Lay Readers To Be Installed At St. George's

Two new Lay Readers will be officially admitted to their office at St. George's Episcopal Church this Sunday at the 11 a.m. service. Robert E. Young and Dan C. Hill have been licensed by Bishop Dagwell to serve as Lay Readers at St. George's under the direction of the rector, the Rev. Alfred S. Tyson. Both men have completed a series of instruction classes conducted by the Rev. William L. Blaker, retired rector of St. George's.

The classes were attended also by three men from the Church of the Holy Spirit in Sutherlin, who will be installed the following Sunday. Lay Readers in the Episcopal Church, when licensed by the bishop, are authorized to assist the priest at certain services, and to conduct certain specified services in the absence of a priest.

Young will assist at the regular 9:30 Sunday service, and Hill at 11 a.m. Robert E. Robbins and Romayne Brand are also licensed Lay Readers of the parish.
