SEATTLE (AP) — "A man," says Harry McGuane, "piles up a heap of social obligations in 40 years and he ought to pay them off some day."
So the wealthy Seattle lumberman did so Wednesday night when he reached his 40th milestone. He did it in a party which lasted eight hours, consumed a sizable bit of liquor and vittles and completely filled an eight-car special train hired for the purpose.
The "Life Begins at 40" party started at a downtown train loading platform at 6 p.m. By 6:30 or thereabouts some 800 persons, invited a nd crashers, crowded aboard the train and it chuffed away on its journey around Lake Washington and way points.
"Never saw so much likker in my life," said one happy guest between bites on a hot dog and

pulls at a stubby of beer. Others laced their ice water with vodka or whiskey, of which there was "cease and cease."
Food was available in great quantities but it was mighty hard to get up to it. The early comers staked strategic claims and were not about to give way to any claim jumpers.
Dress was optional and all the options were tall—from shorts and halters to full, frilly formals for women and Bermuda shorts to dinner jackets for the males.
The train returned at 2 a.m. and disgorged its passengers at the starting point.

Senate Indignant Over Nagy Death

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate adopted a resolution Thursday expressing deep indignation over the "barbarism and perfidy" of Russia in connection with the execution of Imre Nagy, Hungary's revolutionary premier. The vote was 91-0.
The Senate action came on the heels of a State Department statement denouncing the execution of Nagy and his minister of defense, Gen. Pal Maleter, as "an affront to all members of the U.N. and to the conscience of the world."
A roll call vote in the Senate sent the resolution to the House where it was expected to receive similar quick action.
Sponsored by Sens. Hubert H. Humphrey (D-Minn.) and William F. Knowland of California, the Republican minority leader, it said the "brutal political reprisal for the Hungarian revolt 'shocks the conscience of mankind.'"
It called on President Eisenhower to use every appropriate channel to express the sympathy of all Americans for the people of Hungary "on the occasion of this new expression of their ordeal of political oppression and terror."
