Senator Asks Adams To Quit

Leaders Divided On Usefulness Of Chief Aide

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. Arthur V. Watkins (R-Utah) appealed publicly Friday to Sherman Adams to resign his place as top assistant to President Eisenhower "and to urge the President to accept his resignation."

The Utah Republican senator said "Mr. Adams' usefulness as the President's assistant is seriously impaired, if not completely destroyed."

At the same time two Republican members of the House chimed in.

Rep. Charles B. Brownson of Indiana wired an inquiring constituent that he hopes Adams will "develop the judgment, sensitivity and courage to resign."

Rep. Donald E. Towe (R-Wis.) said in a statement that Adams has "clearly sacrificed the confidence of the public." He predicted an early resignation.

The Watkins statement said a resignation by Adams "would go a long way, in my judgment, to maintain the American people's respect and confidence which should honestly be maintained at all costs in these critical times."

Meanwhile a Republican member of a House investigating subcommittee called for an inquiry into all of Bernard Goldfine's contacts with federal officials over the last 10 years.

Rep. John B. Bennett (Mich.) said "I'm of the opinion that Sherman Adams is not the only official of the federal government who has enjoyed Goldfine's hospitality."

Bennett spoke in an interview as the Pentagon disclosed that more than a quarter of a million dollars worth of textile contracts have been awarded to Goldfine's companies since the Eisenhower administration took over in January 1953.

The Pentagon supplied the figures on request, with no implication of influence or wrongdoing. In a separate development, the Securities and Exchange Commission unanimously denied that it dropped a case against one of Goldfine's firms after an inquiry from the White House prompted by Adams.

"On the contrary," the five-man commission said, "the case was 'successfully prosecuted.'"

Goldfine's East Boston Co. was fined \$3,000 and is now filing on schedule reports required by the SEC.

Hagerty Stayed Free At Swank Inn In Florida

JACKSONVILLE, Fla. (AP) — James C. Hagerty, presidential press secretary, and his wife were given a 3-day stay at the swank Ponte Vedra Inn last week.

The inn, on the Atlantic ocean some 20 miles from here, picked up the check for \$260.97 because they were special guests, officials said, adding that Hagerty took two golf lessons but paid for those. The Tampa Tribune had reported the lessons were free, also.

The Hagertys were at the inn from Jan. 27 through Feb. 1.

J. P. LeMaster, president of Ponte Verda Corp., told the newspaper, "when he got here, Hagerty insisted on paying his bill. We wouldn't let him do it."

Mayhugh Courson, assistant manager of the club, said honored guests don't receive bills.

"The account is correct as reported, except for one thing. I did pay for my golf lessons. I personally paid the club pro."

"I did insist, as the account says, on paying my entire bill, but the club would not let me do so."

"Under the circumstances, there was nothing wrong in this. I don't see how anyone could make anything of my being a guest of the club at their insistence."

Tavern Operator Demurs To Pinball Operation Charge

Attorney for Mrs. Iva Smith, Roseburg tavern owner cited last week for possession and operation of a pinball device, this morning demurred to the charges before District Judge Warren A. Woodruff.

Robert M. Stults told the court he objected to the complaint filed by the office of Avery W. Thompson, district attorney, on grounds it didn't offer sufficient proof of the allegation.

Judge Woodruff set June 25 as the date for hearing arguments on the demurrer.

Sheriff Ira C. Byrd and a deputy, using two special investigators, grabbed the pinball machine the night of June 13 at The Turn Around Inn, 1023 NE Stephens St.

The complaint against Mrs. Smith charged her with "possession, displaying and operating a game of chance."

The case may be run through the Oregon courts to test the state's anti-gambling law. Verden Hockett, assistant district attorney, said the local complaint is in accordance with a recent ruling by Atty. Gen. Robert Y. Thornton which calls pinball devices a game of chance.

Senate Measure Erases Taxes On Transportation

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate Friday passed a bill to erase present transportation taxes but continue for another year other major excise levies and the 52 per cent corporate tax rate.

