Sunday Opening Slated For New Local Course

Sunday morning at 5:30 a.m. will see the opening of the new public golf course in Charles B. Stewart Park.

Local golfers are expected to flock to the new nine-hole course in droves on the first day. The dedication of the course will come later.

This new course is the third for Roseburg. The other two are, of course, the nine-hole layout at the Veterans Hospital and the Roseburg Country Club course.

Over this new addition to Roseburg golfers, those playing will travel about 3,000 yards; the actual distance is 2,784 yards. The course occupies slightly more than 20 acres and is part of a mile by half-mile tract secured from the General Services Administration as government surplus land.

The new course was laid out by Ed Oldfield, former Roseburg Country Club pro. The nine-hole course is a 36 par test, with numerous traps, water hazards and well-placed trees.

City officials have completed a golfer's heaven — or nightmare — in a short period of time. The Roseburg City Council is considering the problem of upkeep for the course. Present plans call for an underground sprinkler system.

Many courses are changing to this method of watering, and Roseburg will be first along this line.

Here's how the new course will look to golfers playing it for the first time:

The first hole is a 400-yard par four hole, which runs parallel to the road and is a straight-away hole.

Number two is a 468-yard par five hole, with an uphill dog leg right. On the third hole, golfers will find a 350-yard shot, a par four hole which is straight-away.

Number four is one of two short holes, this one a 140-yard par three test. The fifth is a par five, 430-yard hole and the sixth is a 320-yard, par four hole.

The seventh is a 250-yard par four hole, with an uphill dog leg left. This is the hole that is figured to give everyone fits.

The eighth is the other short hole — a 135-yard jaunt and a par three. The ninth hole is a 290-yard, par four hole.

The course will be open all day Sunday, with the newly completed clubhouse open for refreshments.

AAU Spike Fest Begins Tonight

BAKERSFIELD, Calif. (AP) — The 70th annual national AAU track and field championships get under way Friday night with some 400 athletes competing for prestige and one of the plum trips abroad this summer.

Mixed with the Yankee contestants are several noted foreign performers, headed by mile runners Herb Elliott and Merv Lincoln of Australia, each hoping to break fellow Aussie John Landy's 3:38 world record for the mile.

Biggest target of the summer tour is a meet with Russia at Moscow next month. The first two American finishers in each event qualify for the squad.

Al Lopez has made his point. Those winter trades that peddled power for pitching have helped give his Chicago White Sox four shutouts in five games. But they're still seventh in the American League race, 11 1/2 games behind.

Jim Wilson, Dick Donovan and Billy Pierce, three old hands, pitched consecutive shutouts, and after taking a five-home run pounding from Boston Wednesday, the White Sox beat the Red Sox 4-0 Thursday on the two-hit pitching of Early Wynn.

The veteran right-hander, acquired from Cleveland, now has a pair of two-hitters for the season, and owns half of the six shutouts bagged by the Chicago staff. Thursday's showpiece, in which he faced but 30 men and didn't give up a hit after the sixth, was his 38th major league shutout and his 10th two-hitter in the big time.

Yet the White Sox didn't gain an inch on the first place New York Yankees, who rapped five homers and beat Cleveland 9-3 for a three-game sweep that left them nine games ahead of second place Boston. Washington junked its slump at five games, and ended Detroit's winning string at five, with a 4-3 decision. Baltimore jumped into fifth with a 4-2 victory at Kansas City.

Cubs Walltop Spain

In the National League, the Chicago Cubs belted four home runs and handed Warren Spahn his third consecutive defeat 5-4 at Milwaukee. That held the Braves' lead at two games over second place San Francisco, beaten 6-5 at Pittsburgh. Philadelphia beat Los Angeles 9-3. Cincinnati and St. Louis were idle by rain.

Wynn, now 7-5, walked but two and struck out eight. He leads active major leaguers with 1,705 strikeouts in his 18-year career. He gave up a second-inning single by Frank Malzone and a sixth inning single by loser Frank Sullivan.

Andy Carey hit two of the Yankee homers, giving him eight. Both were off reliever Bob Lemon. Home runs by Enos Slaughter and Elston Howard gave New York a 3-0 lead in the second against rookie Gary Bell, who lost his first in three decisions. Hank Bauer got the other Yankee homer, while Rocky Colavito hit his 11th with one on in the ninth for the Indians.

The Orioles, in last place before sweeping three at Kansas City, took it on Gene Woodling's two-run homer in the eighth off Ned Garver, who has lost three in a row.

Pearson Solon Hero

Lt. Albie Pearson doubled home a tie-breaking run in a two-run seventh for the Senators, then tripled home the winner in the ninth. Spahn now 8-4 has given up 18 home runs this season, 14 of them in the games he lost. He allowed only 23 homers all last year.

Walt Moryn, who now has hit 15, counted a pair off Spahn and Al Dark got the other. But it was Tony Taylor who was in Spahn's hair. He stole home for a 1-0 lead in the first inning, then cracked a 4-4 tie with his homer that chased Spahn with one out in the ninth.

Right-hander Ray Semprow won his eighth for the Phils and had a no-hitter for 6-1-3 innings. He had a three-hit shutout until the ninth, when Joe Pignatano, who hit his first major league homer Wednesday, socked No. 2 and Duke Snider belted his fifth. Stan Lopata hit a three-run homer in the first and the Phils then scored five in the third with six consecutive hits.

Southpaw Don Gross fanned pinch-hitter Jim Finigan to save Ronnie Kline's seventh victory for the Pirates after the Giants had scored three in the ninth. Two on rookie Bob Schmidt's ninth homer.

Veteran Rider's Long Career Ends When Mount Strikes Rail

INGLEWOOD, Calif. (AP) — Death in a spectacular spill in a stakes race at Hollywood Park ended Jackie Westrope's 25-year riding career Thursday.

He passed the pack on the outside and was ahead, 70 yards from the wire, when his mount bolted into the rail. Westrope was thrown.

The 40-year-old former national riding champion hit the rail so hard, a track official said, he bent almost double — backward — around it.

He died less than two hours later, despite plasma and oxygen. Westrope began big-time racing at 15 and in that year — 1933 — rode 301 winners to become national champion. In the ensuing years he had 2,439 winners from a total of 17,136 mounts. In money winnings he ranked 10th nationally with a total of \$8,944,002.

Doctors said he suffered severe internal injuries and fractures of the shoulder, arm, elbow and ribs. An autopsy will be performed to determine the exact cause of death.

Manager Vern Kindsfater hurled his Salem Senators to the win over Tri-City, snapping the Braves win streak at seven.

Salem won it two down in the 12th frame. Cal Bauer singled, stole second and scored on a single by Herb Anderson. Anderson later came home on another single by Tony Anthony.

Eugene sandwiched four singles between two Yakima miscues to score five times in the seventh inning. It was all that was necessary as Yakima found the range only twice on two-run homers in both the fourth and seventh frames. The four-baggers were by Maury Lerner and Pete Gongola. Friday night contests open four-game sets with Salem at Lewiston, Eugene at Wenatchee and Tri-City at Yakima.
