Sutherland Gets Aid For Peewees

A Sutherland businessman, preferring to remain anonymous, has come to the rescue of the Sutherland peewee baseball program. Al Flegel, peewee chairman, said the businessman has volunteered to finance the whole program. Voters in the city this spring turned down a \$1,800 levy for summer recreation in which the baseball program was included. Dick Yurk, baseball and basketball coach at Sutherland High School, will be in charge of the program. Flegel said Yurk already has arranged for transportation of players and for use of facilities. A meeting for interested boys will be held at 10 a.m. Monday in the Community Building, Yurk announced. Flegel said the Sutherland man's interest in baseball has extended to Roseburg, where he has purchased 50 uniforms for players.

The single game will get under way at 8 p.m., with the two clubs to play a Sunday afternoon doubleheader. Both Saturday night and Sunday afternoon will find the ever-popular "family night" and "family day" in effect.

For those unfamiliar with the plan, it allows the entire family to attend the game or games for just one buck. The Black Sox again appear to have formed an outstanding club with many top-flight college and former college players on this year's roster.

In the action this weekend, fans will have a look at one of the top mound stars in the state. On the staff are right-handers Stan Dmochowski and Jack Henkel and three southpaws, Elwood Hahn, Don Lane and Jerry Bartow.

After the Saturday night fray, the teams meet again Sunday with the first game scheduled for 2 p.m. Next week, the Black Sox have three more dates on tap. On Saturday and Sunday the Sox host The Dalles in a single game Saturday night and another doubleheader Sunday afternoon. The next day, the Sox meet the San Francisco Presidio team in a single contest with another of the same set for Tuesday.

Ron Perrault played for the junior division third flight championship today. Perrault dropped Steve Shenck of Oswego Thursday 4 and 3, in semi-final play.

The two other remaining Roseburg golfers were ousted from the tournament in Thursday's play. In the junior division, Steve Hammacker of Eugene defeated Rick Petersen of Roseburg on the 19th hole. In the boys' division, Doug Norton of Columbia - Edgewater downed Tom Kabler of Roseburg 2 and 1.

Only one medalist, from the peewee division, was around for the final day.

Biff Lovett, Portland, last year's runner-up, became junior favorite on the basis of his 6 and 5 drubbing of Jack Shriver of Seattle Thursday. Opposing him in the 36-hole final is David Munro, also Portland, who downed Jerry Forrester, Portland, 3 and 2.

Ken Rosewall To Battle Tennis Greats In Tough 24-Hour Grind

FOREST HILLS, N.Y. — This is tiny Ken Rosewall's schedule in the \$15,000 tournament of tennis champions — Pancho Gonzales to-night, Lew Hoad tomorrow afternoon. That's a 24-hour grind against the supreme slugs of pro tennis.

"The good players always get an easy schedule," the little Australian laughed. "I better get some sleep."

If Rosewall wins both matches, he'll grab the \$3,000 brass ring in the six-match round robin. His record is 4-0 after last night's 6-3, 6-3 victory over another Aussie, Rex Hartwig.

Gonzales, the pro king from Los Angeles, is 3-0 and Aussie Hoad is 3-1. Hoad stopped 37-year-old Pancho Segura, 6-2, 9-7 last night before 5,000 chilled fans while Gonzales was idle.

Of the other four pros, only Tony Trabert has an outside chance to tie for first place. He's 2-2 after an 8-6, 8-6 triumph last night over Australian Frank Sedgman, who stands 0-3. Segura is 1-3 and Hartwig 0-4.

The clay-court schedule set up a Sunday climax between Gonzales and Hoad as the likely decisive match. But Rosewall's touch-and-go game has changed that.

"If Kenny beats me and then Lew," warned Gonzales, "it's all over Saturday. Kenny doesn't play

Sunday. Lew and I'll be playing for second money."

Gonzales knows what he must do to halt Rosewall's brilliant backhand, rated the best in tennis since Don Budge. "I know it. And he knows it," Pancho admits.

"I'll play to his forehand. His backhand is too good. A lot will also depend on my return of service. I've got to keep the ball away from him. If not, he hits a very offensive volley."

DeJohn Tiffs Baker In TV Ring Feature

SYRACUSE, N.Y. (AP) — Mike DeJohn, a handsome heavyweight with a great potential, is a 7-5 choice to whip hulking Bob Baker of Pittsburgh in a television 10 rounder at War Memorial Auditorium Friday night.