The measure, passed by the House June 5, now goes back there because of the Senate's unexpected adoption of amendments to repeal the 3 per cent freight levy and the 10 per cent tax on passenger fares.

Except for these two amendments, the Senate backed up the Eisenhower administration and Republican and Democratic congressional leaders in resisting any anti-recession tax cuts at this time.

By preventing a reduction in excises on liquor, beer, wines, cigarettes, autos and auto parts and a drop in the corporate tax rate to 47 per cent on July 1, the bill would save the government from a loss of an estimated \$2,600,000,000 in revenue.

The transportation tax repeal voted by the Senate would cost the government somewhat in excess of \$700 million annually, however.

The House either can accept the Senate amendment wiping out the transportation levies or send the measure to a Senate-House conference committee to resolve the issue.

Before passage by a voice vote, the Senate rejected a move to cut the federal excise tax on automobiles.

It did so after Sen. Prescott Bush (R-Conn.) accused the auto industry of "coming to Congress like paupers" for a lift.

The 44-32 roll call vote knocked down an amendment by Sen.

Vacancies Still Exist For 'Y' Summer Camp

Wayne Schulz, YMCA director, reminded Douglas County boys today that there still are vacancies in the registration list for Camp Diamond Lake, the summer resident camp sponsored by the local Y organization.

Schulz said the camp quota is 120 boys, and the advance registration totals only about 40 at this time. He said boys may register the week of June 23-30.

Two one-week sessions will be held, one beginning July 12 and the other July 20.

Boys nine through 15 years of age are eligible to attend the camp, added Schulz. The fee per session is \$22.50.

Yoncalla Union High Special Levy Approved

Voters in the Yoncalla Union High School District Thursday approved a special \$6,000 levy for relocation of the water system in the school. The vote was 38-15.

School officials said acids in the earth were responsible for corroding the pipes.

Judge Grants Sentence Delay For Ex-Aides

HURON, S.D. (AP) — Judge Archibald K. Gardner of the U.S. Court of Appeals said Friday he has signed an order delaying execution of a prison sentence for two former Truman administration officials.

The order allowed Matthew J. Connelly and T. Lamar Caudle time for a hearing in their bid for a second trial based on what their attorneys say is new evidence.

Judge Gardner said the stay of prison sentence will be effective until a decision is made on the request for a new trial.

Connelly and Caudle were scheduled to surrender at St. Louis Saturday to begin serving two-year prison terms for conspiring to defraud the government in an income tax case.

Connelly was former President Truman's appointments secretary and Caudle was former head of the Justice Department's tax division.

Convicted of Conspiracy

Connelly and Caudle were convicted of conspiracy in fixing an income tax case of Irving Sachs, St. Louis shoe company executive. Sachs pleaded guilty to income tax evasion in 1951. He was fined \$40,000 but never went to prison.

In seeking a new trial, Connelly and Caudle cited sworn statements by Harry L. Schwimmer, formerly an attorney for Sachs and a co-defendant with Connelly and Caudle until he became ill during the trial.

Schwimmer reportedly said in his sworn statement that he bought oil royalties in question in the case without Caudle's knowledge. Caudle said Schwimmer couldn't talk until two months ago because of a stroke.

The government charged that Caudle received the oil royalties for using his influence in the Sachs case. Caudle denied it, and said he recommended probation for Sachs because Sachs had suffered a heart attack.

Connelly testified that he received a coat from Schwimmer at a Kansas City hotel, but he said the gift had nothing to do with the Sachs case.

Million White Collar Workers Get Pay Increase

WASHINGTON (AP) — A million government white collar workers got a 10 per cent pay raise Friday retroactive to last January. It means they have 250 million dollars of back pay coming.

President Eisenhower signed the measure granting the increase. It will add \$542,000,000 to the annual U.S. government pay roll.

Government agencies plan to start distributing the back pay next month.

The increase, coming after a two-year fight, matches a 10 per cent raise, also retroactive to last January, already given 520,000 postal workers.

The administration had suggested a 6 per cent increase for Uncle Sam's workers.

