten For 5 Weeks Period

Oakland's unique — in Douglas County — five-week summer kindergarten will be under way next Monday.

It's expected that in excess of 20 children will attend the session. And it will be only the second year that it's been in operation.

Cecil Barnett, elementary principal at Oakland, said the school for five- and six-year-olds will be under the direction of Mrs. Shirley Brown, first-grade teacher in the district's Washington School.

The kindergarten, which is outside the jurisdiction of the school district, is operated through voluntary teacher help. A \$10 tuition for each child enrolled pays the teacher's salary and for materials. The tuition must be paid at the time of enrollment.

The school district merely loans physical facilities. Classes will be held between 9 and 11:30 a.m. Mondays through Fridays at the primary unit of Washington School through July 25.

Barnett said parents may enroll their children at any time before the session begins. Reservations may be made by phoning him at Oakland 4214.

Nearly 20 children already are registered for the session, Barnett said. There will be no limit on the number of children accepted.

The kindergarten isn't restricted to children from the Oakland School District, and Barnett said parents of children in other districts are invited to inquire about the school.
