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Drain Chamber Of Commerce To Dedicate New Post Office

Routine business and future projects were discussed at the first June meeting of the Drain Chamber of Commerce.

Minutes of the recent board meeting of plans for the chamber to sponsor the new Post Office dedication. Bob Cool is chairman for arrangements.

Clean-Up Needed

The need for a city clean-up and efforts to make Drain attractive during the tourist season was called to the group's attention by president Harry Johnson.

Bob Miller reported that after attending a recent board meeting of the Boswell Springs Rehabilitation Hospital, he feels sure that the project will definitely go ahead, and that a sound financial basis has been achieved.

Miller also announced that if the street improvement work is to continue, additional funds must be raised. Completion of one block of curbing and sidewalk has exhausted the funds. The chamber is anxious to complete one more block during the summer, preferably before the State Highway paves the main street in July.

About \$400 and volunteer work crews will be necessary to carry on the work. City Recorder Verne

Thomas said city crews and equipment are busy with sewer work, but would be available for work on the street outside regular working hours. A house-to-house drive for funds will soon be carried on under direction of Forest Johnson.

Centennial Discussed

Ivan Hoyer, Cottage Grove, led an informal discussion of Drain's sponsorship of a covered wagon in the Oregon Centennial covered wagon.

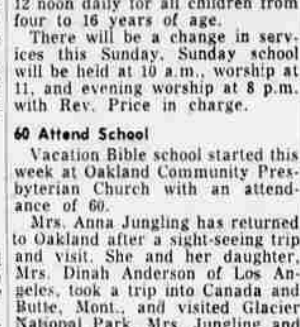
Hoyer said questions had been asked regarding cost of the covered wagon at \$1,650. This sum, he stated, covers cost of outfitting the wagon. Only about one-fourth of the sum is the actual cost of the

wagon. The "On to Oregon Cavalcade" group pays expenses of travel after outfitting costs have been met by local sponsors.

Inquiries already coming in indicate that several volunteers are anxious to act as drivers if Drain sponsors a wagon, and many have expressed willingness to donate money to meet the cost. Richard Duncan was appointed chairman of a committee to contact other organizations and learn what support the project would have.