The white collar raise goes to an estimated 1,021,072 employees, including 978,632 paid under the classified civil service system; 6,200 in the legislative branch; 4,119 in the judicial branch; 19,485 doctors, dentists and nurses in Veterans Administration; and 12,636 in the foreign service.

The average annual increase for individuals is \$531. The retroactive pay will average \$250.

The measure adds 599 top grade jobs to the federal career service, about 300 in the science and engineering field.

Jim Golden, parade entries chairman, said princesses from the Cottage Grove Rodeo and Eugene's Emerald Empire Roundup will display their charms in the 1 p.m. parade. Four girls will represent each of the upcoming rodeos.

The Douglas County Rodeo Court, consisting of Queen Judy Defferding and Princesses Patricia Bell and Cheryl Goldson, also will appear in the parade.

Another group slated to proceed along the SE Jackson Street-Lane Avenue-SE Main Street route is the popular Knights of Pythias Drum & Bugle Corps, directed by Roseburg's Billy Black. The all-girl marching group returned Thursday from Los Angeles, where it appeared in a National Junior Chamber of Commerce parade.

Floats, riding groups and antique automobiles also will appear in the parade. Comedy and trick riding acts will liven up the festive caravan.

Two Fast Days Rodeo Action Scheduled For Fairgrounds

Witnessing two fast days of action will be in the entertainment plans for hundreds of Douglas County families Saturday and Sunday, the dates for the 14th annual Douglas County Rodeo at the Fairgrounds.

Several ex-world champion cowboys and other top-ranked performers are slated to add class to the rodeo competition, scheduled to get underway at 4 p.m. in the Fairgrounds arena.

Up for grabs in the two days of rugged competition will be an estimated \$8,000 in prize money, including a \$4,000 purse. The remainder of the prize money will come from entry fees.

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Danes' Embassy Demonstration Target Of Reds

MOSCOW (AP) — A crowd staged a stone-throwing, banner-waving demonstration at the Danish embassy Friday, breaking seven windows.

It was retaliation against a similar incident at the Soviet Embassy in Copenhagen by Danes three days ago. The Danes were protesting the execution of former Hungarian Premier Imre Nagy and his associates.

Danish Embassy personnel said about 200 or 300 persons marched on the embassy here Friday and stayed for two hours. The crowds chanted and carried banners bearing such slogans as "Danes Are Imperialists," "Friendly Toward Hungarian Rebels." They threw stones and even threw some of their banners inside.

Danish Ambassador Alex Moreh filed an immediate protest with the Soviet government. He was not in the embassy when the demonstration began but returned while it was going on.

Many Soviet police were on the scene, including about 20 on horse back. They remained at the embassy after the crowd dispersed.

Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko protested Thursday, on behalf of the Soviet government, against the demonstration in Copenhagen Tuesday.

Red Cross Needs Volunteer Swim Class Teachers

Volunteer swimming instructors are needed for Red Cross classes now under way in the Roseburg pool, according to Bunny Easter.

Easter said the city and Red Cross are trying to organize an adult swimming class to start July 7. Youngsters in the beginner, intermediate and swimmer classes are now being taught, he said. The first of five two-week sessions for young people began Monday, and the next will start July 7.

Four water safety instructors are in charge of the classes. They are Debby Corkrum, Bob Geddes, Suzy Lee and Linda Backen. Junior and senior lifeguards are acting as aides.

More volunteer help is needed, however. Easter asked water safety instructors and lifeguards to register with the Red Cross, 1332 SE Stephens St.

Adults and youngsters interested in participating in the instruction classes also may register at the Red Cross office.

The adult class, if held, would be between noon and 1 p.m. The junior programs are held between 10 a.m. and noon.

Larceny By Bailees Charges Are Filed

Three separate charges of larceny by bailees were filed Thursday in Circuit Court against Wilford G. Robinson, alias Ray King, from the Justice Court of Nina Peitzold.

The 31-year-old Chandler, Okla., man was booked at county jail Wednesday on the three larceny counts and a fourth one for defrauding an innkeeper. He is held for action by the next grand jury on the larceny charges.

