Harold Harrison Wins Additional Injury Benefits

Harold Harrison has won a Circuit Court order for an additional 20 per cent permanent partial disability loss to an arm resulting from an accident while cutting timber near Glide in August of 1956.

Judge Charles S. Woodrich ruled Harrison is entitled to more than the 40 per cent disability allowed by the state Industrial Accident Commission Nov. 6 of last year. He had sought an adjustment of 30 per cent more.

A rehearing on the matter was denied by the commission last year. Harrison was hurt while employed by Clyde Harrison. A tree fell on him.

Judge Woodrich has ordered S. H. Early to pay \$3,387 and costs of the suit to Willis H. and Neonta R. Small, owners of the Small Feed Co. Plaintiffs said in their complaint Early had paid only \$5,909 on a \$9,286 debt incurred between Dec. 5, 1956, and Dec. 18, 1957.