A red hot contender eight months ago, the 26-year-old Syracuse Slammer now needs a decisive victory over the 31-year-old Baker to get back in the limelight.

Last October the rangy, hard hitting DeJohn scored a sensational one-round knockout over then unbeaten Alex Miteff of Argentina. Mike appeared to be the dynamic new personality the drab heavyweight division needed so badly.

But the easy-going, fun loving youngster seemed content to rest on his laurels. Instead of bearing down on the rest of the contenders he remained on the sidelines until last April 23 when he met Cuba's Nino Valdes, another happy-go-lucky character.

The big Cuban beat Mike by a narrow, split decision. The one redeeming factor in the loss for Mike was that he rallied strongly in the final round. Usually he's through at that stage.

Mike stands 6-2½ and weighs about 204.

Baker is another friendly fellow who lacks the necessary fire. A pro since 1949, Big Bob has had many chances to fight his way into a title scrap. He was No. 1 contender several times. But when it came close to fighting for a title, Bob wasn't too interested. He said he preferred to be No. 3 instead of No. 1.

DeJohn is now ranked ninth. Baker no longer is ranked. Bob's record is 50-11-1 with 19 knockouts. The 6-2, 215 pounder won his last three fights in 1957 and hasn't fought since December.

DeJohn's record is 34-4-1 with 25 knockouts.

Eugene To See Tabori July 4

EUGENE (AP) — The famed Hungarian distance runner Laszlo Tabori, plans to compete in the Oregon A.A.U. track meet at Eugene July 4.

There is a possibility that the entire Russia-bound U.S. track team may also participate.

Bill Bowerman, track coach at the University of Oregon and Bob Newland, A.A.U. track chairman, plan to attend the national A.A.U. track championships at Bakersfield, Calif., Friday and Saturday.

The first two finishers in each event of that meet will be chosen for the trip to Russia next month. They also will be invited by Bowerman and Newland to do their pre-four training at Eugene.

If the A.A.U. approves the plan, they also will compete in the Oregon A.A.U. meet.

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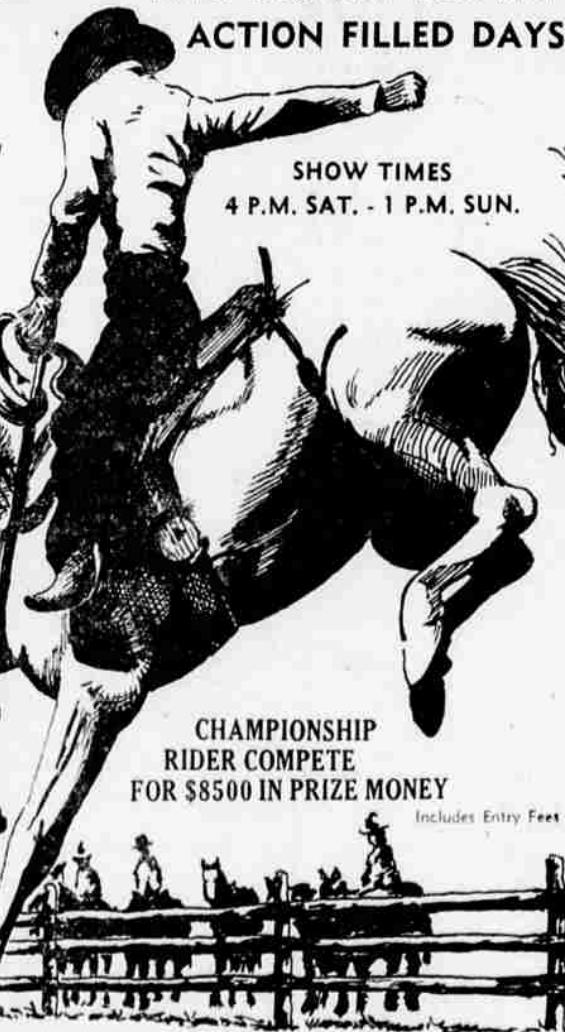
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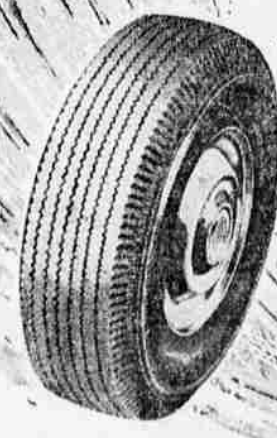
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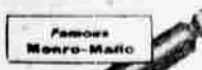
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