Robinson waived rights to a preliminary hearing in the Justice court June 18 and bound over on complaints signed by three Myrtle Creek residents and businessmen.

Marvin Fay signed a complaint Feb. 1 alleging he left the county with a 364 electric saw; J. A. Byford alleged he took an \$1,100 used car in early February; and Carl D. Jenks complained Robinson took a hand power saw valued at \$125 on Feb. 2.

Justice of the Peace Peitzold set bail totaling \$1,100.

Pickup Hits Big Rig; Driver Escapes Hurts

A pickup truck rammed the rear end of a large tractor-trailer combination about 5:15 p.m. Thursday on Highway 99 near the junction with Highway 38, doing extensive damage to the pickup.

Brief Truce Shattered; One Man Shot

Hammaraskjold Reported At Odds With Lebanese Over Role Of Observers

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP)—Fighting broke out in front of the British Embassy Friday, shattering a truce that had prevailed since U. N. Secretary General Dag Hammarskjold arrived in Beirut.

One man was shot at a building opposite the embassy. He reportedly died later. Another man who seemed to be going to the rescue was wounded.

Armed men wearing the red arm bands of the pro-Christian Falange Party immediately rushed up and cordoned off the area until the wounded man was taken away in an ambulance.

The sudden outburst ended quickly. But street fights were reported from two other sections of Beirut.

Hammaraskjold, meanwhile, was reported at odds with the Lebanese government over the role the U.N. observer team should play in the Lebanese rebellion.

Sources close to the U.N. secretary general say Hammarskjold thinks the United Nations job at this moment is principally one of observation.

The government, however, is insisting that the U.N. team police the border to prevent infiltration by hostile forces.

Apparently also Hammarskjold considers his mission here one of organization for the job of observation rather than mediation attempt.

Probation Granted Parolee From Auto Theft Count

Despite a long criminal record, a parolee from California this morning was granted probation after pleading guilty to auto theft.

Robert Eldon Balch, 28, was sentenced to five years in prison by Circuit Judge Charles S. Woodrich and placed on probation. This was granted because of a highly favorable report from a California vocational institution where he served the last two years and worked as a technician in the hospital.

Another arraignment was continued about midway when Ardell Koehn, 18, asked for a court-appointed attorney. This came about when Koehn heard the wording of the felony charge against him. When he expressed concern, an attorney was appointed and the case continued until the defendant has time to confer with the lawyer.

Two 18-year-olds whose sentencing had been delayed pending receipt of pre-sentence reports from the parole officer appeared in court this morning.

Kenneth Hambrick, Sutherland, was sentenced to two years in prison but will be placed on probation after spending 60 days in the county jail. He had pleaded guilty to burglary not in a dwelling.

Jay Lillie, also of Sutherland, involved in the same burglary had a more favorable pre-sentence report. Judge Woodrich ordered imposition of sentence deferred for two years, with Lillie to be placed on probation meanwhile.

Vanguard Satellite Firing Is 'Scrubbed'

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. — An attempt to launch a Vanguard satellite rocket was "scrubbed" at 4:30 a.m. EST because of technical difficulties.

A firing of a basketball-sized satellite originally was set for 9:30 p.m. yesterday. For several hours, the slender rocket sat outside its service tower, bathed in lights.

Several holds were called, ranging from a few minutes to three hours.

There was no announcement when the next effort would be made to shoot the rocket.

Two Fail To Appear On Misconduct Charges

Two Roseburg residents forfeited \$35 bail each Thursday in the court of Municipal Judge Randolph Slocum after failing to appear for trial on charges of disorderly conduct.

They were Nelson James Sawyers, 1464 SE Mill St., and M. Martin Strits of 568 NE Winchester Ave. Sawyers was cited by police on May 23, and Strits arrested April 25.

Perry William Key of San Francisco pleaded innocent to a vagrancy charge resulting from his pickup on a downtown street Wednesday. Judge Slocum set bail at \$35 and July 3 for date of his trial.

Key is held in lieu of the bail money.

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
