Large white candles were used around the sanctuary in front of the stained glass windows. A floor bouquet of Madonna lilies graced the entrance to the sanctuary. The marble-topped table in the narthex was attractive with a large arrangement of pink rhododendron effectively arranged in a tall footed milk glass bowl.
