

Abortion Charges Levelled On Pair Following Raid

TACOMA, Wash. (AP)—A nursing home operator was arrested Wednesday at nearby Fife on charges of attempted abortion, her arrest coming after an intensive investigation by county officials.

Anna Moody, 68, was jailed briefly and released on \$10,000 bail. Questioned briefly and released on his personal recognizance was her husband, Robert, 39.

The couple was apprehended in a raid on their home by Pierce County law enforcement officers, including Chief Criminal Deputy Dick McCready and Chief Deputy Prosecutor Nels B. Nelson.

Nelson said they found medical instruments in an upstairs room. In bedrooms of the nursing home were three women, who told officers their homes were in Kirkland, Wenatchee and Albany, Ore. One of the raiders was told by one woman she had paid \$450 to Mrs. Moody, Nelson said, and another told of paying \$1,000 for operations not yet performed.

McCready said the raid followed a long investigation during which he and Nelson posed as surveyors while watching the home and recording the license numbers of numerous automobiles.

Nelson said a woman came to his office and inquired about the nursing home. He said she was persuaded to return there Wednesday with \$350 in marked bills.

Flame Of The Beat Generation's Death Finally Solved

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—The case of the strangled 20-year-old girl who styled herself the flame of the beat generation has apparently been solved.

The body of Danna Connie Sublette was found nude except for a black bra and a St. Christopher's medal. Her clothes were draped nearby on a fence in the shadowy alley where she died.

Doctors said she had not been raped.

Police traced Frank Harris, 32, from a suit receipt found near the slaying scene. Harris, a Negro laundryman, was arrested on the USS Gen. Hugh Gaffey, a military transport, two hours before it was to leave for the Far East.

Harris confessed. He said he sought free love from the girl.

The girl, known as Danna Lewie, Danna Connie Sublette and Connie Swanson, ran with the beat generation of North Beach, San Francisco's Bohemia.

Group Dubbed Beatniks
The group, dubbed the Beatniks by newspapers and films, party freely and cry against conformity. Fellow Beatniks said she was a sad girl.

Her latest flame was Paul Swanson, jobless saxophone player who fell to his death from the roof of a Beatnik party house.

Connie had pressed her St. Christopher's Medal on the forehead of the body during a final visit to the city's morgue. Then she put it back on.

Theodore Hangline of Portland, Ore., the girl's guardian, said she received \$60 monthly income from property left by her parents. She was to inherit it when she reached 21.

Harris said he found her in a drunken stupor and offered to take her home. He said he had taken a shot of heroin and finished a pint of whiskey.

"I put a handkerchief around her neck when she started screaming," Harris said. "I just kept on squeezing."

Cowboys, Indians Stage Rodeo At Brussels' Fair

BRUSSELS (AP)—Yipping cowboys and whooping Indians staged an American rodeo Wednesday night—but the show was censored by an animal protection society.

Nine thousand Belgians and tourists from other countries here for the World's Fair widely cheered the bucking broncos, redskins and cowboys in ten gallon hats.

They saw exhibitions of bull-riding, bronco-busting and bull dogging—throwing young steers to the ground by hand. But they missed calf roping. The local society for the prevention of cruelty to animals protested.

The Europeans did see champion cowboy Casey Tibbs of Fort Pierre, S.D., Sioux Indian dancers, square dancers, rope twirlers, champion archer Howard Hill, 58 other cowboys, 33 cowgirls and 216 animals.

"They show the true spirit of America. I like it," said one Russian tourist.

The half-million-dollar show was brought to Brussels by Robert Fleming and Edward Flynn of Los Angeles and was produced by actor George Murphy.
